

MORE GOOD THINGS TO EAT

Here is a dish to be used where resh fish are to be obtained:

Fish Pudding. - Cook one cupful of rice in bolling water until tendrain and pour through it enough cold water to separate the grains. Cook two pounds of pickerel, bass or other fresh white fish until well done, steam in a

steamer or tie in a cloth and cook in water. Flake the fish, removing all skin and bones. Combine the rice and fish, add two well beaten eggs, one cupful of fish stock and the same of milk, season with two tenspoonfuls of salt or more to taste, one-half teaspoonful of pepper, two tablespoonfuls lected Galveston as the next meeting of butter, using the seasoning between the layers of fish and rice. Bake onehalf hour and serve bot with drawn

Dakota Potatoes.-Peel eight medium-sized potatoes. Into a saucepan place a teaspoonful of sugar, and when melted add two tablespoonfuls of bot water. Put the potatoes into the pan cut in quarters lengthwise, one large onion chopped fine and one tablespoon ful of parsiey, one teaspoonful of salt, two bouillon cubes, one-half teaspoonful of paprika and just enough boiling water to cover and simmer until the potatoes are tender, but unbroken. Remove the potatoes with a skimmer to Beaumont, which were set on fire by a hot dish. Thicken the liquor with two tablespoonfuls of flour mixed with a little cold water. Pour over the potatoes and sprinkle with another tablespoonful of minced parsley on top.

Cherry Cake .- Cream three table spoonfuls of shortening with one-half cupful of sugar; add an egg well beat-en and two-thirds of a cupful of milk alternately with two cupfuls of pastry flour which has been sifted, with onehalf teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix well and spread evenly in a long sheet in a baking pan. Over the top place a quart of pitted cherries, sprinkled lightly with a tenspoonful of cinnamon and one-half cupful of sugar. Bake in a moderate oven. Dried or canned cherries may be used, if the first are well seaked and the latter drained from me of the Juice.

Fattigman Bakelse,--Best two eggs atil very light, add one tablespoonful sugar and three tablespoonfuls of then add gradually one and three-fourths cupfuls of pastry flour ed roll very thin. Cut in diamondaped please and cut two shashes in each. Fry in deep fat, drain and prinkle with powdered sugar. These are very dainty and delicious served with tea or a glass of ginger ale.





The moratorium asked is for 30 months and the prediction was that it would be granted on condition that the ailies be given control of Germany's finances during that period.

The French asserted the collapse of the mark and the threatened financial downfall of Germany is due to the German policy of issuing unlimited marks and to extravagant government penditures, and that the granting of a moratorius would not change the basic factors. 
