Texas Items

Texas Elks returning home several days ago from Atlantic City, paid their respects to President Harding at Washington.

Fire of undetermined origin did damage to the amount of \$50,000 to the Brown Cracker and Candy Company of Dallas.

City warrants to the amount of \$40,000 in Breckenridge have been sold for the purpose of constructing a municipal building.

The Grimes County fair was formally opened in Navasota this week.

The first bale of cotton for the season was sold at Gonzales, for 36c per pound.

Galveston County boys' and girls' farm clubs have a chance to win \$200 in prizes at the Houston Fair this fall.

Yoakum has been designated by the committee on work of the Grand Lodge of Texas, Masons, for one of the summer sessions.

The East Texas mill managers selected Galveston as the next meeting place. The meeting will be held on the third Saturday in August.

Considerable "cotton money" is changing hands these days in the valley about San Benito, and as the result, every one seems to be well pleased.

Delegates of the Texas district, Lutheran synod of Missouri, chose Perry, Texas, as their next meeting place at the close of the sixteenth annual session.

The four tanks belonging to the Magnolia Petroleum Company, at Beaumont, which were set on fire by lightning a few days ago, totaled a loss of about \$2,000,000.

Rice acreage in Texas is 175,248 acres as compared to last year's acreage of 154,145 acres, according to the preliminary estimate compiled by the Rice Millers' Association.

A fast boat is to be put in service along the Texas coast from Corpus Christi to Port Isabel, according to announcement by Roy Campbell, collector of customs of this district.

The all-day meeting held at San Benito recently in the interest of flood prevention and protection, was attended by all irrigation districts in the valley. Much good was accomplished.

Miss Mildred McKibben, of League City, was awarded first prize in the clothing contest held in Dickinson, Texas, a few days ago, under the direction of the A. and M. college extension service.

An attempt was made to burn the Seaman's Church Institute at Port Arthur the other night. Oil-soaked clothes placed against the building were blazing when firemen arrived. No damage was done.

Three men who, it is charged, robbed a hardware store and the post-office at Valley View, were captured by Constable James Wade and a small posse of citizens after two of the men had been shot, one of them perhaps fatally.

The attorney general's department Monday approved an issue of building, erection and equipment bonds, amounting to \$2,000,000, of the San Antonio independent school district. The bonds are payable serially and bear 5 per cent interest.

The county commissioners of Jefferson County have adopted a resolution to immediately proceed with the construction of the highways in this county. Bonds to the amount of \$2,000,000 were recently adopted to construct these highways.

Probably the highest price paid for any cotton this year was paid at Robstown, Nueces County, late Wednesday, when two local cotton men made competitive bids on a bale of staple cotton and the final price paid was 42 cents per pound, while the market quotations showed a close of 22.55.

The Robertson County singing convention held its annual session here, which was attended by one of the largest crowds in its history. More than a thousand pounds of barbecued meat was served, together with many baskets of home cooking prepared by the Franklin ladies and those of the surrounding communities.

Members of the commissioners court of Harris County voted to recommend to the state senator live stock commission that Harris County cattle free from ticks be dipped once each 21 days, instead of once each 14 days, as is the custom at present. The vote was taken following a petition from many cattlemen from the Producers Protective League.

MORE GOOD THINGS TO EAT

Here is a dish to be used where fresh fish are to be obtained:

Fish Pudding.—Cook one cupful of rice in boiling water until tender, drain and pour through it enough cold water to separate the grains. Cook two pounds of pickerel, bass or other fresh white fish until well done, steam in a steamer or tie in a cloth and cook in water. Flake the fish, removing all skin and bones. Combine the rice and fish, add two well beaten eggs, one cupful of fish stock and the same of milk, season with two teaspoonfuls of salt or more to taste, one-half teaspoonful of pepper, two tablespoonfuls of butter, using the seasoning between the layers of fish and rice. Bake one-half hour and serve hot with drawn butter or sauce.

Dakota Potatoes.—Peel eight medium-sized potatoes. Into a saucepan place a teaspoonful of sugar, and when melted add two tablespoonfuls of hot water. Put the potatoes into the pan cut in quarters lengthwise, one large onion chopped fine and one tablespoonful of parsley, one teaspoonful of salt, two bouillon cubes, one-half teaspoonful of paprika and just enough boiling water to cover and simmer until the potatoes are tender, but unbroken. Remove the potatoes with a skimmer to a hot dish. Thicken the liquor with two tablespoonfuls of flour mixed with a little cold water. Pour over the potatoes and sprinkle with another tablespoonful of minced parsley on top.

Cherry Cake.—Cream three tablespoonfuls of shortening with one-half cupful of sugar; add an egg well beaten and two-thirds of a cupful of milk alternately with two cupfuls of pastry flour which has been sifted, with one-half teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix well and spread evenly in a long sheet in a baking pan. Over the top place a quart of pitted cherries, sprinkled lightly with a teaspoonful of cinnamon and one-half cupful of sugar. Bake in a moderate oven. Dried or canned cherries may be used, if the first are well soaked and the latter drained from some of the juice.

Fattigman Bakelse.—Beat two eggs until very light, add one tablespoonful of sugar and three tablespoonfuls of cream, then add gradually one and three-fourths cupfuls of pastry flour and roll very thin. Cut in diamond-shaped pieces and cut two slashes in each. Fry in deep fat, drain and sprinkle with powdered sugar. These are very dainty and delicious served with tea or a glass of ginger ale.

GROWING USE OF FRESH FISH

With quick transportation and refrigeration, there is hardly an inland city of any size in which sea food or fresh water fish may not be had once or twice a week. This applies not only to the finny tribe, but also to shell fish.

With fish, as with many other foods, certain ideas, many of them false, have gained circulation. One is that fish and milk or any milk or cream dishes, such as ice cream, or milk as drink, should never be taken with crabs, oysters or lobster. When these combinations have been found to disagree with a person, such food mixtures should be avoided, but there is no reason why the average person may not combine the two, provided the fish or lobster is not served with an acid sauce.

In buying salmon the steaks are always the most expensive, though there is almost no waste. The red or Chinook salmon is considered best; then the pink and chub salmon, all good, but varies as to flavor as well as price. The practical housewife will use the cheaper grades for all made dishes, as the nutrition is the same. The more of this grade demanded will tend to lower the price of the red, which is now selling at a high figure.

There should be no reason for the absence of fish on our tables, even if far inland, as canned fish are always obtainable.

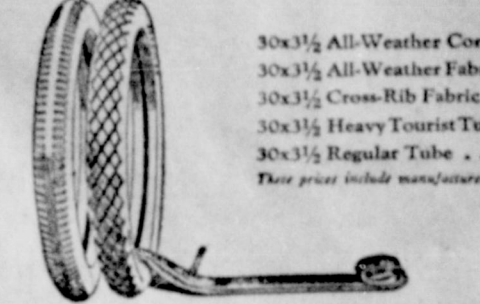

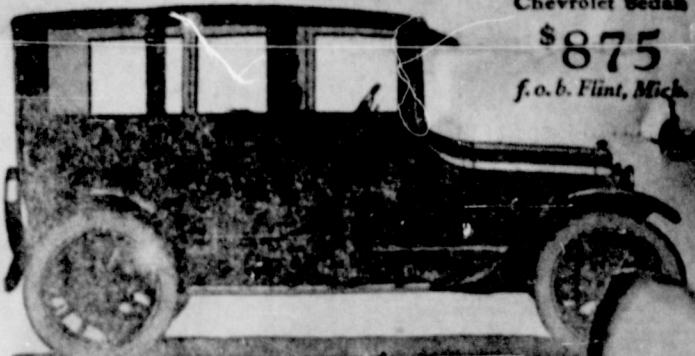

**ADJUTANT GENERAL IS CALLED TO WACO**

CONFERS WITH GOVERNOR ON DENISON SITUATION, BUT WITHOUT DECISION.

**BACK TO AUSTIN AT ONCE**

Will Continue Conference En Route and After Reaching Capital, Says Statement.

Waco, Tex.—Adjutant General Barton arrived here Friday to confer with Governor Pat M. Neff relative to the situation at Denison resulting from the strike of railroad shop craftsmen. He came to Waco via auto and will accompany Governor Neff back to Austin. The following statement was made by Governor Neff:

"Adjutant General Barton came to Waco in his auto at my request. We have discussed the strike situation, but no decision has been reached, and nothing will be done before the early part of next week. It is my intention to be the first to vote in my ward here tomorrow, and immediately thereafter we will depart for Austin in General Barton's auto. We will continue our conference regarding the strike while en route to that city and after reaching Austin."

Governor Neff was emphatic in his declaration that no decision had yet been reached as to action of any kind contemplated regarding the strike.

**WHITE IS APPARENTLY TO KEEP HIS FREEDOM**

Emporal Kansas Editor Calmly Awaits Arrest With His Defense Ready.

Topeka, Kan.—Friday night Governor Henry J. Allen had apparently decided not to send a Deputy down to Emporia with a warrant for the arrest of Editor William Allen White, his closest friend, who has been defying the State industrial law by sympathizing with the railroad strikers.

Governor Allen started the day by stating that "Bill" White was no different from any other citizen and that he was liable to arrest for placing a poster in the offices of his newspaper, the Emporia Gazette, declaring his sympathy for the strikers. Attorney General Hopkins was said to be preparing charges against the editor.

As the day wore on it brought reports that White, who has always been closer than a brother to the Governor, was really serious about his attitude that the clause in the industrial law prohibiting giving comfort to strikers was an "outrageous infraction of the rights of a free press and speech."

The Governor was informed that the progressive editor was sitting in his office, calmly waiting arrest, and that he had written a blistering defense of his action, to be released the minute he was taken into custody.

As the Governor was considering this another old friend, Victor Murdock, editor of the Wichita Eagle, announced his support of White in an editorial. Murdock, who is known as "the third best," said:

**Nationalists Captured in London.**  
 London.—The city of London has been captured by the Irish National Army, says Central dispatch from Dublin. The Nationalists took many prisoners together with arms and ammunition.

**Sun's Hope of Regaining Power Gone.**  
 Canton, China.—Sun Yat Sen's forces in Northern Kwantung, on whom the deposed President of South China has been pinning his hope of regaining power, have been defeated and are in retreat, pursued by the troops of Chen Chiung Ming, who overthrew Sun, according to advices from Shuchow.

**Government May Get German Dyes.**  
 Paris.—The American Government would receive its quota of German dyes amounting to more than \$3,700,000 annually as part payment for maintaining its army on the Rhine under the terms of a plan being worked out by the American Government with the Reparations Commission. Final approval is expected within several weeks.

**Forty Quarts Bonded Liquor Taken.**  
 Waco, Texas.—Forty quarts of bonded liquor, hidden in the rear of an automobile, were confiscated, together with the auto, by Federal Prohibition Enforcement Officer Alex Armstrong and City Detective Willie Stem, Thursday in front of a local hotel.

**Improved Concrete Pipe.**

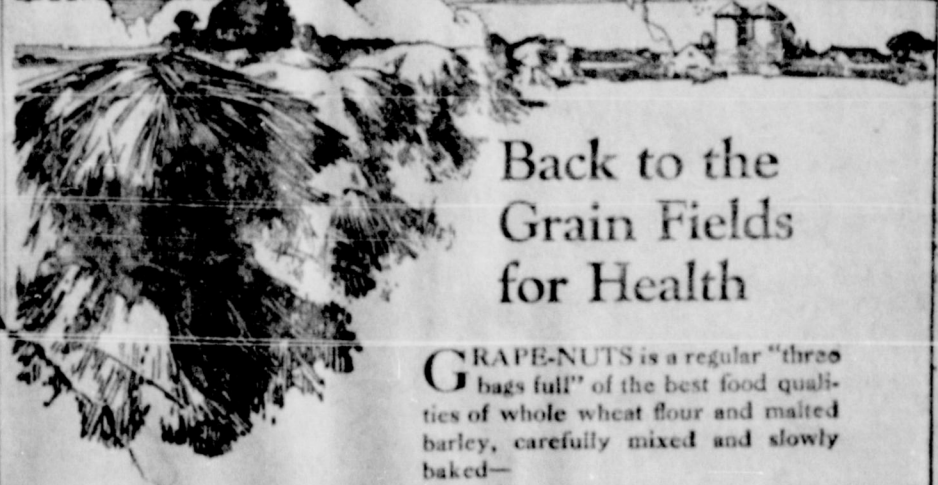

**DESERVING OF HONOR**

A tablet in honor of John Ericson, the designer, and Casparius De Lamater, who built the machinery of the famous Civil war monitor, was recently unveiled on the site of De Lamater's ironworks in New York city.

This tablet might well have borne the name of Theodore Timby, the inventor of the armored revolving turret, says the Mentor Magazine. The revolving turret was first used on the Monitor, and its principles incorporated today in every

gun built in Dover, N. Y., since 1909. He conceived the idea of the turret upon which the ironclad was built in New York in 1861. He received a pension of \$5,000 for use of his invention, but was never accorded recognition for his part in the war's making.

**HOW TO CLEAN SEWERS**

The sewer-cleaning department of the city of New York is said to make use of a fish for the purpose of removing obstructions which occur in the pipes. When it is noted a sewer is not fulfilling its mission, the sewer cleaner goes down to the river and catches a catfish. A string is tied to the fish's tail and it is released in the sewer. This fish will at once ascend the river and will work its way through any ordinary obstruction. The head of the cord which the fish has dragged after it is secured and it is made to pull a light wire through the pipe, and then a heavier one, with the aid of which the accumulations are finally removed.

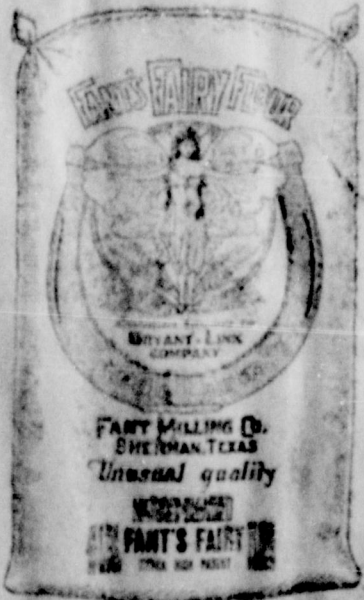

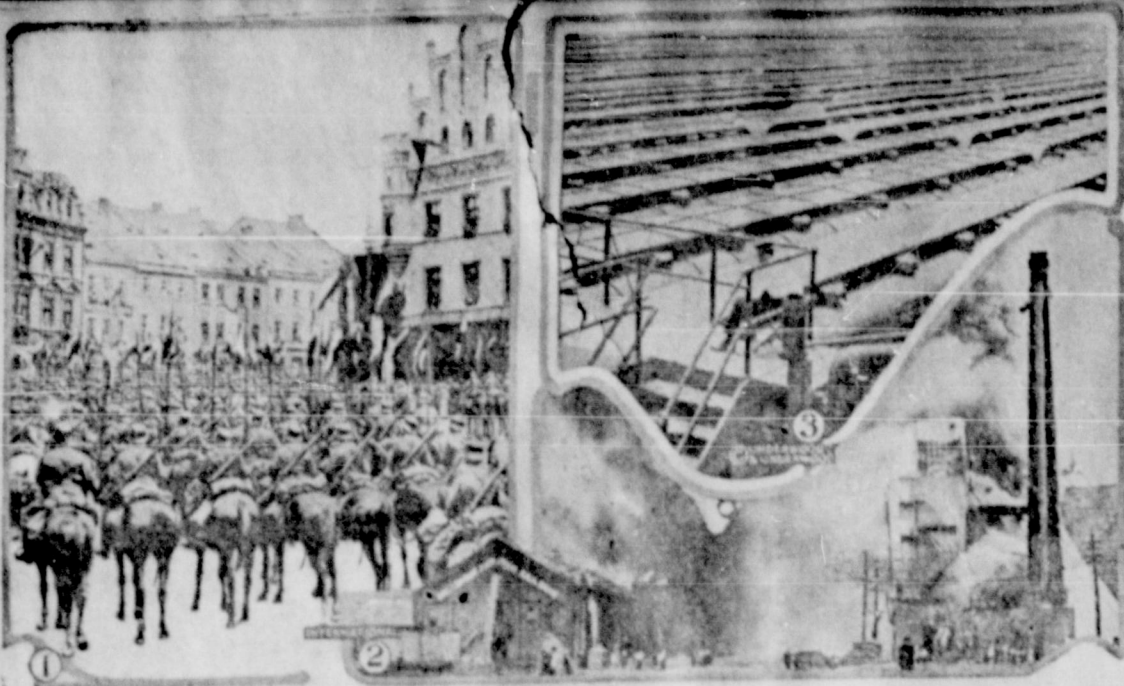

## NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

### Railway Executives Refuse to Enter Negotiations to End Shopmen's Strike.

### PROCLAMATION BY HARDING

He Warns Against Interference With Mails and Strikers Reply—France Opposes Moratorium for Germany—Attitude of Russians Disrupts The Hague Conference.

STRENUOUS efforts to bring an end to the strike of railway shopmen were made last week by Chairman Hooper and his colleagues on the general labor board, but the writing there had up to the time of success and had been entirely un- did not give the status of affairs much hope of an early end. Wednesday night the rail- executives took action that in the minds of many placed on them the burden of blame for the failure of negotiations. They flatly refused to enter into a parley with B. M. Jewell, leader of the strikers, and their reasons were held by Mr. Hooper to be in the main quite insufficient. They demanded that the shopmen abandon their strike and then proceed to settle their grievances through the labor board. They declined to meet Jewell on the ground that the men having struck in defiance of the decision and order of the board and the controlling provisions of the transportation act, "the issue thus raised is not one for consideration between the carriers and the representatives of the organized crafts on strike, except through the further orderly process before the United States railroad labor board, as contemplated by the transportation act."

Chairman Hooper intimated that new peace plans of the board involved appeals to the railway lines individually.

In many parts of the country, especially the Middle West, Texas, and on the Pacific coast, the disorders due to the strike became increasingly violent, and a number of men were killed. In several states the militia was called out, and in some localities, notably Bloomington, Ill., the engineers, firemen and trainmen rebelled against working under military guard. Sympathetic strikes were talked of. The leaders of the brotherhoods held several conferences and said their men would continue to operate trains up to the point where the military occupation began.

President Helt of the railway stationmen announced that his organization had postponed striking pending negotiations with the labor board which are now under way. On one Eastern road all the clerks struck.

Determined to guard federal interests, the administration at Washington has been keeping close tab on the developments, and President Harding issued a proclamation "directing all persons to refrain with all interference with the lawful efforts to maintain interstate transportation and the carrying of the United States mails." This was done after Postmaster General Work had submitted to the cabinet numerous instances of interference with the transportation of the mails and the information that a number of roads had been forced to abandon some of their mail trains. In case the proclamation were ignored, the administration laid plans for the institution of civil and criminal proceedings against individual offenders and the unions. It was understood that for the present the various states would be relied on for protection of the federal trains, but if any failed, and soldiers and marines could be placed on the mail trains. The President is determined to back up the federal labor board to the full extent of his powers.

On Thursday, at the direction of the President, Secretary Weeks ordered troops held in readiness to protect the lines of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas road in Texas, where operations were impeded by lawlessness and violence. This was in response to an appeal from the receiver of the railway who was appointed by a United States court.

Announcement was made by the Post Office department that if every mail train should cease to run, it would continue to transport mails by motortrucks and airplanes. The department has 55 planes, and the government owns thousands of trucks belonging to various departments.

In response to the President's proclamation the executive council of the shopmen's unions sent him a long telegram setting forth the grievances of the strikers. The labor board was, by implication, charged with partiality, and the railroads were accused of specific violations of the law and of disregarding the orders of the board. The workers, it was asserted, have been and are ready to negotiate with the railway executives and struck only as a last resort. "We respectfully insist," continued the telegram, "that no interruption of commerce or interference with the mails be caused by direct or indirect acts of organized employees. Such interruption and interference results inevitably from attempts of railroads to operate with insufficient, incompetent and unskilled workmen."

At the close of the week all that prevented an immediate strike of the maintenance of way men was the Government of their president, E. F. Grubb, to keep them at work for the present. A majority of their general council had requested that they be called together to plan for a walk-out. The stationary firemen and others decided to quit work on July 17.

CHICAGO was facing an almost complete stop of its local transportation facilities. The surface street car men already had voted to strike against a wage reduction of 20 cents an hour, and on Thursday the employees of the elevated roads also voted for a walkout. The unions agreed on a joint policy and plan of action, and there was hope that further negotiations might avert a strike. The situation was complicated by local politics and the desire of some of the city officials that the municipality should take over the surface roads and operate them.

THUS far only partial success has been achieved by President Harding in his attempt to end the coal strike. The anthracite operators submitted what he regarded as a complete acceptance of his plan of arbitration, but the bituminous operators

and the miners' union had not at the writing sent in their reply. Government officials thought both sides were evading an immediate decision with the intention of rejecting the settlement plan if public opinion seemed to approve such a course. Two conditions to the anthracite operators' acceptance were that a separate commission consider wage scales, and that the commission render its decision by August 10, they agreeing to pay in the meantime the scale of March 17.

NOTWITHSTANDING the strong opposition of France, it appeared probable the allied reparations commission would grant Germany's formal request for a moratorium on cash reparations payments, after the payment by Berlin of the \$8,000,000 due on July 15. The amount was reduced from \$12,500,000 by \$4,500,000 on delivery of coal and dyes. The moratorium asked is for 30 months and the prediction was that it would be granted on condition that the allies be given control of Germany's finances during that period.

The French asserted the collapse of the mark and the threatened financial downfall of Germany is due to the German policy of issuing unlimited marks and to extravagant government expenditures, and that the granting of a moratorium would not change the basic factors. They believe, in fact, that Germany has deliberately engineered her own insolvency in order to obtain a reduction of the reparations bill. In Paris it was said the chamber of deputies would overthrow any cabinet that consented to a moratorium unless there was a remission of the allied debts.

DOODGING and squirming and evading direct replies to direct queries, the Russian delegates in the international conference at The Hague had, by the end of the week, brought that conference just about to the breaking-up point. Their efforts were directed toward rupturing the solidarity of the non-Russians so that they might lay the blame for failure on some and then enter separate negotiations with others, especially the British. In this they seemed to have failed, for the British stood solidly with the French and others in the demand that the Russians recognize the pre-war debts, give guarantees for the credits they asked, and state definitely on what terms they would restore foreign property to its owners. All this the Russians refused to do, and their attitude made so useless further continuation of the conference that many of the delegates arranged to start for home at once.

ALTHOUGH the Irish Free State forces are successfully "mopping up" the rebellious republicans, the disorder in the island is still such that the first session of the new parliament has been postponed again until August 15. By then, it is believed, conditions will be normal and there need be no involuntary absentees.

Clster has thrown another monkey wrench into the new Irish machinery. Premier Sir James Craig says Clster will not participate in the joint commission which, under the treaty, was to have carefully marked out the frontier between the north and the south. The border, as it now stands, is a continual source of strife.

ON THE recommendation of Senators McKinley and McCormick and the Illinois Bar association, President Harding has named James H. Wilkerson of Chicago to be federal judge of the northern district of Illinois to succeed Judge Landis. Mr. Wilkerson has had a long career as county attorney, member of the Illinois legislature, assistant and later United States district attorney and assistant United States Attorney General during of 1914.

**CITY ORDINANCES FOR  
TOWN OF KNOX CITY**

**ORDINANCE NO. ONE**

The following was adopted by the unanimous vote of the Board of Commissioners of the said town of Knox City, Texas:

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Knox County, Texas, that whereas the said town of Knox City is duly incorporated under Title 22, Chapter 15, and all amendments thereof, of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas; and that the same be and is hereby adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the said town of Knox City:

It is further hereby ordained by said Board of Commissioners of the said town of Knox City that all of said Title 22 of Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby adopted for the government of said town of Knox City so far as the same may be applicable under the laws and Constitution of the State of Texas.

It is further hereby ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the said town of Knox City that Chapter 5, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby adopted for the government of the said town of Knox City, so far as the same may be applicable under the laws and Constitution of the State of Texas.

**ORDINANCE NO. TWO**

An ordinance regulating the operation of Motor vehicles within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, and providing penalties for a violation of the same, to wit:

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

**Section 1.**  
That hereafter all persons driving or operating Motor or other vehicles within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, shall in meeting any other vehicle, drive to the right, or in over taking any other vehicle proceeding in the same direction, shall drive to the left.

**Section 2.**  
That it shall hereafter be unlawful to drive or operate any motor or other vehicle within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, at a greater rate of speed than 15 miles per hour, while running on the public streets of said town.

**Section 3.**  
All automobiles and other vehicles shall have attached to them both in front and a rear lamp and such lamps shall be lighted between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, except when upon a public street, alley, or driveway within the limits of said town of Knox City, Texas.

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to drive any automobile or other vehicle within the limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, with any bell or other appliance for giving notice of its approach so that when such appliance is rung or otherwise operated it may be heard a distance of three hundred feet.

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person while driving or operating any automobile or other motor vehicle or any other vehicle upon the streets within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, to turn said automobile, motor, or other vehicle around, before driving to the next intersecting street, upon which said person is then running, driving, or operating such automobile, motor, or other vehicle.

**Section 6.**  
That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any motor vehicle to be driven or operated upon the public streets within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, with defective or soot-filled tires, or to emit excessive or unusual noises, or to emit smoke or gas.

**Section 7.**  
That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any intoxicated person to drive or operate any motor vehicle upon the public streets within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, while such person is in such state of intoxication.

**Section 8.**  
That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to drive or operate any motor vehicle upon the public streets within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, without having first displayed on such motor vehicle, both on the front and back, number plates corresponding to the number assigned to such motor vehicle by the State Highway Department of the State of Texas, in conformity with all requirements of the said State Highway Department.

**Section 9.**  
That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person driving or operating any motor vehicle upon the public streets within the corporate limits of

the town of Knox City, Texas, if such person be driving or operating said motor vehicle along a public street running East and West through the corporate limits of the said town of Knox City, Texas, to willfully fail or refuse to give first right of passage way to any persons driving or operating a motor vehicle, on any of the public streets running North and South through the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas.

Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance contained in the nine preceding sections, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor, shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

The fact that the town of Knox City, Texas, is without an adequate ordinance regulating motor vehicle and other traffic, within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, thereby endangering the safety of the people residing within said town, and that the mode and manner of the operation of motor vehicles, in some instances, create a nuisance and a menace to the people residing within the corporate limits of said town, creates an imperative public necessity, requiring the suspension of the rule requiring such town ordinances to be read at three several meetings, and said rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance is now placed upon its first, second, and third readings to final passage, and is hereby adopted.

**ORDINANCE NO. THREE**

An ordinance prohibiting the storing, transporting, etc., of nitroglycerine within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, and providing penalties for violation of the same.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

**Section 1.**  
It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, partnership, firm, or corporation to keep, handle, store, receive or transport in or through the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, liquid nitroglycerine in any quantity whatsoever, and any person, partnership, firm, or corporation so offending shall be punished on conviction therefor as hereinafter prescribed:

**Section 2.**  
Any person, persons, partnership, firm, or corporation found guilty of violating Section 1, of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and each day's offense hereunder shall subject the offender to a separate prosecution.

**ORDINANCE NO. FOUR**

An ordinance to prevent the blocking and obstruction of passage on the streets, sidewalks, and alleys of the town of Knox City, Texas.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

**Section 1.**  
That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to blockade or obstruct in any manner or degree any sidewalk, street, street crossing, or alley within the limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, so as to prevent or impede the free, usual, and customary passage on and along such streets, sidewalks and alleys.

**Section 2.**  
Any person violating Section 1, of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty five dollars.

**ORDINANCE NO. FIVE**

An ordinance declaring it a nuisance and an offense to keep or permit hogs to remain within certain prescribed limits of the town of Knox City, Texas.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

**Section 1.**  
That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to keep or permit any hog or hogs to remain upon their premises in that part of the town of Knox City, Texas, bounded as follows, to-wit:

Blocks No. 25, 26, 27, 28, 33, 34, 35, 36, 42, 43, 44, 45 of the original townsite.

And the keeping or permitting any hog or hogs to remain upon such premises is hereby declared to be a nuisance and an offense and is hereby prohibited and each day that such nuisance is permitted or maintained shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

**Section 2.**  
Any person violating Section 1, of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty five dollars.

**ORDINANCE NO. SIX**

An ordinance prohibiting stock penning loose within the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, and providing a penalty for violation of same.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners to-wit:

**Section 1.**  
That it shall be unlawful, hereafter, for any person or persons to allow the running at large within the city limits or any specified parts thereof, horses, mules, cattle, sheep, goats, hogs and other animals and for impounding of the same when found running at large for the sale of same, for the costs of the proceeding and the penalty incurred and to order their destruction when they cannot be sold, and to impose penalties on the owners thereof.

**Section 2.**  
Tying or larding any of the above animals upon or within reach of streets or sidewalks is prohibited. Penalty.

Any person or persons found guilty or that violates this ordinance may have a penalty imposed upon them not less than \$1. nor over \$10.00 for each and every offense.

**ORDINANCE NO. 7.**

An ordinance for licensing Dray Lines, Transfers etc.

Be it ordained:  
That the town shall have the power to license and control within said town's limit, Transfers and Dray Lines etc. other vehicles for hire, to require the payment of license fees, and to punish the use of any vehicle named for hire within the town without compliance with the regulations governing same.

License fee \$15.00 per vehicle per year.  
Penalty for refusal to pay License shall not be less than \$1.00 nor over \$10.00 for each offense.

**ORDINANCE NO. EIGHT**

Sanitary Ordinance.  
Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

**Section 1.**  
That hereafter all cars or other vehicles be parked in the center of Central Ave. at an angle of 45 degrees.

**Section 2.**  
That no cars or other vehicles be allowed to park at the curb over 10 minutes at any one time.

Any person or persons violating this ordinance will be fined not less than \$1.00 nor over \$10.00 for each offense.

**ORDINANCE NO. NINE**

Sanitary Ordinance.  
Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

That it be unlawful hereafter to throw or place any decayed fruit, vegetables, melons, melon rinds, or any other waste matter whatever, which may be unsightly or which may become deleterious or harmful to the health of the people of the town, into and upon any street, alley or highway of the town or any sidewalk or vacant lot or premises therein.

Garbage cans are to be placed conveniently and the scavenger will remove the contents weekly.

**Section 2.**  
Each premises that have a privy pit must have the pit dug not less than 6 feet deep and the council recommends that disinfectant lime be sprinkled in the toilets at least once a week, if not more.

The penalty for violating the above ordinance is a fine not less than \$1.00 and not over \$10.00 for each offense.

**ORDINANCE NO. TEN**

An Ordinance on hitching places etc.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

**Section 1.**  
That hereafter it will be unlawful for any person or persons to hitch stock to the sidewalks, curbs, electric light, telegraph, or telephone

poles which are in the limits of the town of Knox City, Texas. Any person or persons violating this ordinance will be fined \$1.00 or over \$10.00 for each offense.

**ORDINANCE NO. ELEVEN**

Any person, persons firms or organizations using the city water shall pay a monthly fee ranging from \$3.00, fee regulated by Commissioners, not later than the 10th of month.

Penalty for failure to pay monthly fee is, the water will be disconnected and a fee of \$2.00 will be charged for reinstating.

**Ordinance No Twelve.**

An ordinance prohibiting the sale of Beef, pork, etc.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

That no person, persons, firms, or corporations shall sell, peddle or offer for sale, within the Fire limits of said town, beef, pork, sausage, or any other meats or beef.

Any person, persons, firms etc, selling or offering for sale any of the above mentioned articles in the resident section shall comply with the regulations of the City markets to wit:

All such mentioned meats and etc, shall be slaughtered in a fly proof building.

Penalty for violating the above Ordinance will be a fine not less than \$1.00 nor over \$25.00.

**Ordinance No Thirteen:**

An ordinance prohibiting loafing, loitering, etc, and providing fine for same.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of

**Ordinance No.**

Any person or persons found guilty of peddling melons, fruits or vegetables or any perishable products on Central Avenue, within two blocks extending south to Main street and north to Third Street, including these two streets, or on Fourth Street, within two blocks extending east to Austin Avenue and west to Nolan Avenue, shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00

**Ordinance No. 15.**

An ordinance demanding that all sidewalk on Central Avenue within the business district of the town, be constructed of brick or concrete as to form height.
