Clyde Girls Win Championship

CLYDE- The Clyde girls cross won their first Conference B girls state championship Saturday, scoring 59 points with all five scorers running career bests.

Rea Huddleston led all Clyde finishers, coming in 8th place out of 120 runners by running a 12:13 on the two-mile course. Debbie Bentley captured 13th place. Gae Futch, Tammy McRae, Cindy Haynes and Tammy Bentley also were among the top

five finishers. Only the top five finishers from each team are scored.

Coach Van Grimes was pleased with his team after the run. It was the first state championship Clyde has ever won.

Saturday marked the third consecutive time Clyde has gone to the finals. Last year Clyde finished 9th, and in 1977 they captured 12th place.



LEGAL NOTICE

The Texas Mohair Producers Board will hold a referendum and biennial election on February 5, 1980. Producers will be asked to vote on increasing the assessment rate from 2½¢ to 4½¢ per pound of mohair marketed to fund promotion, advertising, market and product development, education and research programs being administered by the Mohair Council of America.

The referendum will be by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters of record at least two (2) weeks prior to the referendum date. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place (Texas Mohair Producers Board office, Post Office Box 5337, San Angelo, Texas 76902) before midnight on the date of the referendum.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to January 22, 1980, may obtain one at his/her local County Agent's office, through his/her local warehouse, or from the Texas Mohair Producers Board office at the above address.





Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

I wish to commend the Star for publishing in last week's edition the letter from Gilbert Hinds. Part of my basic philosophy in any controversy is to adopt the wisdom handed down by Francois Voltaire, the French writer, wherein in the 18th century he wrote "I wholly disagree with what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it". That is the rea-

son for my commendation, even though, I will have to admit, I could not understand what he was trying to say, he certainly has the right to say it.

I have no personal axe to grind with the City of Baird. I am sitting out here purchasing current from REA at a very reasonable rate. What I am concerned about is the great number of elderly people in Baird living on a fixed income who, if they have been very conservative with electrical usage, are faced every month with coming up with from \$10 to \$25 extra electrical bill just so a few misguided people can say we have our own light plant. And let me assure you, when this 100% hook up is completed with WTU you purchasers will still be paying an exorbitant amount for electricity because the costs will be too high and those costs will have to be recovered.

In the many years of our living under a democratic form of government there have been elections that would turn out one way and within a short period of time, as the electorate gained knowledge and information, another election would turn out the opposite way. Such is the case in Baird today, but projecting from the calls I have recorded on my answering service the vote would be overwhelming for the sale of the Plant...In fact, I think it

would carry to give it away. That is the reason the biased thinking City Council is doing nothing about the two petitions now before them. They want to

hang on to that "White Elephant".

Remember this, Baird citizens it's not very long until the April elections.
