I am a native of Callahan County. I am 38 years old, married, and have two school age children.

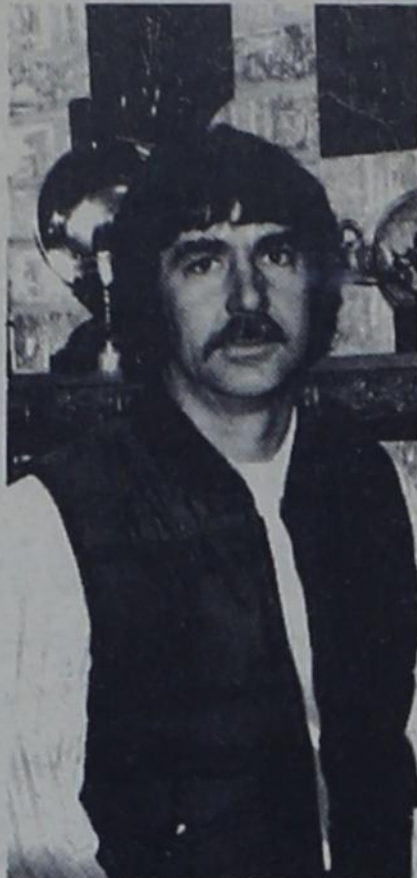

Beef Referendum Vote Feb. 19-22

The 1980 Beef Referendum vote will be held February 19-22 in the County ASCS office, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent.

Producers must register in order to be eligible to vote. Registration will be conducted in the County ASCS office Jan. 28 - Feb. 6. Any bonafide cattlemen regardless of age or number of cattle owned may register to vote.

The 1976 Beef Research and Information Act authorizes a national program under which cattle producers would be assessed to finance research and information activities designed to improve markets for cattle, beef and beef products.

According to the Act, amended in 1978, for the order to become effective, at least 50% of those registered to vote in the referendum and a majority of those voting must vote in favor of the order. Originally the Act required approval by two-thirds of the registered producers voting. An order voted in 1977 was favored by 56.4 percent of those voting and

was not approved.

Assessments to finance the program at the rate of 20 cents per 100 value would be made through a deduction by the buyer each time cattle are sold.

Beef producers not wishing to fund the program would have their assessment refunded upon request when accompanied by proof of payment.

Copies of the order was published in the December 4, 1979 Federal Register. Copies are available from the County Extension office in Baird, according to Gerngross.

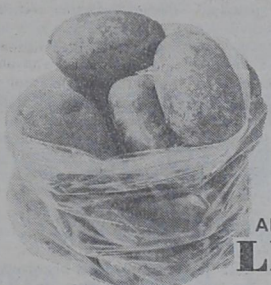

Public Review Period Started

This week is the start of a 60-day public review period during which time interested people are being asked to comment on the direction they think future U.S. Department of Agriculture conservation programs should take.

The public review period starts January 28 and ends March 28.

Four draft documents describing the Nation's nonfederal soil and water resources, their condition, projected demands, and seven proposed alternative strategies can be reviewed at either the Soil Conservation Service or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office located in the county courthouse in Baird, Texas.

Jim Boykin, District Conservationist, said the proposals for a national soil and water conservation program were developed by a coordinating committee made up of members from nine U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies plus the Office of Management and Budget and the Council on Environmental Quality. The process, mandated by the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), included consideration of public input from 9,000 public meetings held in the United States during 1978.

The Act directs the USDA to appraise the condition of the Nation's renewable natural resources and to propose alternative programs to guide the Nation's conservation activities. The appraisal revealed that one-third of the Nation's cropland—136 million acres—is eroding at an excessive rate.

Basic information about

the RCA process and proposals may be seen in four documents:

The first document, "Draft Appraisal Part I", describes the status and condition of our natural resources and provides information on their quantity and quality and major uses of nonfederal land. The completed draft identifies national conservation objectives for: Reducing erosion and preserving prime farmlands, Improving water quality, Conserving water, Improving fish and wild life habitat, including the preservation of wetlands, Reducing upstream flood damages, Conserving energy, Solving related resource problems.

The second document, "Draft Appraisal Part II", projects demands on soil and water resources to the year 2030 and suggests levels of management that could be used to preserve these resources. It also summarizes trends in rural land ownership and describes the contribution of state and local programs to soil and water conservation.

The third document, "Program Report and Environmental Impact Statement", outlines seven possible approaches—called alternative strategies—for changing USDA conservation programs and outlines the probable environmental impact.

The fourth document, "Summary of Appraisal, Parts I and II and Program Report" is a brief summary of the other three documents.

During the public review period, three public meetings will be held in Texas to discuss content

of the documents and provide an opportunity for comments. The meetings will be held in Arlington on February 26; Lubbock, March 4; and San Antonio, March 6.

Interested citizens are invited to send written comments about the document or suggestions about future conservation programs to the RCA Response Analysis Center, P.O. Box 888, Athens, Georgia 30603.

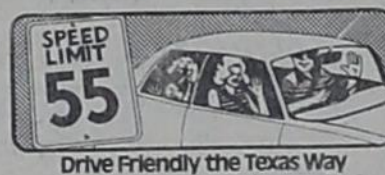

Coaches Attend Clinic Jan. 25-27

Dave Edmiston and Max Gordon, Baird High School football coaches, attended the American Motors Coach of the Year football clinic held in Dallas January 25-27.

The Coach of the Year clinics, now in their 26th year, are put on by former Michigan State University coach Duffy Daugherty and Bud Wilkinson, former coach at Oklahoma and most recently of the St.

Louis Cardinals. This years clinics are being sponsored by American Motors Corp.

The Dallas clinic featured seminars and workshops designed to give the nearly 1,600 high school football coaches in attendance tips and pointers from the nation's top college and high school coaches. Coaches Edmiston and Gordon attended sessions given by coaches John Robinson of USC, Grant Teaff of Baylor, Lou Holtz of Arkansas, and ex-Ohio State coach Woody Hayes.

At the three-day clinic held at the Dallas Hilton hotel, a number of coaches were presented with awards for their teams winning performance in the 1979 season. Coach Bob McQueen of Temple High School, Temple, Texas, was named American Motors Coach of the Year for the Southwest region. McQueen and eleven other regional Coach of the Year winners will compete for the national Coach of the Year title. The winning coach will win a 1980 American Motors four-wheel-drive Eagle automobile. A judging panel composed of some of the nations top college coaches will select the national Coach of the Year in early March.

Other wildcat is Davis Brothers of Abilene No. 2 Burks, having a proposed depth of 2,000 feet.

It will be drilled five miles southwest of Eula on a 163-acre lease.

Drillsite is 2,150 feet from the north and 1,550 feet from the east lines of Section 4, Block 7, SP Survey.

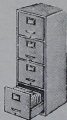

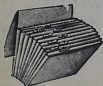
