F.F.A. Open House-Stock Show Planned Saturday

January 6, 1962 will be the day of "Open House" and a field day of one of the latest additions to Knox City Schools—a Vocational Agriculture Stock Show and open house of the FFA stock pens.

Vocational Ag Teacher Leon Burkham informed the Herald last week that unless inclement weather prevailed F. F. A. members would show their projects at the feed pens east of Knox City Saturday.

Burkham was faced with the same problems of numerous other towns and communities when he came to Knox City to teach this year—and that was that there were too many youngsters who lived in town and did not have a suitable place in which to raise projects such as pigs, cattle and sheep.

Most of them settled for either a few rabbits or a few chick-

ens. All of that has been changed this year, thanks to Leon and a number of local civic minded citizens.

Burkham tried, unsuccessfully, for several months to find a place suitable for the new pens situated on the Munday highway and just out of the city limits. One day he was having coffee with a few friends and C. J. Reese joined them. After a few words, Burkham asked Reese if he had a spot suitable for the F. F. A. boys. Reese told him he had nine acres of land they could use.

Work started on the pens and soil immediately. Today there are ten individual pens, 10x30 feet, sheep pen, 50x50 and a calf pen 10 by 50 feet. The entire barn is 10 by 100 feet.

Each have a 10 by 20 foot shed and feed room attached.

Water has to be hauled now, but plans call for a water well.

Burkham said there were a large number of contributors to the new project. A few of them that came to mind were Claude and Tommy Richardson, who

donated lumber and tin; equipment and fertilizer by B & C Chemical Co., and Wood Chemical Co. Bud Carver, Precinct One Commissioner, had also contributed work to leveling of land and "we have been helped by various other individuals," Burkham said.

Land not already used for the stock pens will be used in experimental plots, he told this reporter.

Plans now are to put full recommended fertilizers on part of the land; half recommended on part, and the rest of the land without fertilizer and the crops will be of equal parts of oats, milo and alfalfa.

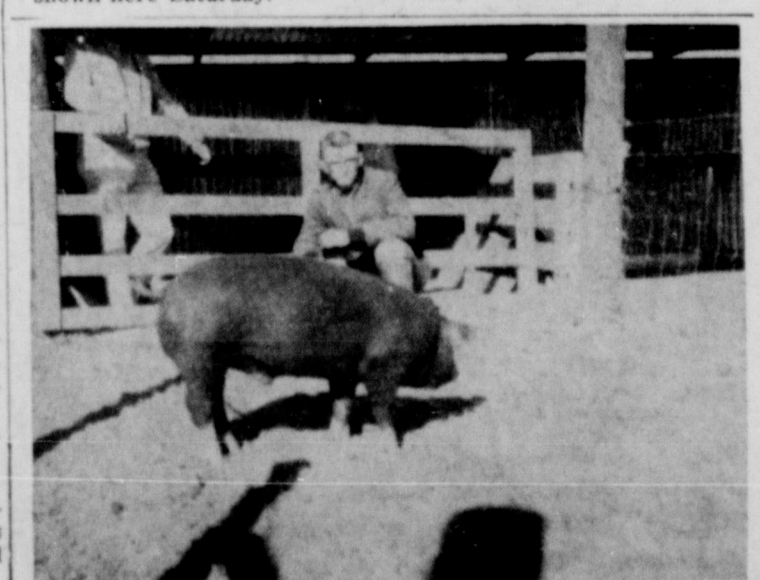
What they produce on the soil they plan to feed in Chapter feeding projects.

Burkham said he and the vocational ag class had received full cooperation on everything from the faculty, the superintendent, and the townspeople.

"... and we are deeply indebted to Mr. Reese who made the whole thing possible," Burkham said.

Governor Daniel Issues Annual Plea To Motorists To Drive Carefully

Holiday motorists in Texas will receive continuous reminders about safe driving during the ten day Christmas-New Year's holiday through one of the State's most comprehensive safety campaigns, Gov. Price Daniel said Tuesday, Dec. 19.

The massive holiday safety appeal will be led by Texas newspapers, radio and television stations and outdoor advertising companies, which are devoting much space and time to urging Texans to drive safely and legally, the Governor said.

When holiday travel approaches its expected peak, more than 250 Texas radio stations and nearly 50 television stations are expected to swing into action with their Statewide "Drive Lighted and Live!" campaign, sponsored officially by the Texas Association of Broadcasters.

The broadcasters will urge the listeners and viewers to drive with headlights burning daylight hours as a reminder that safe and legal driving is the best way to avoid holiday crashes. The TAB campaign will cover two periods of the official ten-day holiday, Saturday and Monday, Dec. 23, 24, and 25, and Saturday, Sunday and Monday, Dec. 30, 31, and Jan. 1.

Referring to some of the major publicity contributions made to the campaign, thus far, Governor Daniel said the story of holiday traffic safety "will go to hundreds of thousands of Texas motorists by eye and ear."

Nearly 700 big billboards have been erected across the state by members of the Outdoor Advertising Association of Texas and other outdoor advertising companies. These posters carry the photo and signature of the Governor along with a message he has repeated annually since 1958: "Don't Let A Collision Spoil Your Holiday."

The Governor said pre-holiday newspaper coverage of the program "appears to be as good as any we have ever received."

He said he had seen "hundreds of news stories, editorials, cartoons, feature stories and photos devoted to some phase of the holiday traffic campaign."

The official Department of Public Safety estimate is that 88 persons will meet death in Texas traffic during the 10-day holiday period from 12:01 a.m., Saturday, Dec. 23, through 11:59 p.m., Monday, Jan. 1.

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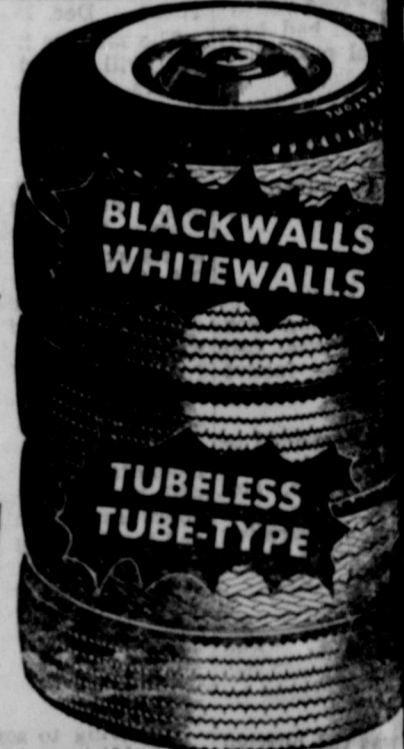

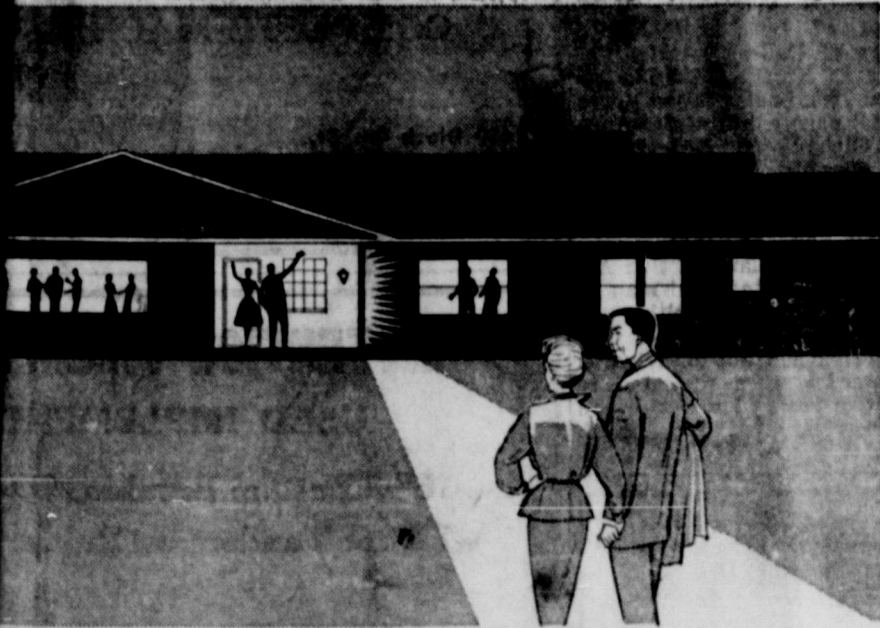

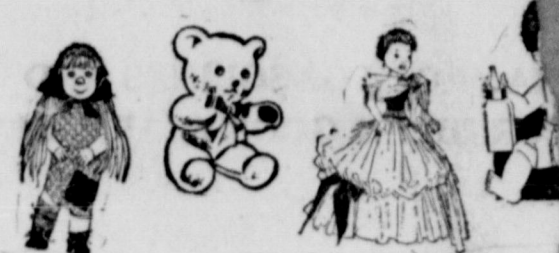
