

Nine Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On November 6th

Callahan County residents will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 6th, to vote on Constitutional Amendments. Below are the nine amendments to be voted for or against in this election.

No. 1. — The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975.

No. 2. — The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

No. 3. — The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

No. 4. — The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the engagement of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts.

No. 5. — The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property taxpayers.

No. 6. — The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing

that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals.

No. 7. — The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans Land Fund.

No. 8. — The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law.

No. 9. — The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a nonprofit water supply corporation or a nonprofit water supply cooperative.

Precinct 1 - Baird - will vote at the American Legion; Precinct 2 - Clyde, at the Clyde Lions Club; Precinct 3 - Cross Plains at City Hall; Precinct 4 - Putnam at Hershaw Wagley Building; Precinct 5 - Eula, at Eula High School; Precinct 6 - Denton Valley at Baptist Church and Precinct 1 - Oplin at the Community Center.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

All registered voters are urged to vote in the constitutional amendment election.

Food Stamps On Sale at Baird & Clyde Post Offices November 1st

The U. S. Postal Service will begin selling Food Stamps to the public on Nov. 1, 1973. Both Post Offices at Baird and Clyde will have the stamps available.

The stamps will be sold daily, Monday through Friday, during the hours of 10:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M. in the afternoon. No stamps will be sold at either office on Saturdays.

The Food Stamp Program is

a cooperative undertaking by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Texas Department of Public Welfare, and the U. S. Postal Service. The U. S. Postal Service will be involved only in the sale of the stamps.

Customers desiring stamps have three basic requirements to meet before a sale can be made. First, they must have an identification card from the Dept. of Public Welfare, properly filled out and signed. Second, they must have an ATP (Authorization to Purchase) card, current for the month. These are IBM cards which indicate the amount of purchase and the cost of the coupons. These cards also give the buyer the choice of purchasing his allotment in full, or 1/4, 1/2, or 3/4. And third, the customer must have the correct cash for the transaction. No checks will be accepted under any circumstances.

Books of coupons come in four denominations: \$2.00 Book - 4-50c coupons; \$3.00 Book - 6-50c coupons; \$10.00 Book, (5-\$2.00 coupons; and \$30.00 Book, (6 - \$5.00 coupons.)

Recipients of the stamps are cautioned to protect them with care. The stamps are the same as cash, especially when purchasing groceries at a Food Store.

Bagwells To Observe 50th Anniversary

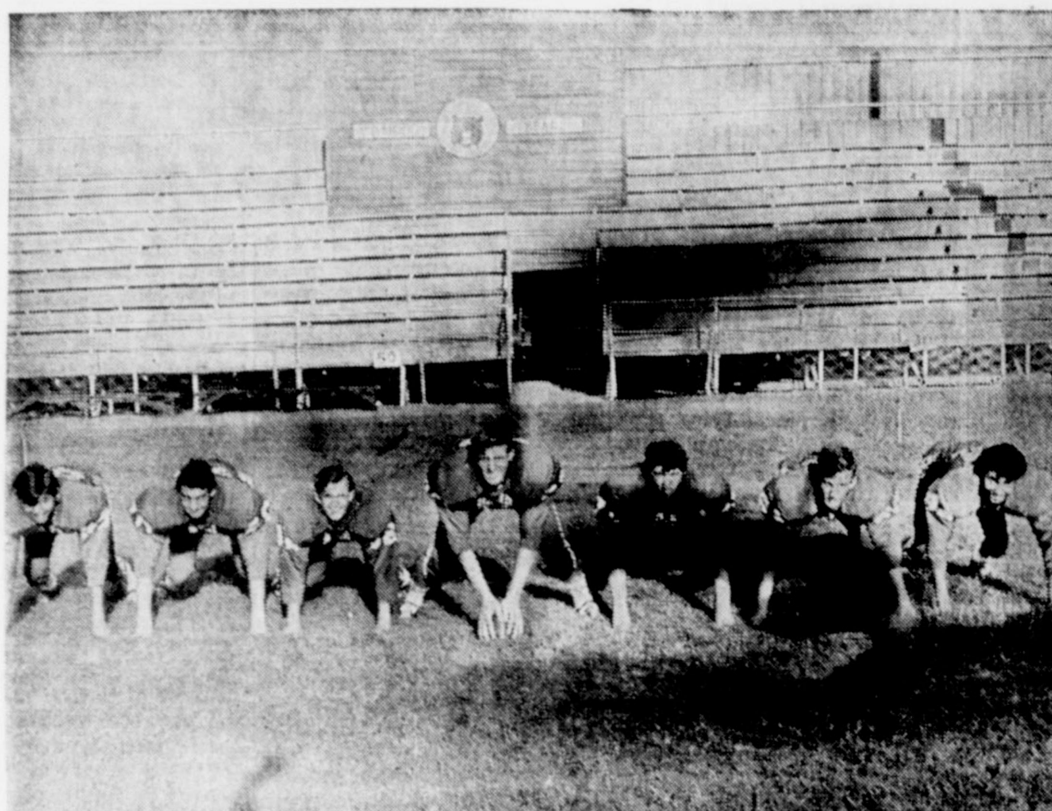

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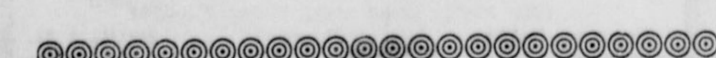

Veterans Service Officer Urges Passage of Amendment No. 7

The Veterans Land Program has been in existence since 1949, and has helped thousands of wartime veterans to purchase farms and ranches. The program has operated at no cost to the taxpayer and at considerable benefit not only to veterans but to the economy of all Texans. It is one of very few programs ever established which will make a profit for the State. Statisticians have determined that the State of Texas will eventually realize a profit of from \$100 to \$200 million on the Veterans Land Program.

Every citizen of Texas should exercise his or her right to vote on Nov. 6, and each should cast his vote for each issue in accordance with the dictates of his conscience.

Tips From Tuesday Tillers Garden Club

This will allow you to bend and arrange the flowers. Add your wired and taped leaves and other ornaments to complete your design."
