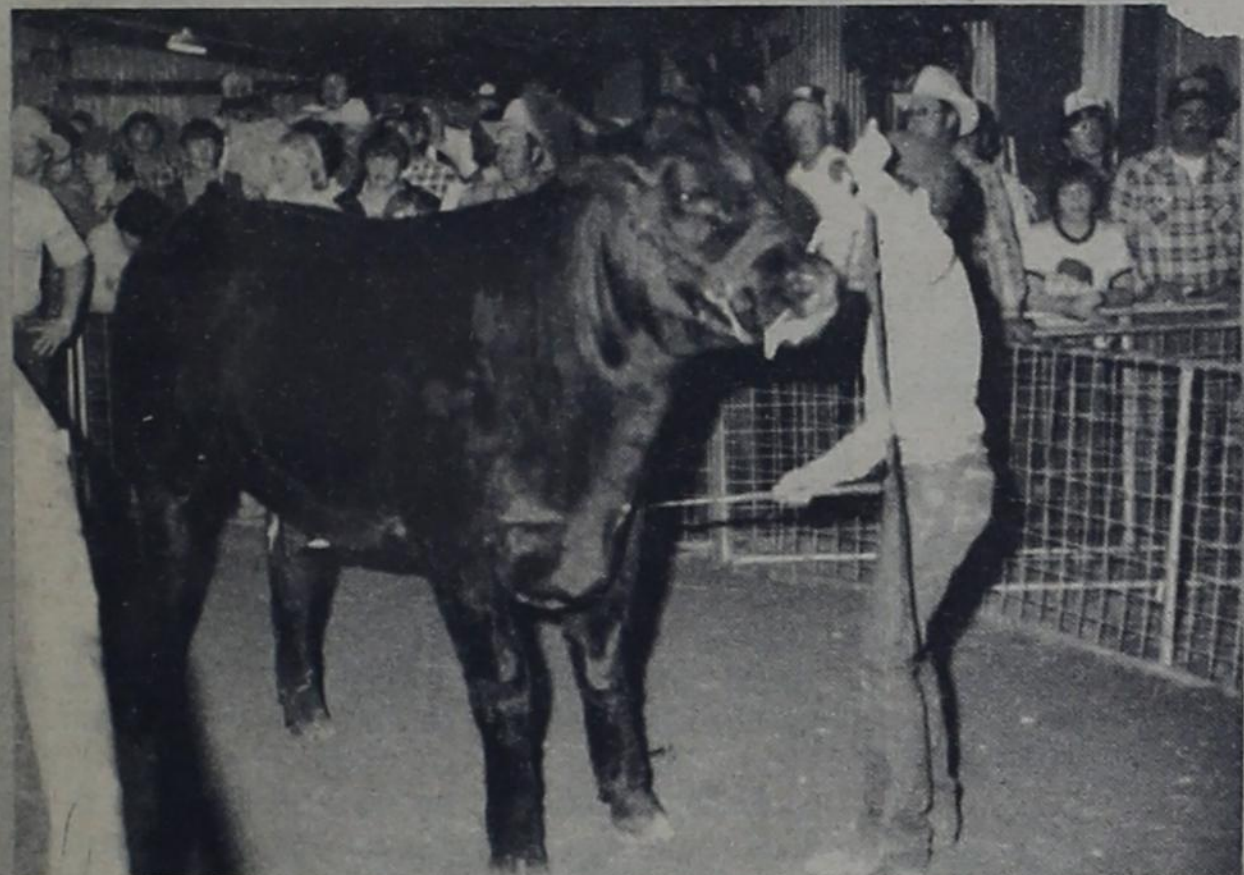

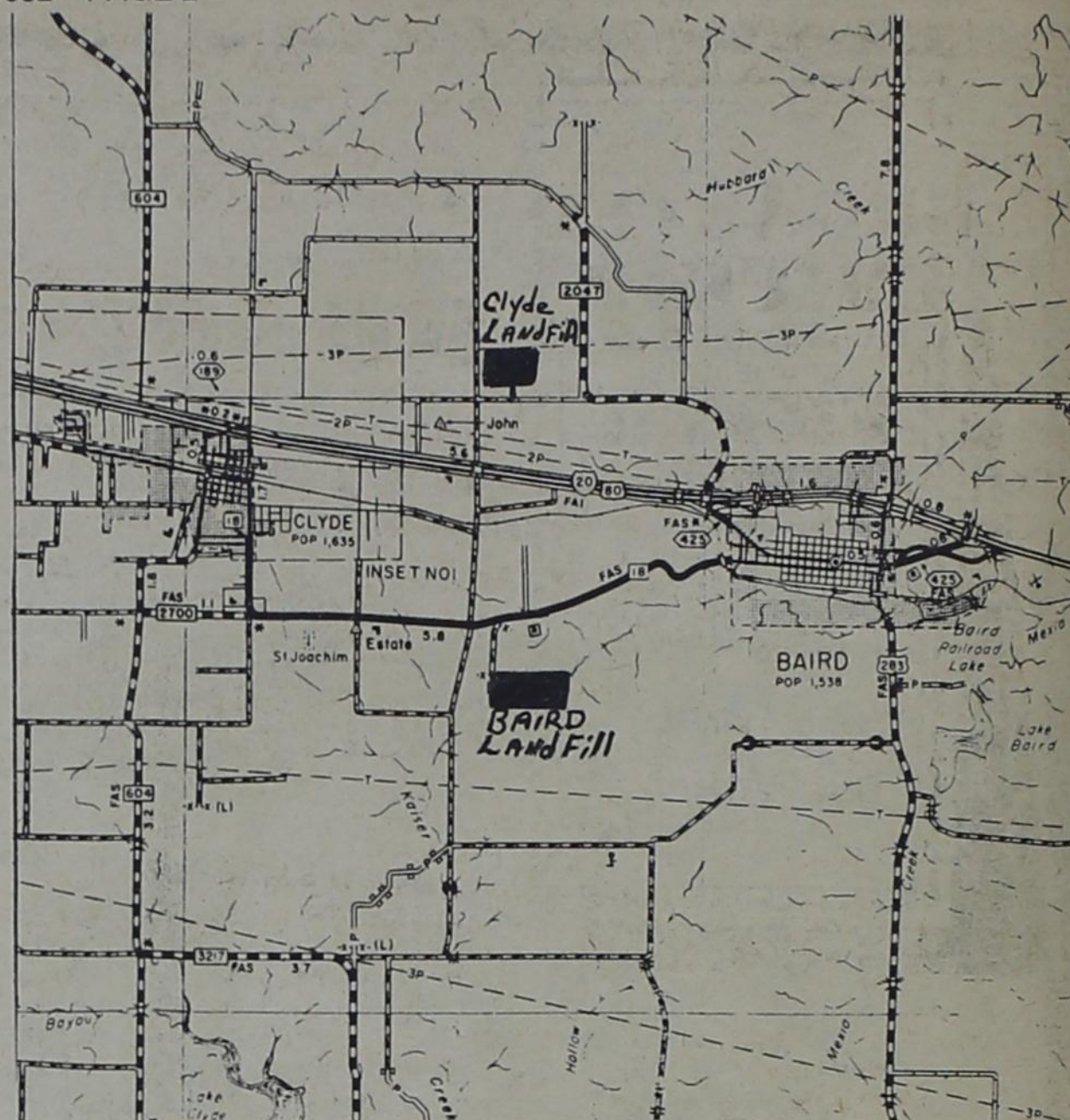

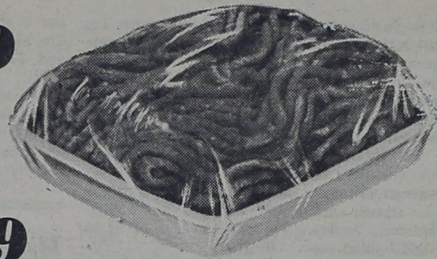

1982 Farm Program Signup Begins February 16

"We will begin accepting applications for the 1982 farm programs Feb. 16", Oran Bains, Chairman of the Callahan County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation committee, said. Sec. of Agriculture John Block recently announced acreage reduction programs for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, rice and upland cotton.

"To be eligible for loans and target price protection farmers must sign

up and comply with the acreage reduction program requirements," Mr. Bains said.

For reducing their wheat acres by 15%, farmers will be eligible for the \$4.05 per-bushel 1982 target price for wheat, a regular loan rate of \$3.55 per bushel, and grain reserve loan rate of \$4.00 a bushel.

Farmers who reduce their feed grain acreage by 10% will receive federal target prices of \$2.70

per bushel of corn; \$2.60 for sorghum and barley; and \$1.50 per bushel of oats.

According to Mr. Bains, 1982 wheat and feed grains will be eligible for immediate entry in the farmer-owned grain

reserve. Feed grain reserve loan rates are \$2.90 a bushel for corn, \$2.75 for sorghum, \$2.37 for barley, and \$1.49 per bushel for oats.

The upland cotton program offers farmers a target price of 71¢ per

pound and a loan rate of 57.08¢ per pound for reducing their cotton acres by 15%. Farmers who reduce their rice acres by 15% will be eligible for target price protection of \$10.85 per hundredweight and loans at \$8.14 per hundredweight.

"The acreage reductions and higher loan rates will help strengthen farm prices," Mr. Bains said. The land taken from production and devoted to conservation uses must be eligible cropland and protected from wind and water erosion.

"Participation in the 1982 farm programs is voluntary. However, only those farmers who take part in the program will be eli-

gible for benefits," the ASCS official said. The sign-up period ends April 16.

Petropool Inc., completed No. 1-C Sybil Dickey in the EnRe Field in Callahan County.

Location is 10 miles southwest of Baird, spotting 2,100 feet from the north and 1,525 feet from the west lines of W.H. Jackson Survey.

Daily potential was 57 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64-inch choke from an open hole at 4,402-21 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 539-1.

Union Exploration from Lamesa completed No. 5-A Luther Rogers in the Bowne Field eight miles northeast of Putnam.

Wellsite is 660 feet from the north and 1,510 feet from the west lines of Section 2050, TE&L Survey.

This gave Texas its nickname, "The Lone Star State."

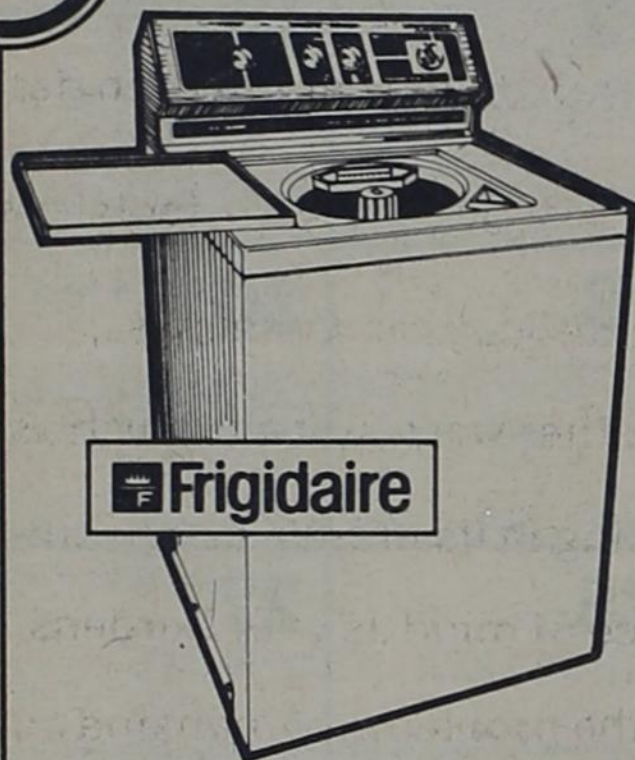

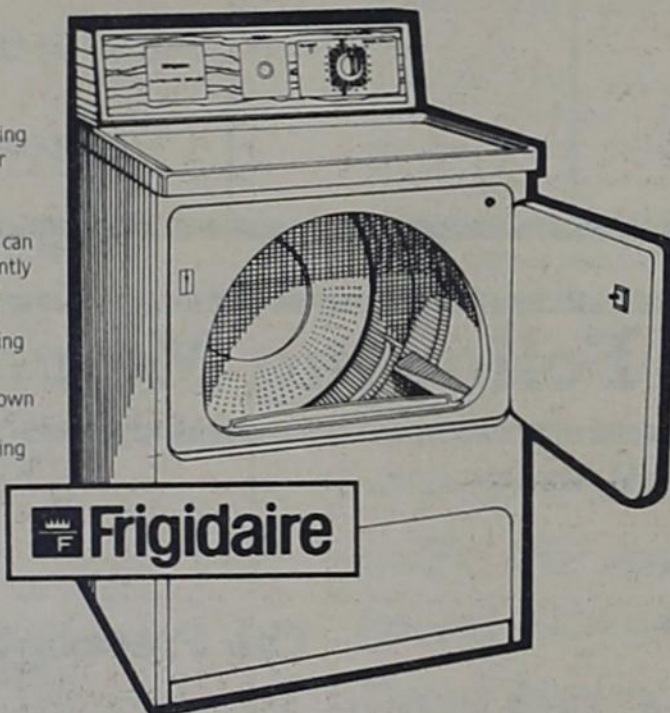

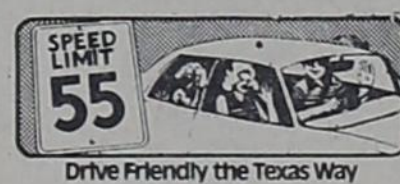

Commercial Tax Return Preparers Regulated

Commercial tax return preparers must comply with certain requirements when making out clients' returns, the Internal Revenue Service advises.

The IRS explains, paid preparers are responsible for providing a copy of the completed return to the client for his/her records when the client signs the return. Preparers are required to keep copies of returns or a list containing taxpayers' names and identification numbers for three years. These records must be available for IRS inspection during this period.

Paid preparers are also required to sign completed returns and to provide their employer identification number on the return.

Rubber stamps and signature facsimiles are not accepted by the IRS.

The handling of refund checks is also regulated. A \$500 penalty can be assessed against paid preparers who endorse, cash, or in any way negotiate a client's refund check. In addition, understanding a client's tax liability can result in a penalty of \$500 for willful understanding or \$100 for negligent or intentional disregard of rules and regulations.
