

> to protect small children. Keep curtains, draperies, and similar inflamable materials away from heaters and do not dry clothing near the heater. Wind may blow the ma terial into the flame, or it may be come overheated and ignite. Do not use gasoline, naptha or benzine for cleaning. Use some of the safer solutions now obtainable and these out of doors during the day.

Avoid gas leaks by careful check of all stoves and outlets. If escaping gas is detected, close all gas valves and cocks, shut off gas at meter and open doors and windows. Notify the gas company or a licensed plumber at once and allow no flame of any kind to be brought near the leak until it has been repaired.

All heating equipment should be inspected and adjusted by reliable firms or individuals known to be qualified experts. No one but licensed plumbers and gas experts should connect gas appliances .

Gas heaters should be attached to gas outlets with rigid metal pipe and screw connections. Loose gas cocks should be made tight or replaced. If flexable tubing is used, it should be gas tight, as the rubber dries out and causes small cracks not discern able to the eye. Gas should always be turned off at the wall as well as at the appliance. If a heater or range is moved from one room to another that the old connection is properly always make sure it is properly closed or sealed.

After fighting for and winning their independence from arbitrary English rule, the American Colonies undertook to set up a form of federal government for themselves that would protect them forever from the oppression of an all-powerful government. This was the prime reason for incorporating in our Constitution the principle of dividing the government into three separate and independent branches - the legislative (Congreas), the executive (the President) and the judicial (the Supreme Court

While ratification of our Constitudon was pending Washington, who had been chairman of the Constitu tional Convention, wrote: "My creed is simply that the general government is not invested with more powers than are indispensably necessary to perform the functions of a good government; and consequently, that no objection ought to made against the quantity of egated to it;

LOCAL FSA SUPERVISOR GIVEN FDA WORK HERE

Direction of farm debt adjustment work is now in the hands of the lo cal staff of the Farm Security Administration, in place of an itinerant supervisor who visited the county once a month, it was announced by R. E. Skipworth, county supervisor. He will handle the work jointly with the volunteer ment committee of the county.

Farmers who need help with their debts. whether they are to borrow from the Farm Security Administration or not, are eligible for this help, the supervisor said, and should come to his office to make application for this service. The committee will function as it has in the past, and farmers may contact these committeemen at any time but are particularly invited to attend the monthly meeting held in Knox County at Benjamin, at the Court House, 11-29-37, at 3:30 P. M. 11-29-37, at 3:30 P. M.

A small group of FDA specialists has been retained by the regional office for advisory work, and will spend a week at a time in each district to help with acute cases and with cases involving a great amount of technical assistance. This service is also available to farm creditors who believe an aribtrator can help clear up delinquent indebtedness. clear up delinquent indebtedness.

This group was set up by order of the President for the purpose of bringing financial advice to farm debtors and creditors, in an effort to help avoid so many foreclosures. We are no more interested in help ing the farmer who is in distress than we are the farm creditors," the supervisor explained. 



LUBBOCK, Tex. Dec. 2-Twenty six civil engineering and R. O. T. C. students at Texas Technological College made an inspection trip to the \$14,000,000 Conchas dam and reservoir project last week.

Situated a quarter of a mile below the confluence of the Conchas and Canadian rivers, between Tucumcari and Las Vegas, N. M., the concrete gravity dam. a WPA project, is being constructed for flood control. irrigation, and municipal water supply benefits. Work which is being done by U. S. army engineers. is under the direction of Capt, Hans Kramer,

Accompanying the Tech group to Conchas were J. H. Murdough, head professor of civil engineering at the college; Capt, Frank A. Pettit, head of military science; and E. V. Middleton, civil engineering instructor.
