Barney Arnold Wins Race for City Mayor



Barney Arnold was elected mayor of Knox City in the closely-contested city election here Tuesday.

Unofficial returns showed Arnold received 120 votes to 103 for his opponent, Buddy Angle. Angle has been serving as alderman.

Guy Glenn, who is completing two terms in the mayor's office, did not seek re-election.

Arnold, well known farmer, rancher and business man, is a former president of the Knox City school board and former manager of the Cotton Growers Co-op Gin.

Only alderman to win re-election Tuesday, according to the unofficial returns, was G. W. Coats, who received 140 votes. Other aldermen elected were Russell Boyd, 155 votes; E. R. Carpenter, 144; Oltis Cash, 134; and Z. E. Cone, 124.

Losing candidates, all of whom were elected aldermen in the special election in July, were Doyle Graham, 122 votes; Fuller Shannon, 119; and Ode Green, 101.

City Judge L. C. Teague, who had no opposition, polled 144 votes.

The votes will be officially canvassed at a special meeting of the city council, probably within the next few days, Mayor Glenn said this morning.

Glenn said the new officials will be installed shortly after the annual city audit is completed. The audit is scheduled for next week.

4-H Club Members Exhibit Animals in Show at Abilene

Six Knox County 4-H Club boys and girls exhibited their projects at the Abilene Fat Stock Show last week. The show was very good, with animals of outstanding quality being shown in each class, according to County Agent W. J. Bryan.

Knox County club members exhibiting in the show were James South of Benjamin, Ava Mary and Robert Taylor of Munday, Charles Todd of Truscott, Wayland Jackson and Robert Jackson of Goree.

The Knox County 4-Hers won third place in the class for a group of three steers fed under the direction of a vocational teacher or county agent. Individual placings in the nurse-fed steer show were Rodney Taylor 16th, Ava Mary Taylor 18th, Robert Jackson 21st and Wayland Jackson 25th.

In the sheep show, Charles Todd showed his cross-bred Hampshire lambs to 10th and 23rd places in a class of over 200 lambs.

James South showed the only fat barrow from the county. He made it by the sifting committee but failed to place in the ribbon (top 25) group out of 175 head of hogs.

O'Brien Wins District Volleyball Crown

The O'Brien girls' volleyball team won the District 11-B Interscholastic League tournament held in Rochester Monday and Tuesday, winning over Munday in the finals, 29-15.

Members of the team are Pansy Herring and Katrina Allred, captains, Barbara Hines, Grace Watson, Jeanette McAda, Glenda King and Georgia McAda. This was the first district win for the O'Brien girls since 1950. Coach Elvin Mathis said.

In the first round of play the champions beat Mattson 29-18. In the semi-finals they won over Goree 32-23.

The Rochester girls, pre-tourney favorites, beat Vera 35-18 to win consolation. Knox City had put Rochester in the consolation bracket in the first round of play, winning by two points. The second place winner, Munday, beat the local girls in the semi-finals Tuesday night, 35-15.

Local Man's Father Suffers Stroke

W. R. Whitten of Clyde, father of Pete Whitten of Knox City, was expected to be released from an Abilene hospital today after recovering from a stroke.

Mr. Whitten, 78, suffered the stroke about 10 a. m. Sunday while taking a morning walk some 300 yards from his home two miles south of Clyde, where he lives alone.

Unable to walk from the paralyzing effects of the stroke, and unable to make anyone hear him by calling, Whitten began to crawl the 300 yards home.

More than 24 hours later his granddaughter, Mrs. Tommy Herring of Abilene, found him, still conscious, still 100 yards from the house. Mrs. Herring summoned neighbors and took her grandfather to Abilene and to a hospital.

Mr. Whitten said he was conscious all the time and suffered more from thirst than from the stroke. His wife suffered a stroke about a year ago and lives with her son here.

The business session will consist of reports from the Board of Directors, the secretary-treasurer and from the Production Credit Corporation of Houston, which will be represented by Ellis Lanier, assistant vice president.

The terms of two directors will expire with the meeting, and the vacancies will be filled.

At the close of the business session a deep freezer will be awarded to some member of the association or to the wife of a member. Following a chuck wagon dinner the meeting will be adjourned.

The association serves farmers and stockmen in Jones, Shackelford, Haskell, Knox, King, Kent, Dickens and Stonewall counties, with offices in Anson, Stamford, Haskell, Munday and Spur.

Carl Patterson, Former Judge, Dies at Benjamin

J. C. (Carl) Patterson, former Knox County judge, died unexpectedly at his home in Benjamin Sunday at 11 a. m., of a heart attack. He had been in ill health several years.

Funeral services were held at the First Christian Church in Benjamin at 3 p. m. Monday, April 4. Rev. C. H. Richards of Santa Anna officiated, assisted by Rev. K. E. Woolley, pastor of the Benjamin Baptist Church, and M. A. Bumpas, Jr.

Mr. Patterson was born Dec. 31, 1891, near Springtown, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wesley Patterson. He moved with his parents to Knox County when he was six years.

He married Miss Lea Taylor Feb. 16, 1913, in Hawley. He served about 22 years as a Knox County official, in the offices of district clerk, county attorney and county judge.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Elton Patterson of Lubbock; one daughter, Mrs. Leona Darwin of Lubbock; two grandchildren, Carl and Ed Darwin of Lubbock; three brothers, Bailey of Spearman, Henry of Vera and Oral of Benjamin; and two sisters, Mrs. Ada Gipson of Tucumcari, N. M., and Mrs. Doyle Kenner of Crowell.

Burial was in the Benjamin Cemetery under the direction of Warren Funeral Home. Pallbearers were H. T. Melton, H. C. Stone, Pete Barnett, J. B. Eubank, Jr., of Truscott, Rip Collins and Bobby Burnett of Knox City, and Orb Russell.

Knox 4-H Boys Win Second in District Soil Judging Contest

Five Knox County 4-H members were in Wichita Falls Saturday for the District 3 Judging Contest. Teams winning top honors in this 22-county district will compete in the state contests at College Station in June. About 250 club boys took part in the district contests.

The Knox County soil judging team was composed of Daniel Brown, Clarence Decker, and Jerry and William Bellinghausen. The team was second in the contest, losing to Archer City by a very close margin. Daniel Brown was second high scoring individual in the entire contest.

Maynard Moore, Knox entry in the tractor operator contest, placed seventh. Haskell County had the top tractor operator of the contest.

All School Board Officers Re-Elected

All officers of the Knox City School Board were re-elected at the regular meeting of the board Tuesday night, it was announced Wednesday.

Officers are Guy Robinson, president, E. B. Shaver, Jr., vice president, and Horace Finley, secretary.

Robinson and R. B. Howell were re-elected board members in the trustee election last Saturday, and will serve until 1958.

At the meeting Tuesday night, after an official canvass of the trustee election ballots, the board approved all current bills and approved a report of the textbook committee on textbooks to be used in the school beginning next year.

Members decided to eliminate the use of all workbooks in the school, beginning with the 1955-56 term. The school will furnish all the necessary supplies and materials for the teachers to use for instructional purposes, in lieu of the workbooks now being furnished by the parents.

The group approved a recommendation by Supt. Chas. E. Silk that school be dismissed one day a week at 3 p. m. in order that teachers might be given an hour of school time, provided the teachers will give at least an hour to a study of the self appraisal guide to school improvements, a study that is being carried on in other schools in the state.

In a financial report to the board, the superintendent showed a net operating balance of \$9,653.07, with operating expenses to be paid from this for the remaining five months of school. In the transportation fund a net balance of \$3,761.97 was shown.

92.5 PERCENT OF PARENTS REQUEST SALK POLIO VACCINE FOR CHILDREN

Parents of 386 first and second grade students in Knox County have requested that their children be given the Salk polio vaccine series if the vaccine is approved and released by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis later this month.

Extensive tests of the vaccine are to be completed soon, and an announcement regarding its effectiveness is expected April 12.

Members of the Knox County Medical Society will give their time and the time of their assistants and will furnish syringes, needles and other material to administer the vaccine to every first and second grader in the county whose parents signed a request form. The vaccine will be furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

According to Dr. D. C. Eiland, figures show that 92.5 percent of parents of 1st and 2nd graders returned the request forms.

MRS. ROBERT GAINES RECEIVES TEACHER TRAINING

Mrs. Robert Gaines, the former Carol Anne Hitchcock, is one of nearly 300 students working this semester as student teachers in the School of Education at North Texas State College, Denton.
