## Strawn Sand Discovery Made South of Knox City

A wildcat has been completed as a Strawn Sand discovery one mile south of Knox City.

The strike is Petroleum Programs Inc. of Abilene No. 1 T.E. Robbins, Site is 1,650 feet from the north and 15,000 feet from the east lines of Section 49, Block 2, DIW Survey.

Daily potential was 100 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 4,889-99 and 4,903-07 feet.

The pay was treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 50 sacks of sand and 200 barrels of water.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,974 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,980 feet.

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
