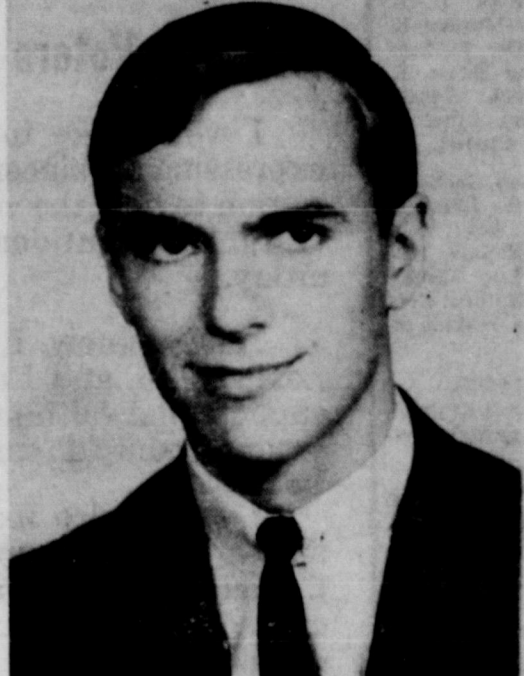

Senior Trip To New Orleans Termed "Exciting, Educational, Fabulous"

Coming home from New Orleans Sunday afternoon Becky Howell, the Senior Class reporter, asked me to write a report of the Senior Trip of 1966 for the paper. Even a short report would fill a page of the Knox County Herald so I'll try to hit the highlights.

After a delightful breakfast served to a bunch of sleepy kids and sponsors by a bunch of very nice sleepy women of the Baptist Church, we departed only ten minutes behind schedule at 6:10 a.m. Wednesday, on a Trailways Bus with Mr. Paul Foster as our driver.

Almost before we were good awake we were at Howard Johnsons on the Fort Worth-Dallas Toll Road for a coffee break. And there the first souvenirs were purchased. Our next stop was in Longview where we had lunch at Wyatt's Cafeteria. We saw Bob and Kay Harris, former resident of Knox City and everybody ate too much.

Then it was on to Natchitoches, La., where we stopped and stretched our legs. It's a beautiful little town, with a tributary of the Red River running through it.

We checked into the Holiday Inn at Alexandria about dark. It had started raining and the boys who tried the swimming pool found it a bit chilly. We had our first taste of seafood at dinner and hit the hay.

We left Alexandria at 8 a.m. Thursday and drove to Baton Rouge where we toured the Capitol building and drove through the LSU campus. The rains kept falling, the windshield wipers broke, but Paul, with the "expert" help of the boys, got them fixed and it was on to New Orleans where we had lunch at the A & G Cafeteria. Next stop was the Monteleone Hotel in the French Quarter of New Orleans.

Streets in the French Quarter were built for the horse and carriage, not even automobiles, so you can guess that Paul had quite a problem taking that Trailways bus to our destination. With a great deal of back-seat driving from David Woodall and Dean Large, he maneuvered us to the front door of the Monteleone. While we unloaded our luggage (that included two suit cases, a hanger case and a shaving kit for each boy... add a couple of hair dryers, makeup kits, pillows and luggage for the girls, plus the already accumulating souvenirs for everybody), we had traffic stacked up for approximately sixteen blocks.

The doorman at the Monteleone told us to ignore the horns

honking... we were in New Orleans and everybody took their time. He didn't know about our schedule but we appreciated his kindness. As soon as we got our belongings to our many rooms we re-boarded the bus for a tour of the cemeteries and the city park.

After dinner that evening we went on a tour of the French Quarters which is unbelievable. The streets are only 19 feet wide, the traffic never stops, the sidewalks are packed with people. There are shoeshine boys and hot dog stands. The sidewalks are cobblestone and rather hard to walk on safely and, you guessed it, the rain was still falling. We visited Pat O'Brien's, Al Hurts and the Famous Doors. And we heard lots of Dixieland Jazz. It's almost like being in another country.

The next morning we took a Grayline Bus tour of the city which was most interesting. We toured the exquisite St. Louis Cathedral, oldest cathedral in the Americas, which is now a basilica. The Cathedral is by Jackson Square where the statue of "Old Hickory" is located. Phil and Bill wanted to have their pictures made riding "double" with the famed Jackson but, as usual, it was still raining.

We saw many other interesting sites on this tour, including the Kaiser aluminum plant, the locks that connect the Mississippi River with Lack Pontchartrain and the Industrial Canal. The driver told us a great deal about the history of New Orleans and we also saw the location of the Battle of New Orleans.

We had lunch at The Court of Two Sisters which is a very beautiful place that serves wonderful food. Unfortunately by now the wind and rain was so strong we wouldn't have been surprised to have heard there were hurricane warnings up.

Due to the weather we splurged and took taxi cabs to the Mississippi River at Canal Street where we boarded the S. S. President for a ten mile ride down the big river. We saw boats from all over the world loading and unloading cargo. We discovered on that ride that Dick Lowry and Sharran Watkins would never make sailors.

That evening we had "Dinner at Antoinette" and it can only be described as fabulous. Tommy Latimer and Larry White discovered that "pommies de terre brabant" were really just fried potatoes but they were delicious. Glenn Davis and Janie Escobar found out that they didn't like

SAM E. CLONTS ELECTED COUNTY JUDGE 867-640, THOMPSON AND CYPERT IN RUNOFF FOR TREASURER

Sam E. Clonts defeated incumbent L. A. Parker, 867 to 640, for the Knox County Democratic Party's nomination as County Judge in Saturday's election.

Judge Parker was seeking his third four-year term.

In the county treasurer's race, J. T. Cypert polled 656 votes and incumbent Ed Thompson drew 436. Mrs. Omilene Barnett received 425.

A runoff will be necessary in this race.

With the count complete in all 13 Knox County boxes, in-

cumbent Rex A. Paterson, Precinct 2 county commissioner, was forced into a runoff against Bobby Roberson. Patterson received 143 votes to 132 for Roberson. The third candidate, W. W. Trainham, polled 86.

In the race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 5, Kenneth Crownover won the nomination with 297 votes. Incumbent Joe Simmons received 168 and Jerry Odom had 104.

Incumbent W. C. Glenn won the nomination for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, defeating Lee Snallum 135 to 106.

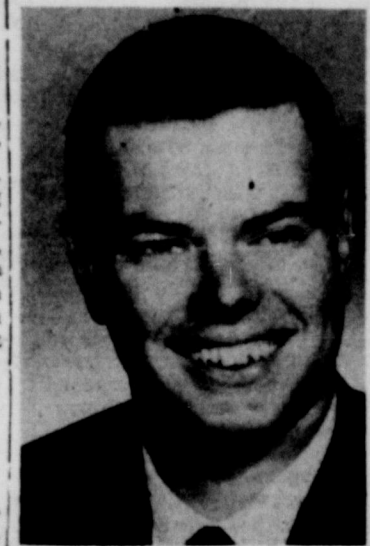

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — Although the poll tax now is officially dead, as a voting requirement, the fight over registration procedures continues.

U. S. Supreme court as expected agreed with a 3 judge federal court here that the 74

year-old levy is unconstitutional. Court already had stated in a Virginia case that a state is prohibited from placing a charge on the right to vote.

Action, however, was necessary to place in full effect the voter registration law passed by

the Texas Legislature in special session last February.

Texas voters still cast ballots next November on a proposed state constitutional amendment to "repeal" the poll tax. Same amendment provides that an annual registration system will replace the levy.

Some groups are urging defeat of the November amendment. This so that annual registration will not be built into the state constitution. They will continue their drive for permanent registration plan, whereby a voter once registered remains eligible simply by voting regularly in elections.

New Election Law Study Committee indicated it will devote much of its effort to improving the system enacted under emergency circumstances. Committee has requested that suggestions in general for amending Texas elections laws be submitted to the Texas Legislative Council before June 30.

COURTS SPEAK — Should federal court-ordered principle of equal population for congressional and legislative districts apply to county commissioners precincts as well?

State Supreme Court heard arguments on the question in a suit filed by Midland Mayor H. C. (Hank) Avey to bring the one-man-one-vote theory to precinct level. If court agrees, major changes could result in county government throughout Texas.

Opponents said Texas Constitution provides that precincts will be created "for the convenience of the people."

High Court also agreed to review a May 25 suit to void Jefferson County contracts for replacement of Pleasure Island Bridge at Port Arthur.

After a 13-week trial, a Travis County District court jury held that more than \$1,000,000 was "misappropriated" from Lumbertman's insurance corp., of Dallas as the result of a scheme involving bankers and an insurance agency owner.

AG RULES — Texas State Library and Historical Commission may make direct monetary grants to local public library units under federal act, subject to approval of state plan, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr held.

In other opinions, the attorney general has ruled that:

- Cigarette vending machines operated on a military reservation are subject to the regular permit fees.

- Residence in which the Cameron independent school district superintendent lives is tax exempt, since it is owned and maintained by the district to encourage qualified personnel, and therefore serves a "public purpose."

- Acquittal of the charge of driving while intoxicated, second offense, would bar a subsequent prosecution for driving while intoxicated, first offense.

- Registration fees may be paid for Veterans Land Board appraisers attending an appraisal school at Texas A&M.

- Trust agreement for investment of perpetual cars funds may be amended to permit in-

vestment in corporate stocks and other investments authorized by Texas Trust Act.

DPS NEEDS RECRUITS—Col. Homer Garrison, director for the Department of Public Safety, is looking for applications for the next DPS training school for patrolmen. Application deadline is June 6.

Garrison said training pay has been increased from \$375 to \$400 per month. Pay will be \$498 to \$484 upon graduation. Men between 21 and 30 are accepted for the 16-week training program. They pick their branch of service and are assigned to posts throughout Texas.

FLOOD AID SOUGHT—Governor John Connally has requested the President to declare 19 northeast Texas counties as part of a major disaster area as a result of heavy rains and floods.

His initial request for federal emergency relief funds for rehabilitation of public facilities total \$1,500,000.

The 19 counties included are Bowie, Camp, Cass, Collin, Fannin, Freestone, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Lamar, Marion, Morris, Navarro, Rains, Red River, Rusk, Shelby, Titus, and Upshur. Others may be added in a supplemental request when damage estimates are complete. At least 13 other counties suffered flood damage.

WATER — Texas water development board decided to enter a master agreement with the Sulphur River Municipal Water District, North Texas Municipal Water District, the City of Irving and the U. S. Corps of Engineers to pay part of the cost of construction of Cooper Dam Reservoir and Texarkana Reservoir.

Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, Army Corps of Engineers, has approved the Aquilla Reservoir on Aquilla Creek.

Board recommended construction of a \$23,600,000 dam and reservoir for flood control, water supply, recreation and fish and wildlife enhancement between Hillsboro and Waco.

Texas Water Rights Commis-

sion announced plans and specifications for Livingston Dam and Reservoir in Polk and San Jacinto Counties. Design calls for construction of an earthen embankment on an over-consolidated, low-strength clay. Project would be major water source for Houston.

TEXTBOOK COMMITTEE — Texas' 15 member State Textbook committee has been appointed by the state board of education. Committee has the job of evaluating more than 225 textbook offerings and deciding which five in each subject should be offered for school board adoption.

Members of the Committee are H. G. Adams, Marfa; Mrs. Hulan Armstrong, Menard; Dr. C. E. Ellison, Killeen; Dr. Morgan E. Evans, Galveston; Dr. Frances Freese, Dallas; Miss Helen L. Fulton, Spring Branch; Gerald Gafford, Snyder; Mrs. Ethel D. Greenwood, Corpus Christi.

Also, Billy H. Guinn, Jacksonville; Mrs. Betty B. Johnson, San Antonio; Dan Lea, Fort Worth; Dr. James Malone, Kilgore; Mrs. Emma Lue Mohle, Lockhart; Mack W. Mullins, Corsicana and Mrs. Alma Perkins of Canyon.

HIGHWAYS DAMAGED—An estimated \$961,000 worth of damage was done to Texas highways

in April by the floods which hit many of the states highways. Dallas, Tyler and Atlanta districts were hurt the most.

State Highway Department estimated flood damage to highways and roads in the Atlanta and Tyler areas at \$250,000 each in April, and Dallas' district (May figures not included), at

\$200,000. In other districts, damage was estimated at \$25,000, Paris, \$75,000, Fort Worth, \$75,000, Waco, \$25,000, Houston \$2,500, Yoakum, \$10,000, Austin \$11,000, Beaumont, and \$75,000 Del Rio. In the 11 months prior to May, highway damage from floods had totaled only \$360,000 for all 25 districts.
