The two phases of work for the girls this year are bread and meats and clothing. They will study the nutritive value of cereals, varieties of wheat, and

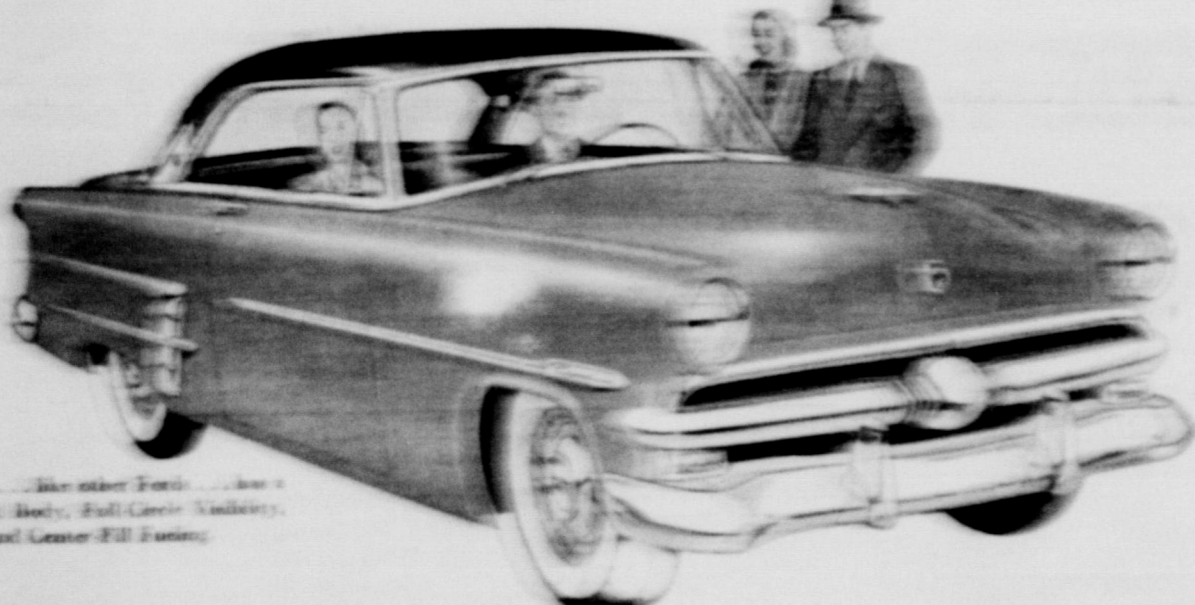
