Wylie Edges Houndettes

The Knox City Houndettes came to life in the fourth quarter Tuesday night when they met the Wylie team in bi-district play at Hawley.

The Houndettes, 7-A champs lost to the 8-A Champs 55-49. Wylie will play Saturday at 10:00 a.m. in the Region 1-A Tournament in the Municipal Coliseum at Lubbock.

In the opening quarter the powerful Wylie offensive managed to pump in 12 points before the Houndettes found the basket. The difference was never overcome until the final quarter when the KC girls got within two points of the winners.

The first quarter ended 18-7, halftime score was 34-23, and it was 45-35 at the end of the third period of play.

In the fourth quarter, Temi Baker was shifted from her regular forward position to guard and Kary Kent joined the forwards.

Coach T.R. Stillabower's Houndettes gave the KC fans some thrills and the opponents some anxious moments in the last quarter. Denise Grindstaff was high point with 26, while Temi Baker had 11, Jan Guinn 10, and Kary Kent 2.

Guards for the bi-district game included Belva Penman, Debbie Burt, Mandy Landford and Yolonda Bradford.

The Houndettes have had a good year finishing with a season record of 28-6.

Food Stamp Office Will Employ Two

The Food Stamp Division of the Texas Department of Public Welfare announces two job openings in Knox County for qualified applicants.

The Welfare Service Technician II job has a yearly salary of \$6852.00, \$671.00 per month and requires sixty hours of college work. In addition to this, a merit system test will be necessary and may be taken at the TEC office in Abilene or Wichita Falls on the second Saturday of each month.

The Clerk Typist I job has a yearly salary of \$4464.00, \$372.00 per month fulltime and at this point is a half time position that requires a high school education and a merit system test at the TEC office.

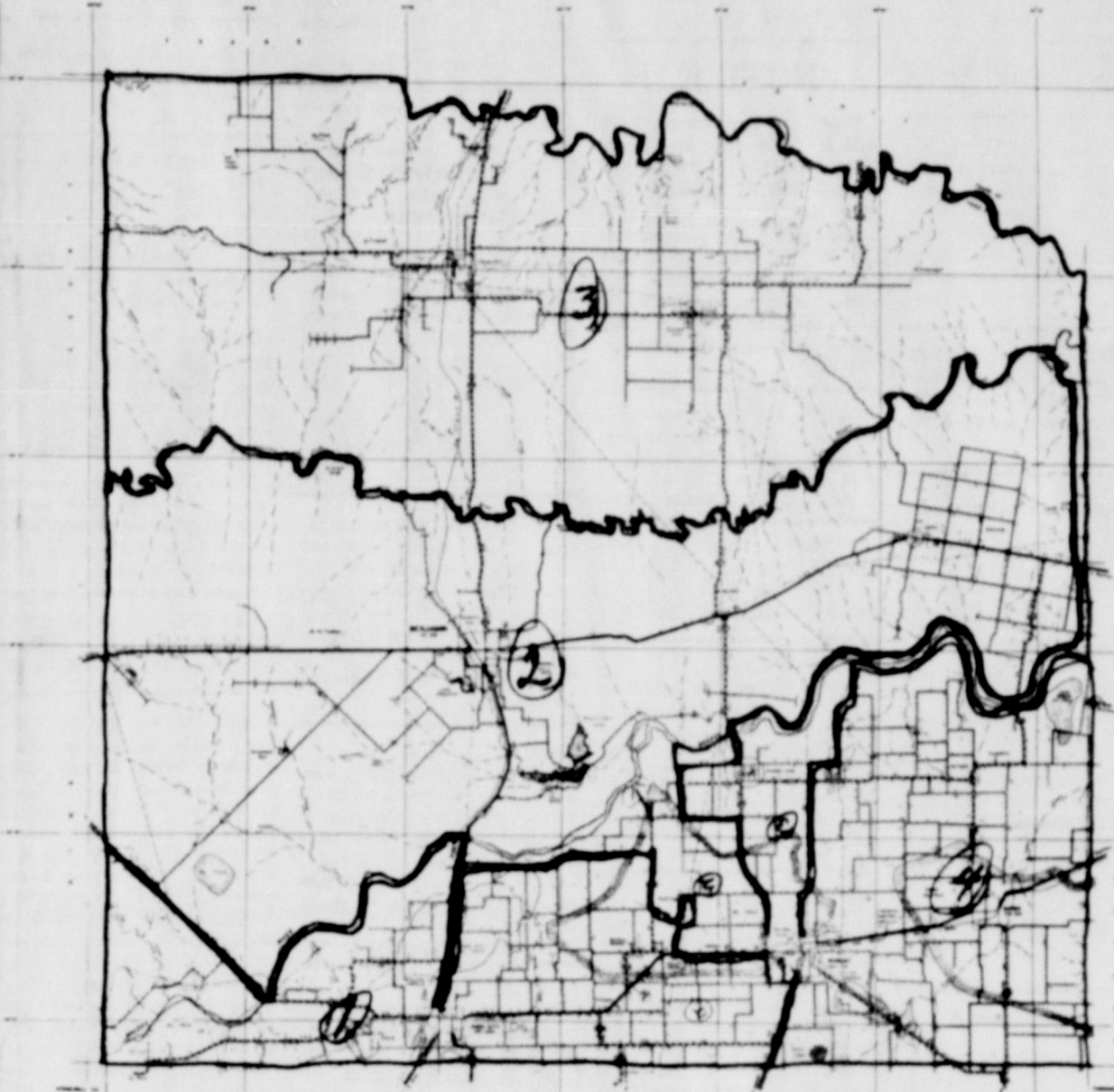
According to W. E. McKinney, program director for the food stamps division, the personnel will begin work May 1. However, the issuance of food stamps in Knox County will not begin until August 1.

The Food Stamp Office will be located in Knox City, with the address yet to be determined.

Those interested may write the Merit System Council, Box 1385, Austin, Texas 78767 for application forms for the required test.

If more information is needed it may be obtained through the local Welfare Office.

Knox County Precincts Are Redistricted

COUNTY PRECINCTS DIVIDED EQUALLY- On Friday, February 2, 1973, by order of the Knox County Commissioners Court to conform with the rulings of the United States Supreme Court on a one-man, one vote

basis, the four Knox County Precincts were divided equally according to population with approximately 1,385 persons to each precinct. According to county officials, roads and funds will be distributed equally to each precinct.

City Council Approves Rate Increase For WTU

In a regular meeting of the city council Monday night, West Texas Utilities Company's request for a six per cent rate increase was approved.

J.B. Tabor, local WTU manager, presented the request. Mayor Buddy Angle, Councilmen Carl Shelton, L.V. Worley, Celso Gonzales, Glen Rumley, Bobby Baker and Faye Railsback, city secretary, were present.

According to Mr. Tabor, West Texas Utilities Company's load is going to increase in the com-

ing years and facilities must be expanded to meet those needs. The increase for the average residential customer will amount to only 2 2-4 cents a day. As of September 30, 1972 the average residential customer used 530 kilowatt-hours per month. Since about 65 percent of WTU residential customers use less than 530 kilowatt-hours per month, their increased cost will be even less.

WTU has never had a general rate increase. They have reduced rates voluntarily 14 times with the last rate reduction in 1964.

Also meeting with the council were George Wall and Alvin Alexander, representing the Texas Highway Department to discuss extending Texas State Highway 222. Plans call for the existing highway from Munday to continue west two blocks from Egenbacher Implement then curve across to join the existing farm-to-market road from Guthrie near the Santa Fe tracks.

Redwine Services Held Here Saturday

Funeral services were held Saturday in the Church of Christ in Knox City for Mrs. Ellen Redwine, 74, a longtime resident of the Cliff community near O'Brien.

Payne Hattox, minister, officiated and burial was in the Willow Cemetery of Haskell. Smith Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Redwine died at 6:15 p.m. Thursday in the Brazos Valley care Home after a lengthy illness.

She was born on September 2, 1897 in Dale, Texas, and moved to Haskell in 1902 from Caldwell County, Texas. She married Benjamin F. Redwine in 1916 in Haskell County. Mr. Redwine preceded his wife in death on March 17, 1969, in Odessa.

She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Science Teacher To Classes Friday
