

Employment In Knox County Rose 5 Percent Between March 1964 And March 1965 According to Bureau

Employment in Knox County, rose 5 percent between March '64 and March '65 according to one of the nation's economic indicators county business patterns' 1965. Texas issued recently by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census.

County business patterns' now published annually uses payroll information gathered for the first quarter of each calendar year by the Social Security Administration covering employment in most kinds of business and industry, but excluding notably agricultural and government workers and the self-employed.

Number of employees in the County in businesses covered by the report for March 1965 totaled 583 as against 556 for the same from a year earlier. First quarter payrolls for the two years were \$478,000 and \$431,000 respectively.

Retail trade, the largest group of employers in the county, reported a March 1965 total of 254 employees and 3-month payrolls of \$163,000. Service firms, the county's second largest group of employers' had a total of 140 employees and \$96,000 in quarterly payrolls.

The county ranked 194th among the 254 counties in the state in March 1965 in number of employees in business covered in the report.

Knox County Bond Sales 82 Percent Complete for 1966

During the month of November United States Savings Bond Sales in Knox County amounted to \$7,107, according to a report received from Mr. W. E. Bradley, Chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee. To date, this county has purchased \$114,558 in Savings Bonds and this is 82 percent of the 1966 goal of \$140,000.

During the first eleven months of 1966, Savings Bond sales in Texas amounted to \$139,381,146 which is 94 percent of the state's goal of \$147.5 million. This is an increase of 5.2 percent over the same period last year.

Nationally, the sale of Series E and H Savings Bonds during November amounted to \$368 million. These sales were the highest for any November in 11 years; 9 percent higher than a year ago. The January-November sales were \$4,488 million, 7 percent over sales for the first 11 months a year ago and a 10-year record for any January-November sales since 1956, Chairman Braley stated.

Survivors include his wife of Houston; his step-mother, Mrs. Eudora Griffith of Glen Rose; a daughter, Mrs. Charles Brown of Houston; five sons, Bobby Griffith, Jerry, Jimmy and Joe Griffith, all of Houston; two sisters, Mrs. Bernice Hodges of Abilene and Mrs. Car Pool of Weimert; a brother, Fred Griffith of Roswell, N. M.; and six grandchildren.

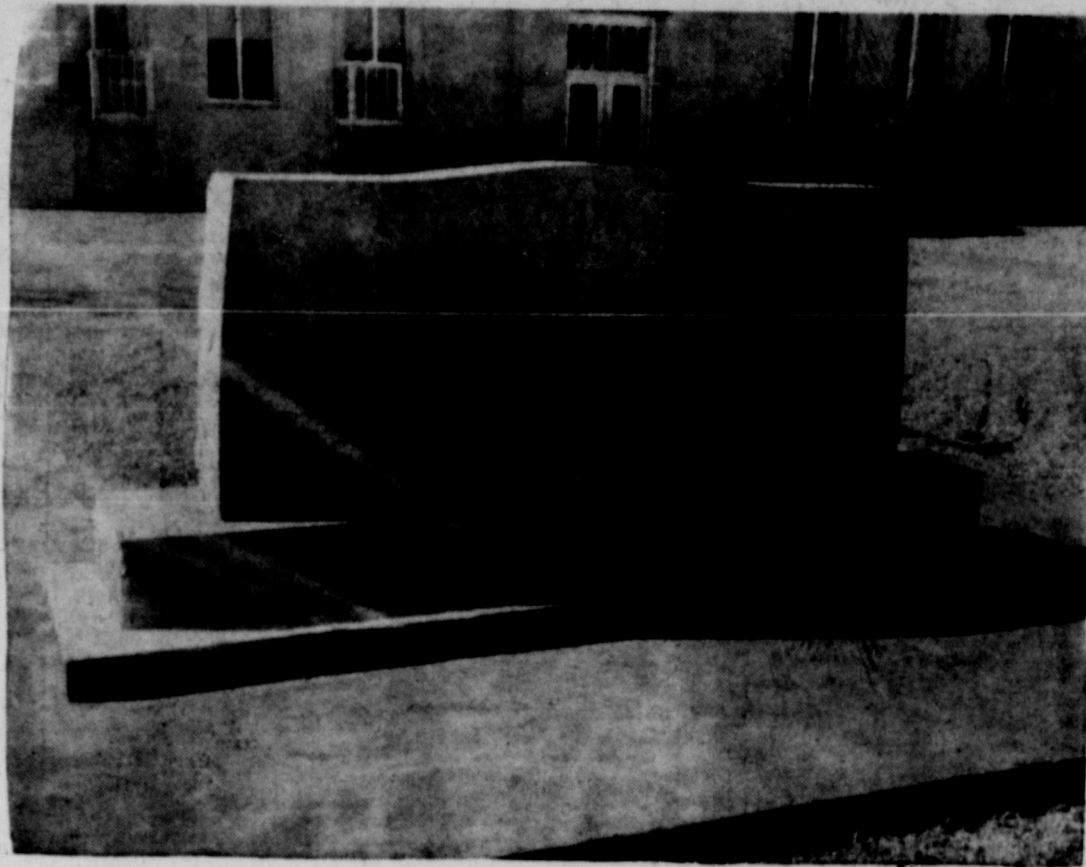

Memorial At Benjamin

Marking the history of the first settlement in Knox County.

History of First Settlement In Knox County Written Into Court House Records, In Book; Now Carved In Stone

ABOUT BENJAMIN

The history of the first settlement in Knox County is written into the records stored in the Knox County Court House in Benjamin, also in the recent publication of The Knox County History, sponsored by the Knox County Historical Survey Committee and now it is carved in marble on a memorial placed on the lawn of the Knox County Court House, by descendants of the founders.

It all began in 1884 when Hilory Green Bedford was a young man and came to Knox County and established the L-Bar Ranch.

The ranch was located northeast of the town of Benjamin, and four miles north of where Benjamin now stands were the Headquarters. Only one other large ranch was in the county at that time. That was the "W Cross" owned by a Mr. Clark of Dallas.

BEDFORD HEADS UP THE L-BAR RANCH

The L-Bar was owned by a stock company with Mr. Bedford as president. At one time they had about 8,000 head of cattle, the country was open range and for some time they did well, but in 1886 a severe drought covered this entire country and following the drought a big bizzard came and many of the cattle died. This was followed by a sharp drop in prices so the company was dissolved.

MR. BEDFORD BOUGHT SECTION OF LAND

Mr. Bedford had bought a section of land, number 242, so he decided to found a town and he sold stock to the 12 men who had helped him on the ranch. Each man was given the privilege of buying 50 acres. Mr. Bedford gave 40 acres for a town square and in 1884 the town of Benjamin was born.

Mr. Bedford was instrumental in the organization of Knox County in 1885. The first county officers were elected in 1886, the next year after the County itself was organized.

Mr. Bedford was born in Mt. Eden, Kentucky, on Nov. 9, 1840. He came to Texas when he was ten years old. His parents settled near Dallas and both died when he was about 16 years old. He lived with a sister, Mrs. Charje Milton, in Ellis County. He began working on a ranch and decided he wanted to be a rancher.

TOWN NAMED FOR FOUNDER'S SON

Bedford served for a time in The Civil War and married Miss Fannie Browder in February, 1865. He helped to organize the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in 1877 under a large oak tree near Graham, Texas. The family moved to Wise County, later to Archer County and while living there his oldest son was killed by lightning. (This was the reason he wanted to name the town he founded for his son.) He was an ordained minister of The Christian Church and wrote a book. He is buried in the Benjamin Cemetery.

NAMES ARE ENGRAVED

The following names are engraved on the east side of the memorial: Hilory Green Bedford—(Founder)

R. P. Dimmitt — J. W. Hinton — H. L. Hayes — G. B. Stewart — R. D. Goree — Rufus Browder — S. T. Cooper — A. E. Brannon — L. W. Ricketts — Ed W. Bedford — H. C. Thompson.

The memorial was sponsored by Miss Lenoir Dimmitt of Austin whose father was R. P. Dimmitt, one of the founders. She is a former librarian in Austin, Texas.

ON MARKER'S FACE

On the face of the marker these names are inscribed:

First Settlement in Knox County, Hilory G. Bedford, Founder R. P. Dimmitt, J. W. Hinton, H. L. Hayes, G. B. Stewart, T. G. Stewart, R. D. Goree, Rufus Browder, S. T. Cooper, A. E. Brannon, L. W. Ricketts, Ed W. Bedford, H. C. Thompson.

To assure these families church and school privileges, H. G. Bedford started the town of Benjamin in 1885, naming it Benjamin for his eldest son.

Alvis, son of Mrs. Vestus Alvis, told the Associated Press that "A break in the clouds opened up for us and we rolled right in."

The Navy jets used 500-pound bombs against their targets, the Dai Thui rail by-pass, which was reported destroyed.

Alvis, 40, was born in Rochester in 1926 and attended school here, graduating from Rochester High School. He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1949 and took his flight training at Pensacola, Florida, graduating from the Naval Air station in 1951. He has served as a flight leader on the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk in Viet Nam waters since he was assigned to the carrier this summer.

His wife and four children live at Lemoore, California.

RECORDS VITAL

The person who files for Social Security payments and the Social Security office have one important goal in common, Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office said today. "We want payments to start as quickly as possible," he said.

The present modern electronic data processing equipment requires exact information to speedily process an application, Mr. Draughon said. The key is for the applicant to bring needed information the first time he contacts the Social Security office. The needed information includes his social security card, an old record of age, and very important, a record of last year's earnings, such as the W-2 or income tax return if self-employed and the cancelled check.

Social Security will also need to know your wife's maiden name, her date of birth, date of marriage, and her social security number. If you have children who could be eligible for social security, either because they are under 18 or under 22 and going to school, or disabled, you need their dates of birth and proof of their age. If you had military service since 1939, bring your discharge. Know the names of your employers, if any, in the last 12 months. Know how much you have earned so far this year and how much you expect to earn next year.

If your spouse is going to file, bring information about your prior marriages, if any, such as date and place and when and where marriage ended.

Mr. Draughon urged anyone who has questions about Social Security to call or contact the Vernon office.

**STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF KNOX**

NOTICE is hereby given that the undersigned intend to apply to the Sixtieth Legislature of the State of Texas for the passage of a law, the general purpose, nature and substance of which are as follows:

Such legislation will create a hospital district under Article IX, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution with boundaries coextensive with the boundaries of Knox County, Texas.

The legislation shall provide that the District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for the needy residing within the District and shall have power through its Board of Directors to issue and sell as the obligations of such hospital district bonds for the purpose, construction, acquisition and repair or renovations of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and to levy a tax creating an interest and sinking fund to pay the interest on and principal of such bonds as same mature, to provide for the operation and maintenance of the District and its hospital system and for the purpose of making further improvements and additions to the hospital system, and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefor by purchase, lease or condemnation, provided that said tax shall not exceed 75c on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within District.

The legislation shall also provide that such District shall not be created unless or until an election is held at which such election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxing electors the proposition of whether or not Knox Hospital District shall be created with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75c on a \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within such District, and providing for the assumption by said District of all bonds heretofore issued by Knox County for Hospital purposes and a majority of the qualified property taxing electors vote in said election in favor of the proposition.

The legislation shall further provide that the management and control of the District shall be vested in the Board of Directors composed of seven members, the initial members of which shall be appointed by the Commissioner's Court of Knox County and their successors to Board positions numbered one through four shall be appointed, one person from each of the four Commissioners' Court precincts of Knox County by the Commissioners' Court for staggered terms annually, and Board positions numbered five through seven shall be elected for staggered terms annually.

The above enumeration of provisions to be contained in such legislation is not intended to be exclusive but only to express the general purpose, nature and substance thereof. Such legislation will also make other provisions and confer other powers in connection with the general purpose and nature thereof above stated.

WHO MUST FILE A FEDERAL INCOME TAX RETURN

Everyone under 65 years of age whether single or married, who is a citizen of the United States and had gross income of \$600 or more during the year must file a return, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the IRS for northern Texas advised taxpayers today.

If you are 65 or older on the last day of your tax year, no return is required unless gross income was \$1,200 or more. If you are under the above figures, you should file a return to obtain any refund due of income tax withheld from salaries or wages.

Businessmen, farmers, and other self-employed persons must file a return if net earnings from self employment were \$400 or more.

Document No. 5107, which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

A HEAVENLY TORTE FOR FROZEN FRUIT

Thanks to today's modern frozen food industry, many of our favorite fruits are available all year at food stores throughout the country. Once restricted to brief seasons, they now can be enjoyed at any time at economical prices.

One excellent way to serve frozen fruit is in this delicious Viennese torte. The dessert is foolproof, easy to assemble and outstandingly good. Frozen raspberries are suggested in the recipe, but other frozen fruits such as strawberries, blueberries, peaches or mixed fruits may be substituted.

RASPBERRY TORTE

- 5 eggs, separated
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup zwiebach crumbs
- 1 cup grated blanched almonds
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen raspberries
- 1 pint heavy cream

Beat egg whites with salt until stiff but not dry. Beat egg yolks with vanilla until thick and lemon colored. Gradually beat in sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time. Gradually fold in beaten egg whites, zwiebach crumbs, almonds and baking powder.

Divide batter equally between two prepared 9-inch layer cake pans (first grease bottoms, line with wax paper and grease again). Bake in preheated moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 25 minutes, or until deeply browned and cake springs back when lightly touched. Cool layers in pans placed on wire racks for 5 minutes. With sharp knife, cut cake away from sides of pans. Turn out on racks. Remove wax paper. Cool thoroughly.

When ready to assemble torte, cut each layer crosswise into two layers. Defrost raspberries. As soon as they can be separated, place about a dozen berries in a small dish and return to freezer for later use as garnish.

Thoroughly drain defrosted raspberries. Whip cream until stiff, then gently fold in drained berries. Spread mixture between torte layers and on top. Garnish with reserved frozen berries. To serve, cut into wedges and accompany with remaining whipped berry mixture.

Makes 1 9 inch torte.

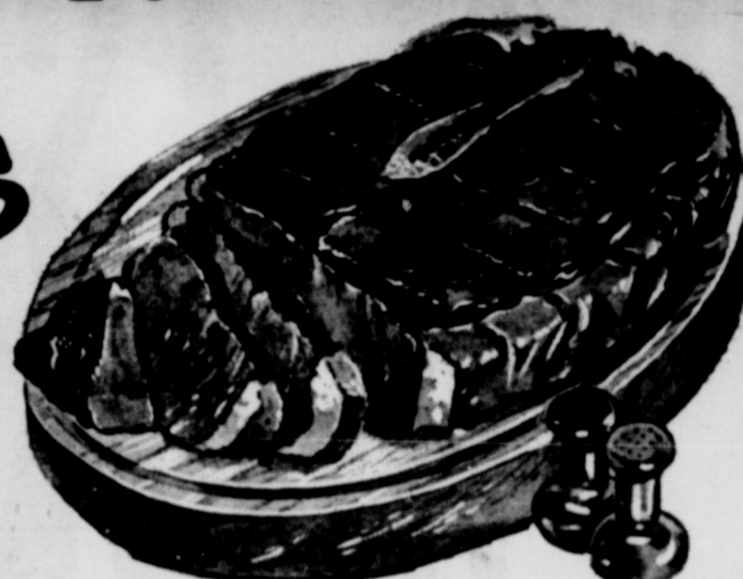

BACK OF MEMORIAL

On the back of the memorial are these words:

L-Bar Ranch. In 1884 H. G. Bedford formed the Wichita and Brazos Stock Company to own and operate the L-Bar Ranch, retaining 51 per cent of the stock. He was secretary. Many of the first settlers of Benjamin sold their land and cattle to the company and became stockholders.

The Company maintained a herd of some 8,000 cattle on operation in western the Wichita and Brazos Rivers. Headquarters were 4 miles northeast of the Narrows.

John Ed Jones ranch. The company brand was 'S' on the left side. The ranch prospered until winter of 1886 when severe drought and blizzard conditions (referred to as 'The Big Die') of the 80's caused the loss of many cattle. Thus combined with sharp drop in prices caused the dissolution of the company. And disposal of the Ranch. Erected in 1966 in tribute to H. G. Bedford and the other first settlers.
