The single row picker will cover an acre in one and one-half hours. The double row picker covers two acres in the same time. Ten of the single row pickers were manufactured this year and two have been purchased and are in use on the South Plains.

With cotton yielding three-fourths of a bale per acre, it is estimated that the cost of picking is \$5 per bale According to careful checks, 95 per cent of the open cotton was picked. Green, unopened bolls as left on the stalks. The samples of cotton gathered by the picker is much better than when cotton is "pulled." Cotton left by "stripping."

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


