

Funeral Held At Benjamin for W. M. Headrick

Funeral services for William Manuel Headrick were held at the Benjamin Baptist Church Thursday, May 10, at 4:00 p. m., with Rev. Smith, pastor of the church, officiating.

Mr. Headrick passed away at the Knox County Hospital on Tuesday, May 8.

He was born Sept. 4, 1868 in Bridgeport, Tenn. On August 5, 1899 he was married to Miss Rachel Lue Smith and during this union of 52 years ten children, seven girls and three boys, were born. Eight of the children survive.

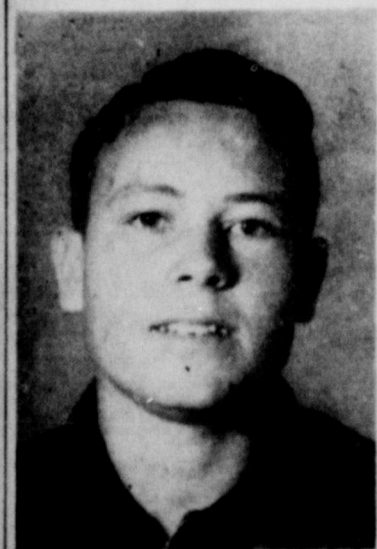
In fact, music has been rampant in town since the last week of April when 27 students played in the regional piano tournament held at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Lyndon Johnson Named as Possible V-P Candidate

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson is being mentioned in Washington as the choice for Democratic vice-presidential candidate in 1952.

An article about the senator in the current issue of 'The Saturday Evening Post' says, "He has, in fact, the perfect personality for Capitol Hill: a grass-roots hominess blended with just enough city sophistication."

His personal charm has won him friends on both sides of Congress. Recently Republican Floor Leader Kenneth Wherry, yielding to Johnson's persuasions in connection with a bill to save West Texas long staple cotton, remarked, "I'd rather do business with you than anyone else on your side."

The greatest part of Johnson's success is attributable to his tremendous capacity for work and the willingness with which he uses it.

"Besides looking out for the Lone Star State," says the article, "Johnson functions as a Democratic whip in the Senate, a post in which he acts as assistant majority leader. He is also a member of the strategy-planning Democratic Policy Committee in the Senate, and of the Interstate Commerce and Armed Services committees."

To these he recently added another important job as chairman of the powerful Armed Services Sub-committee on Preparedness.

Until the outbreak of the Korean War Johnson was content to limit his speeches on the Senate floor and win votes in the cloakroom, observes the article, then he made several penetrating and timely talks on the Government's "makeshift mobilization."

He beat the other Senators to the punch by proposing the establishment of the preparedness investigating committee and was appointed its chairman.

To his credit it can be said that he maintains the unique practice of calling government officials into closed committee sessions before attacking them in a report, to give them a chance to refute the charges if they could.

Oil Notes--

(Note: Some of the reports in this column are as of the Monday preceding publication, while others are unofficial reports obtained locally on Wednesday or Thursday.)

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 C. A. Richardson, set 5 1/2 inch pipe in Palo Pinto reef formation at 4260 feet. Drilled plug Monday, and after washing hole with oil, well flowed 9 barrels of oil per hour through 10-64 choke. Waiting on potential.

Skelly Oil Co. No. 1 Howell, drillstem test at 5159-70 feet, with tool open 3 hours, recovered 270 feet of gas, 210 feet of oil cut mud, 270 feet of salt water. Drillstem test at 5532-44, open 3 hours, recovered 470 feet of gas, 50 feet of heavy oil and gas cut mud, 15 feet of very heavy oil and gas cut mud, and 5 feet of free oil. B.H.P. was 950 in 30 minutes. This test was in the Caddo, which was topped at 5525. Operators cored the conglomerate at 5695-57-18, with no show reported. Drilling below 5916.

Stanolind No. 1 G. F. Stubbs, after reacidizing with 2000 gallons, swabbed 20 barrels of oil in 8 hours, with no water. Waiting on potential.

Katz & Venable No. 1 Lorentzen, in northeast Stonewall County, on drillstem test at 4896-4905 feet, had gas to surface in 2 1/2 minutes, oil in 17 minutes. Bottom hole pressure was 2040 pounds, maximum flowing pressure 950. Operators plan to set pipe at 4894 feet.

T & P Coal and Oil Co. No. B-4 McGregor, drilling below 4100 feet.

Rowan & Hope No. 1 T. P. Clonts drilling below 5030.

H. O. Grace Drilling Co. of Wichita Falls is rigging up on location for Oil Associates Inc. No. 1 Myrtle White, a mile northwest of town. Contract calls for drilling to begin not later than Sunday, May 20.

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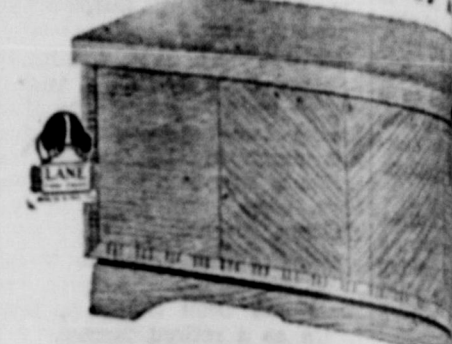
SMITH-DOXEY BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO FARMERS

Applications for the Smith-DoxeY cotton services have been mailed to county agents for every group of farmers organized for cotton improvement, according to H. J. Matejowsky, who is in charge of the Abilene cotton classing office, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

"Farmers can get their 1951 cotton crop classed without paying a fee and USDA market prices mailed them every week without cost, if they belong to a cotton improvement group," Matejowsky said.

Congress provided for these USDA services in the Smith-

DoxeY Act, passed in 1937, to encourage farmers to grow improved varieties of cotton particularly adapted to their soil. "Applications should be returned to this office as soon as all farmers in the group have
