## Hears Report Water Tax Levy

Beecher said the delay from the two year schedule cannot be attributed as the fault of anyone. Every effort possible has been expended to expedite construction, but a new "Act" passed by the 91st Congress, additional rules by the State and Health Departments, and all having to be complied with made it a very time-consuming task.

Beecher concluded by saying that they were aware of being subjected to criticism by a 1972 tax levy, but that the project would be under construction and the taxpayers could see their tax dollars going for an area water supply.

Also meeting with the council was Guy T. White, division manager of the Lone Star Gas Company in Seymour and local manager Bill Price, Mr. White presented his company's request to the council for an increase in local rates. No action was taken on the request for an increase until further study can be made.

In other action, the council reviewed the recently completed city audit and attended to routine matters before adjourning.

## Action Promised At Little Britches Rodeo

A "Little Britches Rodeo" has been scheduled for 8:00 p.m. Saturday June 17 in the new Brazos Valley Recreation Arena, south of Knox City on the O'Brien highway.

Two divisions will include ages one to eleven years of age, and another for the 12 to 14 year olds. Events will include shetland bareback riding, steer riding, calf scramble, break-a-way roping, barrel racing, flag racing and pole bending.

An entry fee of \$3.00 will be made in these two divisions.

A third division will be the girls' open barrel racing and pole bending with an entry fee of \$7.00 with \$5.00 jackpot, and break-a-way calf roping and steer riding for 19 and under.

Each contestant will be required to furnish a minor's release with parent's signature. These forms may be obtained at the arena Saturday night.

The event is being sponsored by the Brazos Valley Recreation Association and stock producer is Rusty Welch of Seymour.

Trophies will be awarded to winners in each event, according to Joe Boone.

All interested contestants must register by 7:00 p.m.

## Clyde Graham To Head Regional SCS Operations

Clyde W. Graham of Temple will head the Soil Conservation Service's South Regional Technical Service Center at Fort Worth, according to an announcement made May 17 by SCS Administrator Kenneth E. Grant. He will be Grant's representative for the 11-state South Region.

Graham, 52, a native Texan has been SCS State Conservationist for Texas since 1969. He is a 1943 graduate of Texas A & M with a degree in agricultural engineering. In 1958 he received a master's degree in public administration at Harvard.

States in the South region are Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Texas.

After graduation from college, Graham entered the Air Force where he attained the rank of captain, and served in the European Theater during World War II.

He began his SCS career as an engineer at Sweetwater and Nolan, in 1946. From 1948 to 1955 he held the position of area engineer, watershed planning staff leader, and watershed conservationist at Brady, Saba, and Brownwood.

In 1956-67 he was budget analyst in the SCS national office in Washington, but returned in 1958 to become Assistant State Conservationist (watersheds) in the state office at Temple. In 1964 he became Texas' Deputy State Conservationist, but returned to Washington in 1966 to become Director of the Watershed Planning Division.

He returned to Temple in April, 1969, to assume the duties of the state's top SCS position shortly after the death of H.N. Smith who had been State Conservationist since 1953.

Graham is married to the former Miss Dorothy Hunter of Valley View, Texas. They have three children, William, Susan, and Janet. They are members of the United Methodist Church. Graham is also a Mason, a member of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers, a member of the Soil Conservation Society of America, and he is a registered professional engineer in Texas.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L.W. Graham of Knox City.

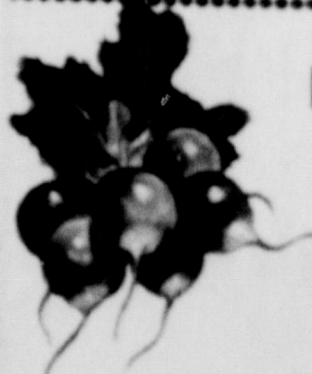

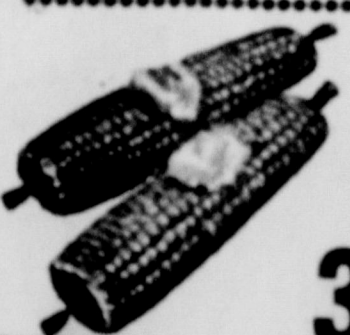

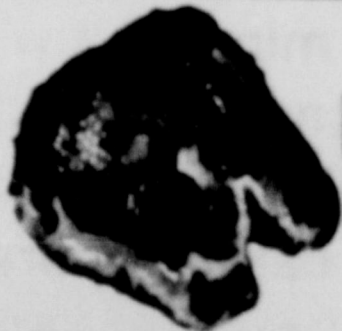
