



## **MOMENTS** WITH MOORE

This week is a busy one with two important events happening: High School Graduation and Memorial Day. And it seems poignantto me that these two events should come so close together.

High School graduates as a whole believe that they are now "mature" have nothing more to learn and are ready to take on the world and it's challenges.

And this is fine and right and naturally so---if they knew what might be facing them, how could

they go on? And what is facing them is life---the happy and the sad, the fun and the work, the uplifting and the desparing----the

stark and the real. Life and death and decesions related to both are facing them.

Do our graduates know alot? Yes, indeed. I have no doubt most of them know more math than I'll ever know. But now they are faced with the question of how will this knowledge serve them.

Which is what Memorial Day points up to us. We have this day to honor the men and women who have given their lives for our country. And for the most part, they were young people. The Vietnam War was the real "Children's Crusade" vote mostly by 18 and 19 year old boys, and served by 20 and 21 year old female nurses.

But every other war has been fought by viritually a force of young people whether WWII or WWI, the Spanish American War, The Civil War or the Revolutionary War. Even the Texas Revolution of 1836.

Mostly young folks, although these other wars had a greater mixture of 20 and 30 year olds included in the

fighting. (The battle Gettysburg had a fellow in his 70's fight, and then he lived to come back to the 50"s Reunion!)

But the point is, that in the generations past, young people grew up and were ready and eager to face the world, to create their lives, but things happen. Life happened, the time and place they lived happened, the political and social climate of their times happened, and then these young people made important life changing----and eventually, life ending decesions.

They volunteerd or, when drafted, they respected their call and came. They laid over to the side all their dreams and hopes and plans to answer a call to help others, to contain an evil, to protect freedom and home and liberty and

And in dying, they gave up their dreams, and hopes and their possiblities. But in so doing, they passed them on to us---those who remain, the living.

their loved ones. And

they died in doing so.

If these war dead could speak, I imagine they would tell us not to squander opportunities, not to hold back out of fear when

faced with challenges. They would tell us to laugh deeply and alot, and to breath in the joy of our friends and loved ones, and to enjoy the sights and sounds of

God'd beautiful world. They'd tell us to savour the taste of our food and drink and to see all and experience all that we can in life, and to do all we must do to prevent another young man or young woman from ever having to give their life on

They know the price of the sacrifice, and those that loved them and who are left without them, know the price.

Graduates enjoy your day! But in the days to come don't forget that it came because others stood up and sacrificed so you could have it.

## Craft Recipe .....

#### Bread Dough: Play with itbut don't eat it!

Make your own modeling clay!

#### GET READY...

(Basic bread-to-glue ratio.)

- · One slice of white bread
- · One tablespoon of white craft glue

· Food coloring

#### GO!

For each slice of white bread, mix in one tablespoon of white glue. Mix and knead until bread forms a dough that holds together. Add more glue if dough is too dry. Add more bread if dough is too wet and sticks to your fingers.


To color the dough, make a small indentation in the center of the dough. Add a few drops of food coloring in the center. Fold the dough over and begin to work the color into the dough. (Hint: Plastic food-service gloves will protect your hands from food coloring.) Repeat the process until desired color is reached. Use the dough as you would any clay. For instance, roll it out and cut out shapes using cookie cutters, let them dry, then decorate as desired.

#### **BUTTON BUZZ SAW**

A great activity for parties!

This idea is "older than the hills," but still lots of fun. See who can make the most noise with their homemade buzz saws! You will need a large two-hole button and about two yards of string. Thread one end of the string through each hole and tie ends together in a knot,


making a continuous loop. With the button at the center of the string, put one end of the loop



around the middle finger of each hand. Spread your hands apart and swing the button in a circle 30 to 40 times until the string is twisted tightly. Then move your hands together and apart so that the string winds and unwinds, making the button spin until it hums like a buzz saw!

#### RING AND PIN

Ring and Pin is a Native American game. The pins were pointed sticks, and the rings were made from bones or flat pieces of wood with a hole at the center. You can use a ring of cardboard and a stick or dowel, fastened together with string, as shown. The player holds the pin in his or her hand, brings the end up sharply to toss the ring into the air and tries to catch it with the pin. Players may each have several tries. As you get better, make the ring smaller and smaller.

## **Creature Feature** Giraffic Park

by Neil B. Schanker

Have you ever seen a giraffe at the zoo? If you have, I bet you had to look way up, because giraffes are the tallest animals in the world! Giraffes average between 14 and 17 feet tall. To see how tall they are, imagine three adult people standing on top of

each other!


What makes giraffes so tall? It's not their bodies, which are smaller than most horses' bodies. Their front legs, however, are nine feet tall and their hind legs stretch six feet. And, giraffe necks are about six feet long! Why do giraffes have such long necks? The remains of ancient animals are called fossils. Fossil scientists (paleontologists) have discovered that long ago, giraffes actually had short necks! During this time, long ago, one giraffe family, just by chance, had babies that had necks which were slightly longer than average. When these longer-necked babies grew up, they could eat tree leaves that the shorter-necked giraffes could not reach. Some of the shorternecked giraffes could not get enough to eat and died. When the longer-necked giraffes had

babies, the babies inherited the longer necks and survived well. Many years later, some babies were born that had even longer necks! They could eat tree leaves that no other giraffes could reach. They had plenty to eat and passed on their long necks to their babies. Giraffes that had shorter necks often died. After many more years, only the giraffes with very long necks lived and had babies. Do you see why today, giraffes have very long necks? The long legs of giraffes came about in the same way. And so did the giraffes' 17-inch long tongues! How many neck bones do you think a giraffe has? Only seven, the same number of neck bones people have, but of course, a giraffe's neck bones are longer!

Giraffes live in Africa. They live in grasslands with scattered trees. This kind of habitat is called a tropical savanna. Other animals that live in the giraffes' neighborhood are elephants, zebras and antelopes. Being the tallest, giraffes act as lookouts and alert their neighbors when lions, their main predator, approach. Giraffes can defend themselves by kicking and can run at 30 miles per hour!

Next time you go to the zoo, take a good l-o-n-g look at a giraffe. They are amazing animals!

#### YOU CAN MIX BUSINESS AND PLEASURE

Business travel can be a grind. But with proper planning, it's possible to combine a business trip with a short personal vacation and still keep your tax

For example, let's say you fly to a three-day business meeting somewhere in the U.S. and you stay for one day of recreation after the business portion of the trip is over. Since your trip was primarily for business, the entire airfare is tax-deductible, even though the airfare also gave you the opportunity to enjoy a personal day.

Here's another example: let's say you have out-oftown business meetings on Friday and Monday. If it would cost more to return home for the weekend than to stay over, your weekend meals and lodging can be treated as tax-deductible business expenses. What if you arrive on Saturday for a Monday business meeting? You can still write off your weekend food and lodging, if you can show that it cost you less to arrive on Saturday and stay overnight, compared to the cost of traveling on Sunday or Monday.

With foreign trips, all travel costs generally must be allocated between tax-deductible business and nondeductible personal expenses. However, no allocation is required if your foreign trip meets one of three conditions: the trip lasts for seven days or less, less than 25% of the trip is spent on personal matters, or you can show that a personal vacation was not a major consideration in making the trip.

The tax rules are even more complicated if you travel with a spouse or take a cruise. If you are planning a trip and would like advice on its taxdeductibility, give me a call.

#### Wayne Sellers **Area Pioneer Publisher Honored By WT Journalists**

By Jack Scott Wayne C. Sellers, retired publisher of the Palestine, Herald, who began his newspaper career with the Rising Star Record 65 years ago, was honored in Austin Friday

by Texas University.

Sellers, former president of Texas Daily Newspaper Association and oldest member of the U.T. School of Journalism's advisory board, was saluted for his many years of service to Texas University and its College Communications.

Sellers and his late wife, Camilla, maintain a scholarship which is awarded annually to a qualified U.T. student who in-

tends to pursue a career in journalism. The award was endowed in memory of M.S. (Doc) Sellers, once widely known and legendary publisher of the Rising Star Record from the early 1920's until after World War II. He was the father of last week's honoree.

In acknowledging

the recent honor conferred upon him the retired publisher said, "To quote a Biblical phrase, 'Its a mountaintop experience."

As he accepted a commentary plaque Sellers said to friends and UT professors gathered for the ceremony, "As you known, I have always been interested in journalism education. My dad never graduated from high school but was one of the greatest newspapermen I ever knew."




