After remodeling, and paneling much of the wall space, the interior was repainted in vanity yellow, and tweed carpets in shades of yellow and avocado green has been installed. Gail previously attended Texas Tech University while Ray attended Tarleton.

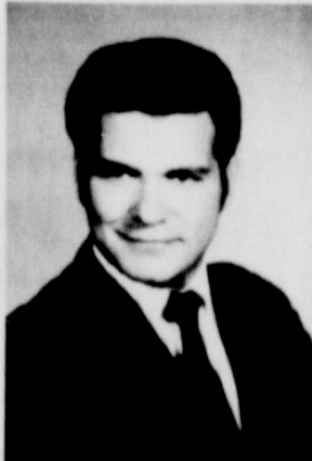

## Driver Injured Sun. When Van Overturns

A Smith Funeral Home ambulance, along with fire trucks and wreckers, answered a call from the Knox County Sheriff's office Sunday afternoon about 5:00 o'clock, when an accident occurred 15 miles west of Benjamin, involving a Bruce and Son moving van from Plainview. The van reportedly overturned after blowing out a front tire.

The driver, James R. Hargraves of Plainview, who was pinned in the wreckage, was crushed from the hips down, but did not lose consciousness. Helpers were able to free him, with the exception of his left leg, with jacks and prying bars. The wrecker lifted the front axle of the truck and a hole was cut in the bottom of the truck, in order that a chain could be tied around the truck seat. The man was removed when the seat was pulled loose from the instrument panel.

Frank Rossie, also of Plainview and a rider in the truck, suffered head lacerations. The men were taken to Seymour Hospital Authority by Smith Funeral Home ambulance where they were treated and Hargraves was transferred to Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls for treatment by a specialist.

Investigating officers were Sheriff H.C. Stone of Knox County, Paul Vinson, King County Sheriff, and an unidentified highway patrolman.

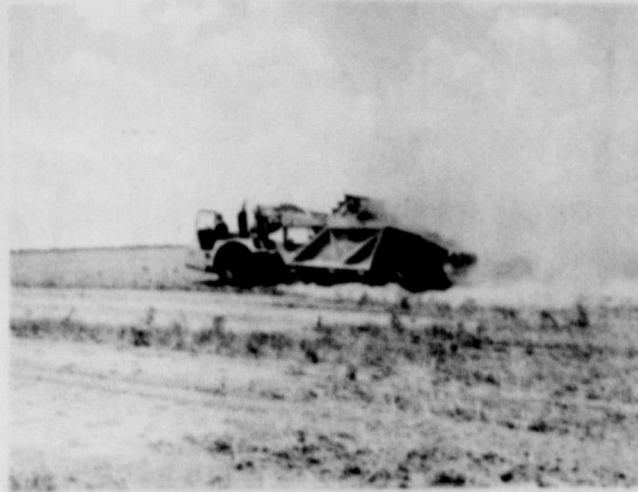

## Rural Accidents Total Nine For County In July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of July, according to Sergeant J. W. Garner, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1971 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in one person killed, and 50 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July 1971, shows a total of 564 accidents resulting in 38 persons killed and 324 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, 28 more fatalities, and 38 more injured than during June.

The 38 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Wise, 8; Donley, 5; Wheeler, 4; Lamb and Wichita, 3 each; Oldham, Clay and Lubbock, 2 each; Deaf Smith, Hall, Farmer, Potter, Archer, Dickens, King, Palo Pinto, and Young, 1 each.

The 38 traffic fatalities in July have been the most that have been recorded during any month of 1971.

## Public Hearing On Treating Seeds To Be Conducted Sept. 7

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a public hearing September 7 to establish regulations concerning the labeling of treated seeds. The meeting is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. at the John H. Reagan Building in Austin.

Presiding over the gathering will be Bill Staffel, director of the TDA's Seed Division. Staffel will outline the proposed guidelines for labeling of treated agricultural and vegetable seeds. The TDA has been working on the regulations since the passage of Senate Bill 457 in the last legislature. The bill, which defined "treated" seeds, called for the Commissioner to make labeling rules and to promulgate the rules through a public hearing. Prior to the act, there was no seed treatment labeling requirement in Texas. Commissioner White advised

all parties interested in the new labeling requirements to attend the meeting.

### BEPC Board Of Directors To Aid Ecology Program

The Board of Directors of the Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc. recently took definite steps to protect and preserve the natural environment within its area of operations. The Board passed a resolution giving itemized instructions to the management and operating staff on BEPC for carrying out a planned program of ecology to meet all standards provided in the National Environmental Policy Act.

BEPC General Manager Hollis Dalton said the cooperative has always had a policy of carrying out its construction and operations plans in a manner which would disturb natural surroundings as little as possible but will step up these plans to meet the growing needs of the preservation of America's beauty and the habitat for wildlife and fish.

"In the past," Executive Manager Ross Segrest said, "we haven't had to worry too much because most of our construction was in thinly settled areas. But with more and more people living in the area served by BEPC and with larger generating plants being constructed, we will do some detailed planning to protect the natural surroundings and to blend our construction with that of nature."

The resolution passed by the Board instructed the staff to:

1. Conduct those studies necessary to obtain a complete

ing an incentive to customers who complete calls themselves. Another change in the calling structure will establish rate periods for day, evening, night and weekend calls within the state which are the same as those now in effect for calls going outside Texas. Also two holidays, Labor Day and July 4, were added to New Year's Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day when reduced rates apply all day for direct dialed calls.

Another change will establish a one-minute initial rate period between 11 p. m. and 8 a. m., rather than the usual three-minute initial rate period. Additional charges are made for each minute following the initial rate period.

"In other words," Beck said, "if you call any time other than between 11 p. m. and 8 a. m., you will be charged for three minutes regardless of whether you talk one, two or three minutes. You are also charged for each additional minute after the first three."

"Under the new schedule, after 11 p. m. you will be charged only for each minute you talk, with a few exceptions," he explained that under present rates, an evening rate call for a distance of 300 miles costs 85 cents. The same call under the new customer dialed rate and for those without DDD who provide the Area Code and complete number for the operator will be 66 cents. The same call placed by a customer who can dial the number himself but prefers to place his call with the operator will cost \$1.25, regardless of time of day.

Beck further explained that this same 300-mile station-to-station call dialed by the customer after 11 p. m. will cost only 20 cents for one minute, a much lower rate. In contrast, he said the same call made person-to-person after September 1 will cost \$2.30, regardless of the time of day. The present rate is \$1.70.

"Providing the equipment to make DDD available to customers is expensive. If this equipment is idle while someone is placing a call with the operator that could be dialed direct, the expense is even higher since providing operator assistance also is expensive."

"So we are placing the increase where it belongs, and giving a savings to the customer who dials the call himself," Beck stated.

General Telephone President L. Gray Beck said the new lower direct distance dialing rates will also benefit customers where DDD is not yet available.

"Although these customers cannot dial their calls direct, they will be charged the lower DDD rate on station-to-station calls if they are placed by giving the operator the Area Code and the complete seven digit telephone number. Of course no additional operator assistance can be used in completing the call without other charges," he said.

Beck explained the lower rates for direct dialed station-to-station calls parallel the national trend to increase the cost of calls that require operator assistance while etc.

5. Design facilities for return of water to lakes, rivers or streams so there will be no detrimental effect to the ecology of the area from heat, dissolved solids, or chemicals, as determined by ecologists, biologists and controlling agencies.

6. Provide protection against pollution by dust.

7. Build into all generating stations the appropriate facilities for noise abatement.

8. Design and landscape all new facilities so that they will be harmonious with the surrounding area.

9. Work harmoniously with all federal, state, and local agencies and groups responsible for or interested in the protection of our environment.

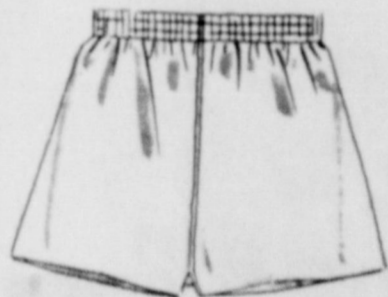

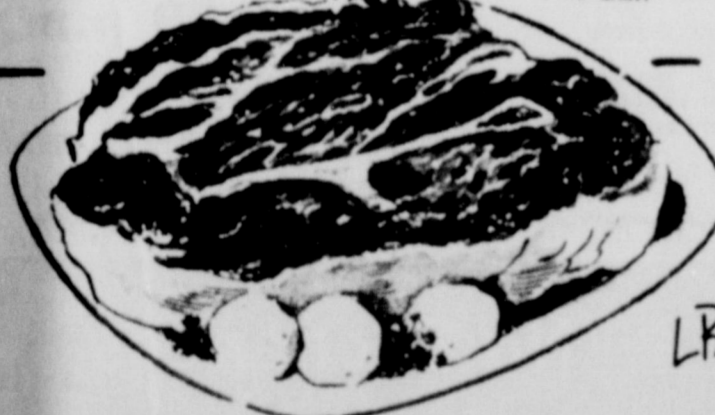
