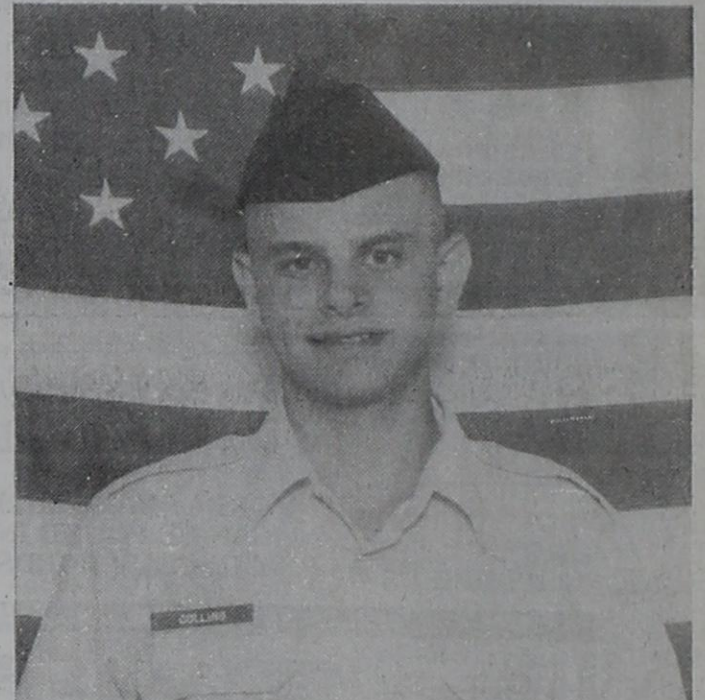

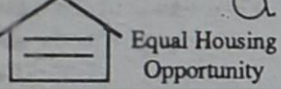

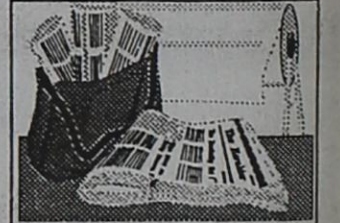

# Treasure Talk

Believe it or not, there are still a lot of buried treasures around. You just have to know where and how to look for it.

I'm not talking about a Wells Fargo box heaping with gold and diamonds. What we're talking about, in most cases, are caches of all sizes. It may be in the form of an old tobacco tin with some bills stuck down into it. Or, maybe a quart jar filled with old coins.

But, it's out there. The best places to look for these type of caches is in old abandoned houses, ghost towns or vacated mines. Take your trusty metal detector with you and listen well.

There is no shortcut to finding a really big cache. It takes research...research...research. Sometimes this research can get expensive. In order to defray some of these costs, some treasure hunters have been known to sell off shares in their yet-to-be-located treasure.

But, oftentimes, this kind of single-minded dedication pays off in large finds. Just remember, there are literally millions of dollars stashed around the U.S., just waiting to be found.

Some tips to make your treasure dreams come true: First, never pass over a suspected cache simply because you've heard that it's been "done to death". You don't know who worked it, how good they were, what type of equipment they used, etc. I'm convinced that no matter how often a site may have been searched over the years, more treasures were missed than were recovered. For example, I once returned to a deep hole that had been "thoroughly" searched. Upon re-inspecting that

what you've found.

And, if you're out cache hunting on your own, keep a low profile. If you think you're on the verge of making a fairly big discovery, worth a lot of money, you don't want to draw attention to yourself, for fear of being robbed. Plus, you'll be plenty busy and don't need the attention of even honest curiosity-seekers. Plus, if word gets out about your discovery, you'll be amazed at the number of people who will try and take it away from you—legally, by claiming rights to a portion of it—or simply by taking it by force. And, another thing to remember, is if you have an agreement with anyone concerning your cache, make sure it's in writing. A verbal agreement isn't worth the paper it's printed on. This way, there can be no confusion as to who was promised what share of the find.

If you do make a good discovery—worth some substantial monies—don't forget to include that in your income taxes. The Federal Government demands its share of any income you derive from your treasure hunting. Remember, there are all sorts of treasures out there waiting for you. Good hunting!

I recommend that you construct your own probe, with a steel ball welded at the point of the shaft. A one-half inch steel ball welded onto a three-eighths inch steel rod will permit your probe to move up and down easily with no restrictions and lets you find out more easily

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# Professional Counselor Explains The Counseling Process

The purpose of counseling is to empower the client to cope with life situations, make effective decisions, and engage in growth producing activity.

Persons of any age, in any walk of life, and with many different kinds of problems can be helped to gain power over the adversities and opportunities of their lives. As a result of counseling, the client increases his or her control over present adversity and present and future opportunity.

The power to live effectively is enhanced by information of two kinds: information about self and information about conditions of the environment. Keep in mind that no one personality or learning theory accounts for all the "truth" about the helping process. Actually, counseling is an interactive process characterized by a unique relationship between counselor and client leading to changing the client in one or more of the following areas: (1) Behavior (2) Personal constructs (3) Ability to cope with life situations (maximize opportunities and minimize adverse environmental conditions) (4) Decision making knowledge and skill.

Diagnosis is the process of developing a clear picture of the client and using that picture to decide how to help the client. Counseling leads to change in the client. Behavior change is probably the easiest type of change to recognize because it is overt and observable. CHANGE MUST OCCUR!

There are three main stages of counseling. In the initial disclosure stage of counseling, the client must be helped to articulate his or her personal concerns and to place those concerns in a context so that the counselor can understand the personal meanings and significance the client attaches to the concerns. The primary tasks of the initial disclosure stage, according to Patterson and Delaney, are to work

toward the development of a relationship characterized by "trust, honesty, open communication, and work involving self-examination".

In the second stage of counseling, the client should reach clearer understandings of his or her life concerns and begin to formulate a new sense of direction. Also in stage two, the counselor begins to bring the clients behaviors into the discussion. As the relationship becomes more secure the counselor also begins to confront the client with observations about his or her goals and behavior. This constructive confrontation provides the client with an external view of his or her behavior based on the counselor's observations. The client is free to accept, reject, or modify the counselor's observations, and in the process of considering how to use the counselor's statement, the client arrives at newly challenged and refined views of self.

In the third and final stage of counseling, the client must decide how to accomplish any goals that have emerged during the previous two stages.

Stage three includes identifying possible alternative courses of action the client might choose and assessing each in terms of the likelihood of

outcomes.

Counseling is not simply talk, but work that requires intense energy from both participants. Counseling can be fun and exciting!

Counseling is not always a successful experience. Client and counselor may have incompatible personalities. The client's difficulties may be beyond the counselor's helping skills, or the client's difficulties may require special modes of intervention (e.g., in cases of chemical dependency). Under these conditions referral is an appropriate choice for the counselor. Referral requires not only an honest acknowledgement from the counselor that some other person or resource in the community may be more helpful to the client, but also a willingness to help the client make contact with these resources.

This requires that the counselor have accurate information about resources in the community, including knowledge about the scope and quality of their services. When a client is not making progress the counselor must determine whether termination or referral is appropriate. Termination is an integral stage of the helping process. Effective termination provides a positive closure for the experience

and encourages the client to continue using his or her new learning.

Counseling with children is based on the same three-stage process. Persons seeking to specialize in working with children will need to extend their study well beyond the scope presented in this article.

There are a variety of theoretical emphasis in counseling. Although we students of counseling were exposed to a great many counseling processes, many developed a clear preference for one specific system. The Alfred Adler theory was the counseling theory I used in my practicum and group counseling relationships.

## Texas Republicans Support Electric Competition

Fort Worth-The Republican Party of Texas approved a platform at last week's state convention that supports competition in the electric industry.

The party's platform, approved by more than 13,000 delegates and alternates at the Fort Worth Convention Center, included a plank supported by Texans For Affordable Energy, a coalition of consumers, businesses and organizations that favors full, fair competition and consumer choice in the electric industry.

"The electric services industry in Texas should be restructured," the platform said. "The Party believes that state of Texas, instead of the federal government, should restructure the electric service industry in Texas. We support deregulation with real competition in the electric service industry."

State Sen. Jerry Patterson (R-Pasadena), volunteer spokesman for Texans For Affordable Energy, said the platform language sends a signal that consumers across the state want to be able to choose their electric service provider.

"Texans are saying they want competition, like we have in the long distance industry, and not merely deregulation, like we have in cable television," Patterson said. "In long distance, you can choose from hundreds of companies at rates 40 percent lower than what they were when there was only one choice.

In cable, you only have one choice, and rates have gone up."

Patterson has sponsored pro-competition legislation in previous legislative sessions that would have restructured the electric industry. The Texas Legislature is expected to debate the issue again next session in January.

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
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

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Callahan County's Paper Says  
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## Callahan County Library News

The library cards many Texans carry may be looking a little ragged from use. More than 72 million books, maga and other materials were checked out from Texas' public libraries in 1996. The 503 community libraries reporting to the Texas State Library and Archives Commission logged more than 45 million visits—more than two visits for each resident of the state.

Small-town libraries tend to rank highest in terms of the number of visits and available materials relative to the populations they serve. The Austin/Westbank library, serving the Austin suburb of Rollingwood, led the state with nearly 44

visits per capita in 1996, while Mount Calm library in the Hill Country reported the most materials per capita with about 41 items for each resident.

Operating costs for Texas' public libraries totaled \$216 million in 1996. More than three-quarters of all funding—nearly \$170 million came from city governments. Counties chipped in another 16%, and the remaining funds came from federal state and other local sources.

Thanks to the June 1998 issue of Fiscal Notes, Fiscal Notes is a free, monthly publication from the office of John Sharp, Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts.

## New Dress Code For Baird ISD

On Monday, July 13, 1998, the Board of Trustees of the Baird Independent School District approved both the student handbook and student code of conduct for the 1998-99 school year. The dress code has been revised in these documents. The guidelines for the district's dress code follows. It is important for both students and parents to be aware of these changes prior to August 12th, the opening day of school.

### Dress and Grooming Code 1998-99

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards provided that the dress and grooming:

\* Shall not lead school officials reasonably to believe that such dress and grooming will disrupt, interfere with, disturb, or detract from school activities.

\* Shall not create a health or other hazard to the student's safety or to the safety of others.

\* Shall comply with the following guidelines:

1. The District prohibits pictures, symbols, emblems, or writing on clothing and accessories (i.e. jewelry, rings, or belt buckles) that:
  - \*\* are lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene.
  - \*\* Advertise or depict tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other illegal substance.
  - \*\* Refer to satanic, cult, or gang activities.
2. Clothing (dresses, skirts, shorts, culottes) must extend below the fingertips when arms are held loosely at one's side. This clothing must be hemmed.
3. Bicycle/Spandex/Lycra and boxer shorts will not be allowed.
4. Students will not

be permitted to wear see-through clothing or have midriffs exposed.

5. Undergarments may not be worn as outerwear.

6. Pants, shorts and slacks must be worn at the natural waist.

7. Students must wear shoes at all times. Cleats or spikes on shoes will not be permitted indoors.

8. Extremely torn clothing will not be permitted.

9. Students will be required to wear their hair well-groomed and clean at all times and extreme modes for hair design and color will not be permitted.

10. Male students must be clean shaven; neither hair nor sideburns should extend below the earlobe.

11. Not jewelry may be worn in any pierced area of the body except for the ear. Males are not permitted to wear earrings during school hours.

12. Sponsors of extracurricular activities may set individual dress and appearance standards for designated school approved uniforms with the approval of the principal.

13. Students may not wear hats, caps, sweat bands, visors, head coverings or bandanas in the building (neither males nor females).

14. Sunshades may not be worn in the building or classroom unless they have been prescribed by a physician for indoor use.

15. Any disruptive mode of clothing or grooming that adversely impacts the educational process is not acceptable.

Final decision in determining the appropriate dress and grooming shall rest with the teacher and the principal or his/her designee.

Failure to adhere to established dress and grooming codes may result in disciplinary action.
