number of local retired educators. At the present time teachers' pensions are set at a fixed sum and do not make allowances for inflation, so the legislation has been considered an emergency issue. About 40,000 retired teachers would be affected by the change as teachers are not covered by social security.

In addition almost 10,000 retired state employees would be affected by the change in state pension funding.

The other amendment would raise the salaries of legislatures from \$400 to \$600 per month and increase their per diem living expenses from \$12 to \$30 a day during legislative sessions.

Readers have been concerned with the proposed legislation for school financing in House Bill 1083 by Representative Massey of San Angelo, since the outline of the plan was published in the News April 3.

State Representative W.S. (Bill) Healy advised the News by letter that the proposed legislation would raise local ad valorem taxes considerably and that many of the taxpayers and school districts would be crippled by the new local taxes without helping the children in their districts. He is therefore of the opinion that it would be to the best interest of his District to oppose this legislation.

## Knox City Wins Insurance Break

AUSTIN -- Knox City, population 1,536, had a fire loss ratio of 21 per cent for the five year period 1970-74 and qualified for a 25 per cent credit on fire insurance policies issued on and after April 1 this year, according to the State Board of Insurance.

Five year net premiums for Knox City amounted to \$98,092 with losses put at \$21,238. The 1974 premium and loss figures were \$27,396 and \$1,270.

The city's key rate was figured at 53 cents, with 62 cents in charges and 9 cents in credits. The credits were obtained by having additional capacity of at least one booster tank truck with 100 gallon capacity; a properly maintained night watch service; teaching fire prevention in the schools; maintaining an arson reward; and conducting a firemen's training school.

Friday of last week the Greyhounds tied with DeLeon for the championship at the DeLeon Relays with 134 points. The Hounds were competing without part of the team, due to the District Tennis Meet, and were not allowed to run the mile relay.

The sprint relay team of Charlie Flye, Bo Johnson, Jimmy Lynn, and Al Bateman won first with a season's best of 44.0.

Al Bateman won four first places, running on the relay, winning the 100, 220, and the

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


