### Report Of Grand Jury June Term A. D. 1929

To Honorable Isaac O. Newton, District Judge Knox County Texas:

We, your grand jury, duly organized and empanelled as such for the June term of the District Court, Knox County, Texas, respectfully submit the following report:

We have diligently inquired into all alleged violations of the law that have been brought to our attention, and have returned 15 bills indictment, and have examined thirty four witnesses before our body.

Our work has been comparatively light and with the exception of the above we find the county to be in good shape with respect to violations of the law. We desire, however, to state in this connection that our investigation has revealed that there is a tendency over the county among a good many of the people toward loose morals, especially among the younger people, and we desire to recommend that the parents of the county think along this line and be careful to keep informed as to the movements of their children as to their social and recreational affairs. ### 1000 TURKEYS ON HAMILTON RANCH

Chas. Hamilton, manager of the Hamilton Ranch, six miles northwest of Knox City passed thru here last Friday with 670 young turkeys. He expects to increase the flock to 1000. These birds were purchased in Coleman county and hauled here in trucks. They are about two to three pound turks and will be herded in his winter pasture districts by mexican herders. The grass hoppers are plentiful and it will take very little feed to make them into first class national birds by Thanksgiving day.

This project will be watched with much interest and we predict it will be a money making investment for Mr. Hamilton.

### M. A. Verhalen Ships Pigs to Post City Man

M. A. Verhalen, one of our progressive farmers and stock raisers made a good shipment of Registered Duroc Jersey pigs to Dick Cravey of Post, one day last week.

He quite often ships one and two pigs to one farmer, but this shipment consisted of fifteen head.

Mr. Verhalen has been shipping Registered Duroc Jersey pigs for a number of years to various parts of the state and adjoining states and has built up quite a name as a fancy breeder.

### Highway 30 Be Paved In Knox County

Another step forward has been ordered by the state highway commission toward making Highway 30, West Texas' major north-and-south artery, hard surfaced from Red river to Rio Grande. At its Tuesday session the commission let contract to H. L. Canady, Dallas, for 13 miles of concrete through Knox county from Baylor to Haskell. The price was \$308,358.

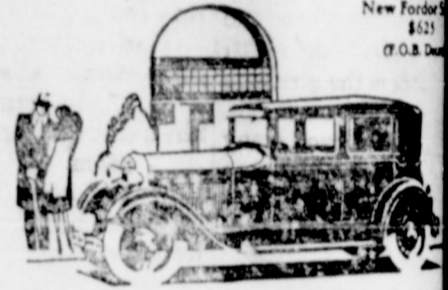

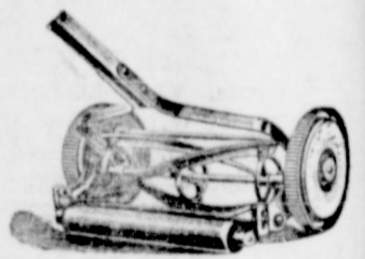

## Car Registration Law Is Changed

Purchasers of automobiles will benefit from the new law now in effect regarding the registration of automobiles.

Beginning with June 1st, all cars registered before January 1, 1930, will be taxed only for the number of months remaining this year, instead of the charge being made by quarters, as has heretofore. In other words, cars registered during June will be charged for seven months remaining in this year. In July the charges will be for only six months—the charge being computed on a monthly basis. The new method will effect a considerable saving to automobile owners who have cars and trucks which are operated only during fall months, and purchasers of new cars will also be benefited from the new law.

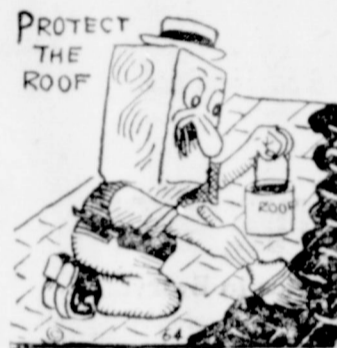

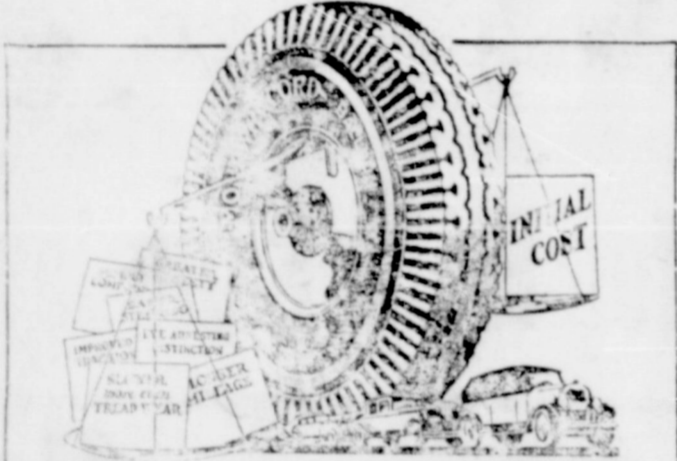

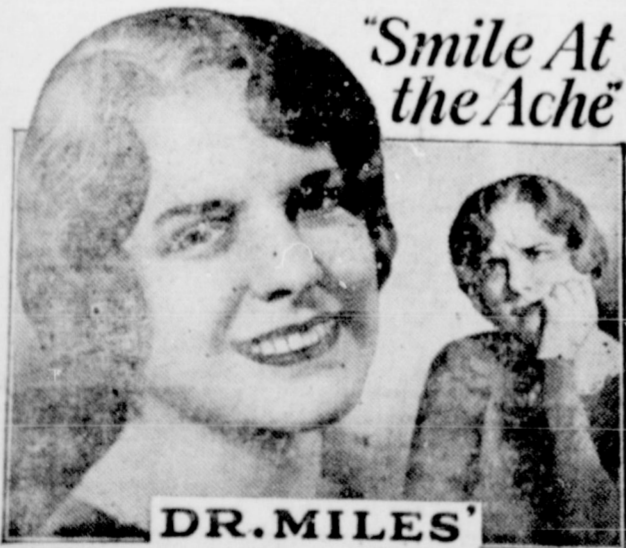
