Large Turnout Noted In Joint Elections

Two incumbents were re-elected and a newcomer elected Saturday to fill the three vacancies on the Knox City School Board. John L. Grindstaff Jr. polled 116 votes, Allen McLaughery 102, and Dr. Robert G. Howell 160. Mrs. Ross Mac (Joann) Oliver received 91 and incumbent Oscar Mangis had 83. Write-in votes included Mrs. R.P. (Barbara) Barnard 2; Tommy Richardson 2, and Charlie Flye 2. Holdover members include Jerry Benson, Henry J. Jones, Doug Meinzer, and John Crowner. Running unopposed for the two year term on the City Council were L. V. Worley, Celso Gonzales, and Dr. Ted Alexander Jr. Holdover members include Mayor Buddy Angle and councilmen Carl Shelton and A.P. Denton. Vernal Zeissell and Richie Smith were unopposed in their re-election to the Knox County Hospital Board as was Jack Idol, county school trustee in precinct one. Re-appointed to the hospital board were Stanton Brown of Benjamin and Paul Horne of Gilliland. Holdover members include Dr. Robert Howell, Henry J. Jones, both of Knox City, and Walter Coffman of Goree. The total number of people voting in the different boxes included 145 in the city; 192 in the school; 178 hospital; and the county trustee precinct one, 162.

The hopes of many residents that Knox City would not be left without a lumber yard were realized last week when Tommy Richardson bought the remaining stock of the Knox County Lumber Co., moved it to property he purchased west of Egenbacher Implement, and got Knox City's new lumber yard underway. Tommy is well-qualified to handle his new business as he was in the lumber yard business for eight years and a building contractor for 12 years. Tommy also has farming and ranching interests. He said that new stock, including lumber, cement, steel, and paint, is arriving daily. Customers are asked to check with Tommy on their particular need and if he does not have the item in stock, he said he would be more than happy to get it for you. "If everyone will bear with us and have a little patience, we'll have a complete stock very soon," he stressed. He continued, "We plan to carry top quality products at competitive prices and we hope that you will check with us first and let us figure with you. We want very much to serve you." The stock is located in the building just across the alley west of Egenbacher Implement. Future plans call for a new sales office in the building west of their present location. Tommy and his wife, the former Lois Reddell, are the parents of three sons, Tad, Flint, and Sid, and one married daughter, Cathy Marion, who along with her husband, Derrell and children Rance, 4, and Mitzi, 10 months old, live in Odessa. The Richardsons are active members of the Church of Christ. Tommy and Lois are to be commended for the faith they have in Knox City and the area by investing in this new business. There is definitely a need for a lumber yard in Knox City and we are grateful to them for keeping the business here.

In Haskell and Knox Counties 1974 RECP Program Signup Begins Monday

The 1974 Rural Environmental Conservation Program (RECP) for Haskell and Knox Counties will formally open with sign-up beginning Monday, April 15. The 1974 RECP is set up to operate only on high priority needs. Land without terraces and the need of waterways to safely conduct outside water through a farm are considered as top priority under the program. Other high priority practices under the 1974 RECP are constructing livestock water reservoirs and diversion terraces. Applications for the 1974 RECP will be taken beginning Monday, April 15, at the county ASCS office, and will close on Tuesday, April 30. Work will need to be started within 30 days after approval of the application unless hindered for reasons beyond the producers control. Haskell County received an allocation of only \$11,400, while Knox County received an allocation of \$10,734. Each farmer is allowed a maximum of \$2500 under the 1974 RECP, so the allocations for each county will not last long. If interested, one should be an "early bird", and file his request for cost-share assistance early. A technician from the Soil Conservation Service, located in Haskell and Knox City, will be responsible for making the "needs" determination on each individual application. Recommendations of needs and feasibility will then be made to the respective ASCS County Committee for its consideration. Approval by the ASCS County Committee must be given before starting any construction work. Back in December, 1972, President of the United States Richard M. Nixon shut down the 1973 Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) by impounding all 1973 funds. By court action, these funds have now been released and returned to the states and counties in the nation. Applications for assistance under the 1973 REAP will also be taken beginning April 15. Major practices eligible for cost-share assistance in both counties will be (1.) establishing permanent vegetative cover (cropland being returned to grassland), (2.) improving vegetative cover (normally used with rootplowing and treedozing of brush), (3.) constructing livestock water ponds, (4.) constructing terraces, (6.) reorganizing farm irrigation systems (underground pipe), and (7.) controlling competitive brush. Each farmer is allowed a maximum of \$1500.00 under the 1973 REAP. Applications under the 1973 REAP will continue to be taken in each county until such time that the county allocation (\$39,000 for Haskell and \$33,359 for Knox) is exhausted. Anyone having questions concerning either the 1973 REAP or 1974 RECP should contact his respective SCS office or ASCS office in Haskell and/or Knox City.

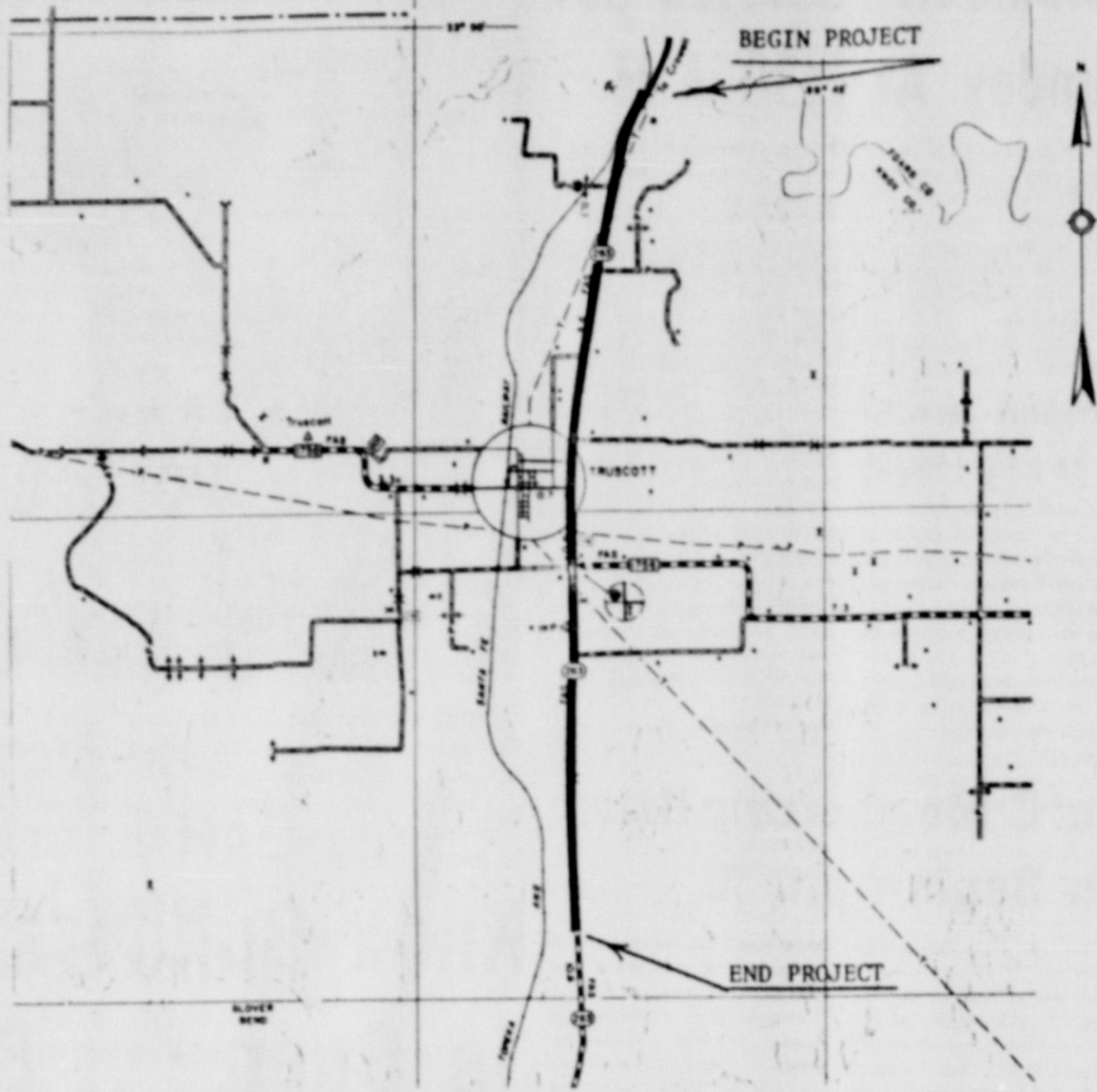

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR [LOCATION] AND DESIGN [COMBINED HEARING]

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 283, extending from the Foard County Line, South 8.8 miles, in Knox County.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 13-foot travel lanes, with 9-foot paved shoulders.

Route of the proposed project is along the present location of State Highway 283 with the exception of an .08-mile section of new alignment, which is necessary in the area of the Truscott Cemetery. Additional right of way will be obtained as required to provide a minimum right of way width of 150 feet throughout the project. There will be no displaced persons or businesses, or relocations, on the proposed project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Alvin D. Alexander, Assoc. Resident Engineer, Munday, Texas.

Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file in the office of the County Judge of Knox County.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees, and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction, can be obtained at the Texas highway Department District Office, P.O. Box 909, Childress, Texas 79201.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for the project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office, or to Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer at Childress, Texas, on or before May 3rd, 1974.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

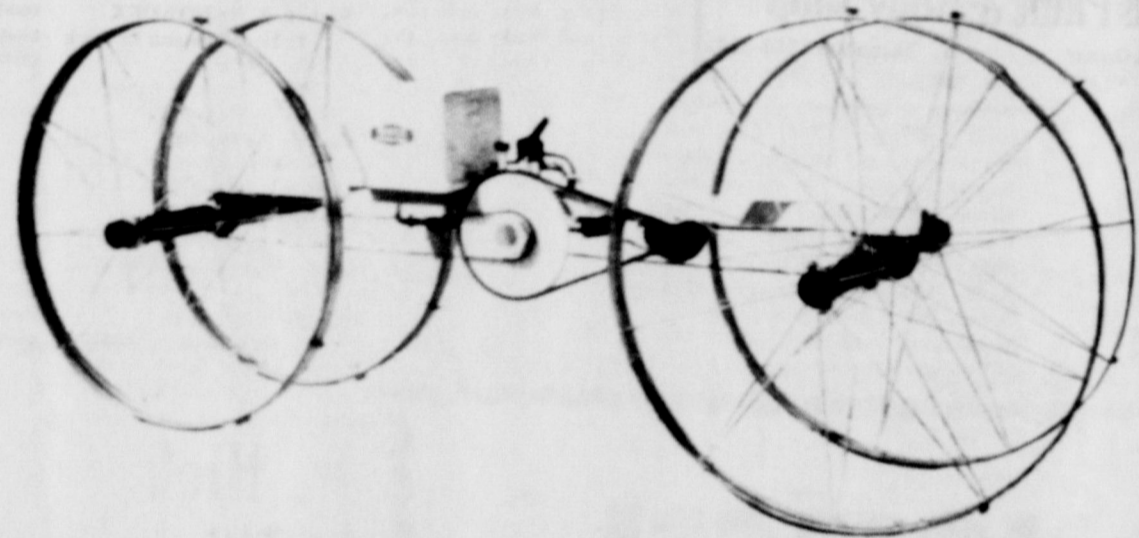

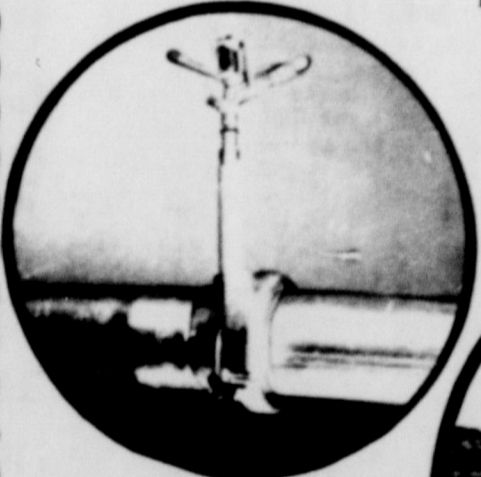
IRRIGATION PIPELINES FROM PLANNING TO PUMPING



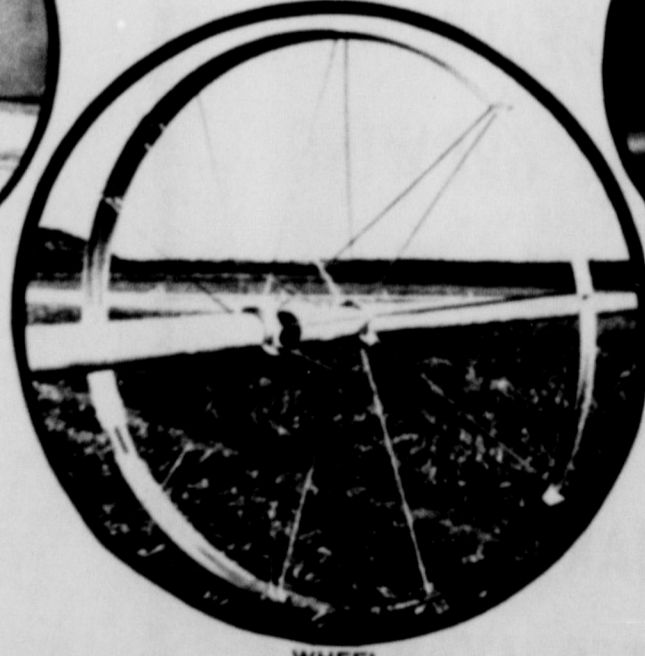
