Ray Farabee, Wichita Falls Lawyer, Rites in Albany **Announces for Texas Senate**

Ray Farabee, a Wichita Falls businessman and attorney, has announced his candidacy for the Texas Senate in the 30th District. A Democrat Farabee will seek the Senate seat being vacated by Jack Hightower who has announced for U.S. Congress in the 13th District.
