





Government by Lawor by Edict?

Dominant among the demands of men who fought the Revolution was the right to a voice in the making of laws under which they were governed. By their victory our fathers won that Jealously they guarded it Federal and State constitut Under the system thus established, the enactment of law was reserved to men

chosen by the people and responsive to their will. It is the traditional Ameri-But there is another type of legisla tion – known as Administrative Law.
It is a system of edicts and decrees, handed down by rulers to subject populations. In its enactment the people

have no voice. That's one reason why so many thoughtful citizens are protesting against the flood of edicts pouring out of the offices of various boards and bureaus at Washington today.

They realize that a whole new body of Administrative Law is being forced on the people, not by their elected rep-resentatives, but by appointed chiefs of bureaus and comi issions, in whose selection the voters had no choice and over whose actions they exercise no

In recent years those citizens have observed a constantly increasing num-ber of examples of extravagance, arrogance and interference with individual rights on the part of Bureaucrats who assumed, or to whom Congress delegated, powers vested only in the people or their elected representatives.

Today they see the growing threat of Administrative Law supplanting, unl checked, our entire American system of legislation—and with it our constitutional form of government.

Bureaucracy and democracy cannot continue to exist side by side. One or the other must yield. Whether or not we shall surrender government by the people for government by Bureaucrats is for us to determine.

As heirs of the patriots who waged a long and bitter war for the right to make their own laws, our decision should not be a difficult one.
