State law requires the followng immunizations:

Polio - At least 3 doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.

Diphtheria - Tetanus - Minmum of 3 doses, with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday. (Usually given at DPT for children less than 6 years of age, and TD for children 6 years of age and

older) Measles - 1 dose of vaccine. or history of measles illness.

Rubella - 1 dose of vaccine.
