Former KC Man Dies In Boating Mishap

The body of Bonnie Verhalen, 27, of Abilene, was recovered about 6:30 p.m. Tuesday from Hubbard Lake near Breckenridge after being missing since midnight Saturday following a boating mishap.

Bonnie was a former Knox City resident and the son of Mr. and Mrs. M.L. Verhalen. His wife, Colleen, is the daughter of former Knox City residents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Averitt of San Antonio.

A search was launched at 9 a.m. Sunday, when Colleen and Hugh Hill, a co-worker of Bonnie's were rescued by Bud Wilson of Abilene after they had clung to a tree for 12 hours.

They reported their boat hit a stump at 8:30 p.m. Saturday as they returned to camp and threw all three into the lake. Verhalen decided to swim to shore shortly after midnight, and Hill and Mrs. Verhalen thought they saw her husband get out of the water and disappear.

Former KC Man Dies In Boating Mishap

Mrs. Verhalen and Hill were so sure Verhalen made it to shore that intensive land searches went on for three days by men on foot, in Jeeps and on horseback.

Planes and helicopters flew over the area all three days and rescue units and boats searched the water and shoreline.

The body was recovered by the Breckenridge Fire Department Rescue Unit in 13 feet of water 50 yards from shore and about 200 yards from where the accident occurred, according to Fire Chief Roger McMullen.

The week of March 10-16 has been designated as Girl Scout Week in Knox City.

Mayor Buddy Angle signed the proclamation today in the presence of four Girl Scouts from NorCentex Girl Scout Council at a ceremony in City Hall. Also present for the ceremony were Service Unit Director Birdie Helton and Chamber of Commerce President J.B. Tabor.

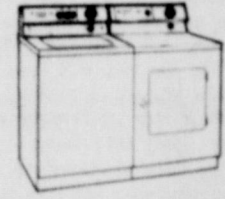

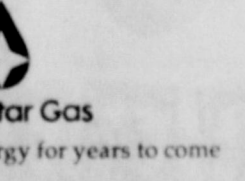

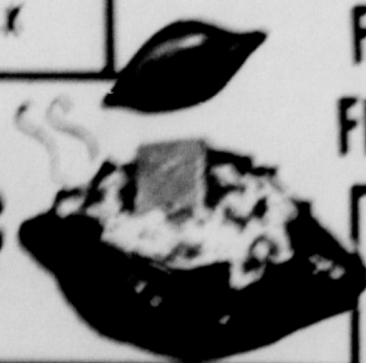

dable delivery of supplies. John McGaughey, director of the Haskell-Knox Consortium, said that his office was having difficulty getting checks delivered within a reasonable length of time, even within the county.

Mrs. Billye Angle, publisher of The Knox County News, reported to Mr. Grant that subscribers in Munday had recently had to wait until the following Monday for their News, mailed every Thursday in Knox City. A Vera subscriber recently did not receive his paper until Tuesday of the following week. Lubbock subscribers several weeks ago waited over a week for their papers. Mrs. Angle also told the authorities of two occasions within recent weeks that it had taken four days to receive a first class letter from Rule that contained an ad, too late for that week's News, and of a first class letter from Truscott, which took four days. Mrs. Angle asked if having three sectional centers in one small county could cause this, and Mr. Grant explained that it should not but that it definitely could. She also asked if it would be possible to have pickup mail service only on Sunday if we were to be denied Sunday mail delivery.

The Rev. Dick Richards, pastor of First United Methodist Church, questioned why mail service was still made to Snyder and Colorado City, and Mr. Grant explained that the amount of mail warranted it.

Many said they were unaware that this center and a few more in Texas were the only ones not getting Sunday mail service. The Wichita Falls center, of which Munday is a part, has not curtailed its Sunday service.

Other businessmen and individuals told of sending parcels by bus to assure delivery within a reasonable length of time.

Grant told the group that the loss of revenue to the postal service through use of carriers and busses would certainly be considered in any change in the mail service. While he didn't promise anything, Grant did say the door was not closed on the Sunday service situation. If service demands, it might be reconsidered, he concluded.

AREA COTTON PRODUCERS MEETING

SMALL GRAIN SYMPOSIUM

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Rolling Plains Economic Program, and the Texas Wheat Producers Board are sponsoring two Small Grain Symposiums in

Rural Banks To Have Opportunity To Aid In Local Development

Village and country bankers face unprecedented opportunities, just ahead, to increase their farm and other rural development business and to increase service to rural people. The U.S. Department of Agriculture will help them meet such opportunities.

These predictions were made by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Will Erwin, speaking before the "Future of Banking" Conference of the Missouri Bankers Association.

"USDA believes that the level of farm loans will double in the next decade. Missouri is in the heart of the nation's bread basket. Farmers are experiencing more prosperity. Global food supply and demand relationships are changing. And bankers should find their new rural business, 'good business.'"

"Meeting the non-farm credit needs of rural development offers great opportunities to local lenders. Increasingly, business is placing job-producing plants, offices, and laboratories in rural areas. Such installations often set off an economic chain reaction of major proportions."

"According to one recent study, 100 new factory employees, in a given town, annually add \$565,000 to local retail sales, create 68 additional non-manufacturing jobs and bring over \$1 million in additional personal income to the area. This kind of activity builds business for local banks—and can be good for everyone."

Secretary Erwin said, "It is the policy of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to do all it can, as authorized by law, to help local communities, including their bankers, to bring about constructive and needed development."

"Rural development is a local matter. Bankers are involved as community leaders. Our role is to help local people help themselves. If they ask for assistance, we are building the capacity to help them. USDA's aim is to help rural communities enhance their area by adding to its economic opportunities, by increasing standards of living and by improving the quality of life of its residents."

"Congress, as a part of the

Rural Development Act of 1972, authorized the Department of Agriculture to guarantee repayment of rural development loans made by local lenders up to 90 percent of losses. This augments our philosophy that it is the function of the federal government to help local communities help themselves," the official continued.

"USDA, of course, continues to make direct loans and

grants for many developmental purposes.

"But both the Congress and USDA are determined that federal assistance shall primarily be used to help local communities meet their rural development challenge. For instance, Federal sewer, water and other community facility loans jumped from \$198 million in 1969 to \$520 million this year. And President Nixon has suggested to Congress a level of \$600

million for the year ahead. "Business and industry guaranteed loans, slated at the \$200 million level this year, are budgeted for \$400 million for the year beginning July 1, 1974. Rural housing loans, which stood at the \$507 million level in 1969, are budgeted for well over the \$2 billion for the year just ahead. All in all, USDA's rural development lending program stands at roughly three times its 1969 level," the official concluded.

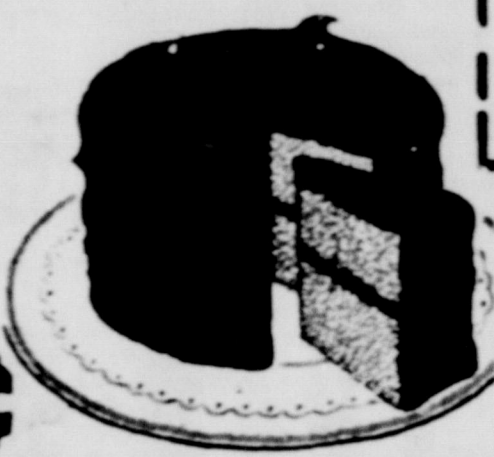
