





Since our children took these lests, the same series has been given to a few other school children in the county under the direction of Supt. Jones, and it is gratifying to note that the averages made by the pupils of Knox City School are well in advance of those made by other pupils. This may be attributed to the fact that in every grade in our school we have, sinc early Pail, been giving much attention. to silent reading. This has been a thouroughly new way of study ing reading but it is already showing results. In one room especially where some extra good work has been done along this line, the seventh grade, the class average ran much bigher than one might have expected. This grade made a better showing than the grade above them did.

Another interesting point was noticeable from a study of the records of various individuals who took the tests. Here it was strictly evident that persons who possessed the highest degree of ability in ellent reading were also the persons who make the best showing in their regul far work from day to day and from week to week

The cosplis of our tests when compared with averages made the nation over do not appear to a very favorable advantage. even the seventh grade, whose record was commended a moment ago, lacked some five points coming up to what a greenth grade is supposed to do, Mone work and harder work will be done in silent reading ; and a similar series if tests will be taken later in the year.
