BAIRD--Over 750 agricultural educators joined 10,000 vocational educators in New Orleans for their annual convention, Dec. 6-11, 1974. The 26th National Vocational Agricultural Teachers' Association (NVATA) convention ran concurrently with that of the American Vocational Association (AVA). Dick Vestal, vocational agriculture teacher in the Baird High School at Baird, was an official delegate for the Texas association.

The six days were exceptionally busy for those attending. All NVATA and AVA Agriculture Division meetings were at the Marriott Hotel and the AVA major sessions were at the Rivergate. The NVATA and AVA program included general sessions, departmental, sectional and regional meetings, business sessions, awards, receptions and luncheons. The week long convention brought vocational educators in agriculture--classroom teachers, teacher educators, and state supervisors--together from all sections of the United States for the purpose of discussing mutual problems, studying transitional innovations, and becoming more knowledgeable about the total program of career education in agriculture.
