Members of the board heard John Smith, school district tax assessor-collector, give a report on the tax collections up to Feb. 1. The district has a tax levy of \$80,620.97 and up to the first of the month \$76,350.01 had been collected. A balance of \$4,270.96 is now delinquent, Smith said.

## Knox 4-H Clubbers Exhibit Stock at Fort Worth Show

Four Knox County 4-H boys and girls exhibited their nurse-fed beef steers in Fort Worth this past week. Exhibitors were Ava Mary Taylor, Mary Ann Reneau, Rodney Taylor and John Reneau.

The show was very good this year with about 750 steers being shown in all classes. Ava Mary's steer placed 7th in the middle-weight Angus division, Mary Ann's steer 16th in the same class and John's steer 13th in the heavy weight open class.

He reenlisted in the army before the Korean conflict, receiving training at Camp Chaffee and El Paso before going to Korea.

A sister, Mrs. Frankie Stanford of Memphis, Tenn., will take the parents to San Antonio to attend reburial services. Burial will be in National Cemetery there.

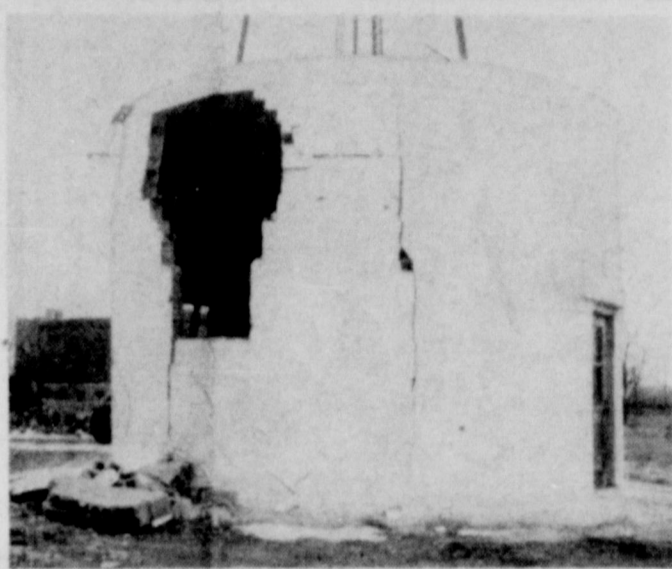
## Seymour Girls Present Program At Lions Club

## Special Jury Venire Called For Murder Trial Monday

A special venire of 75 jurors has been called for the murder trial of a Goree Negro in 50th Judicial District Court Monday.

Judge Lewis M. Williams said several other cases will also come

up during this term of court. Following the murder trial will be The State of Texas vs. Tom B. Arrington, who is charged with assault with intent to murder. The charge is the result of a shooting in Knox City last November, in which J. Frank Davis, an employe of Pecos Valley Construction Co., was wounded. Arrington was employed by an engineering firm, and both men were working on Knox City's paving project.

## Weatherman Records .25 Inch Moisture

While much of West Texas was snowbound during the week-end the Knox City area had its worst spell of the winter, but the snow and freezing mist here furnished only .25 inch of moisture. Heavier snow was reported west of town, in King County, and in the Gilliland-Truscott area.

A shower Tuesday night added another .08 inch to weatherman Horace Finley's rain-gauge, bringing the total for the week to .33 inch and the total for the year to .63 inch.

While the moisture will be of some benefit to the grain in the area, farmers say much more rain is needed, and soon.

## Washington Letter

The House unanimously adopted a measure which would exempt gasoline and diesel fuel and other fuels from Federal excise taxes last week. The bill that finally passed the House was one that was written by the committee on Ways and Means after the hearings that had been held on the bill that I introduced and others that would have had the same effect.

It has again been proposed that first class mail rates be increased so that a stamp for an ordinary letter would cost four cents instead of the present three cents. First class mail has historically made a profit for the Post Office Department, and it would seem that it would be better to thoroughly investigate the possibility of raising the other classes of mail before increasing the only one that has ever made a profit.

Hearings are stated to begin around the middle of February on various bills dealing with the Federal highway program. Undoubtedly these hearings will be lengthy

and possibly consume several weeks. The Administration's original plan to finance this program by a long-term bond issue has been abandoned by them. It now seems reasonably certain that whatever kind of bill is passed in this session will be based on the idea of paying for the highway construction as it is built. This, of course, will mean that there will probably be an increase in taxes on fuels and tires. It would be impossible now to know, of course, the exact amount of these taxes or how they would be imposed.

The Department of Agriculture has published a bulletin entitled "Conquest of the Land Through 7,000 Years." This bulletin was written by Dr. W. C. Loudermilk, formerly assistant chief of the Soil Conservation Service, after an eighteen-month world tour in which he visited areas where land had been cultivated for hundreds or even thousands of years. This bulletin is a report of his studies and nothing that I have ever seen points up so well what can happen through continued bad land use and what the real benefits of soil conservation are. This bulletin is only thirty pages long. It is well worth anyone's time to read it. If anyone would like a copy, if they will write me, I will be glad to send them one.

## Press Association Asks That Records Be Open to Public

For many years the Texas Press Association—of which this newspaper, along with a vast majority of all Texas newspapers, is a member—has suggested laws that would require governing bodies of the state, various districts, and municipalities, to open their records to the public.

In many instances, publication of minutes would be required, and in the case of agencies handling public funds, publication of a financial statement would be mandatory.

Some progress has been made in these efforts, but not nearly as much as the importance of the project justifies. There never has been a great deal of opposition to the TPA proposals. But they have been shunted aside for other matters.

Apathy — not opposition — has kept them off the statute books.

Now all Texas is concerned over the numerous, unsavory circumstances that have come to light in the past few years. There have been the Duval County revelations; the veterans land investigations; the U. S. Trust and other insurance debacles; to say nothing of smaller local instances of corruption and abuse of public trust of which there have been many.

Men who are in positions to know—such as the Attorney General of Texas—say that none of these things could have gone on for long had there been adequate laws governing "Public Notice." It is doubtful that any of them would have been attempted, had

there been requirements that official actions be made public.

Proper public notice laws will prevent such things in the future. Such laws automatically lead to good government.

This is an election year. If you think public business should be made public, ask each candidate for the legislature how he feels about secrecy in government affairs. Vote for and support men who pledge themselves to help pass legislation requiring publication of financial reports by insurance companies, county treasurers, and any and all persons who handle public funds.

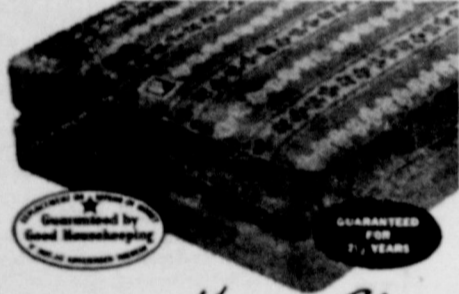

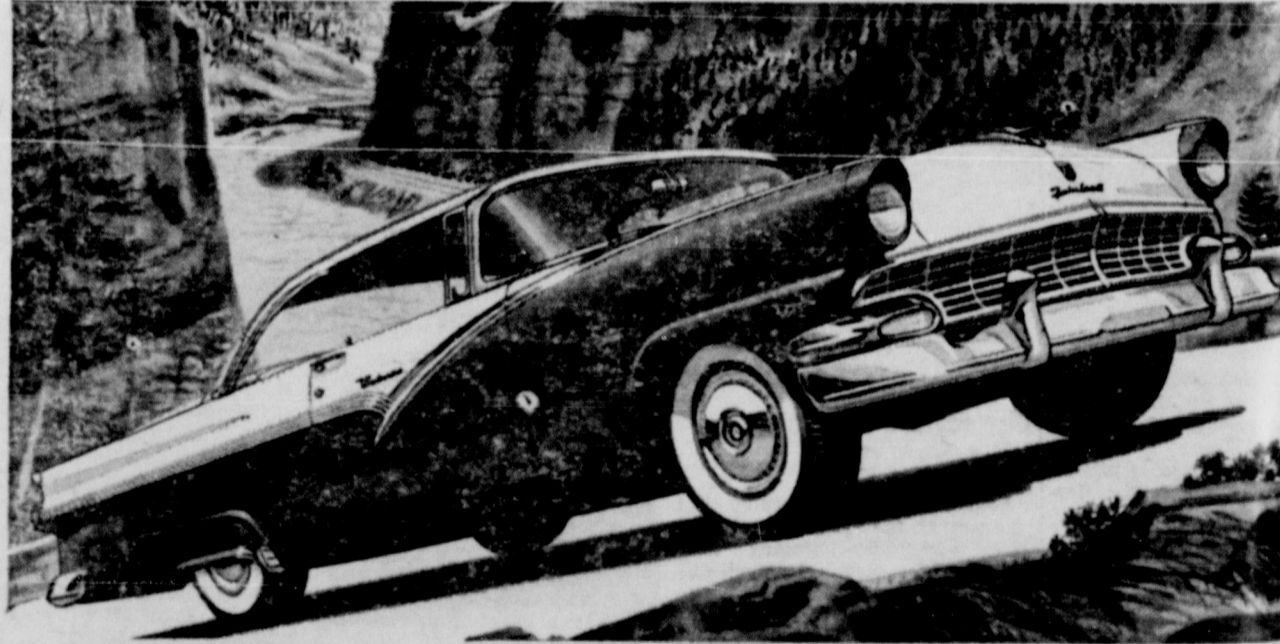

### Farm and Ranch Notes

By W. J. BRYAN  
 County Agent

—I have received reports that some transit salesmen over the state have sold ordinary white and in some cases red grain sorghum seed as hybrid seed.

There is very little hybrid seed available for planting this year and most of this will be given out for test plots. I have received seed for about eight tests to be planted in Knox County this year.

I understand that there will be plenty of seed available for all farmers to plant in 1957, but this year true hybrids are only available from three sources. They are: The DeKalb Hybrid Seed Co., Farmers who grew one-acre apprentice blocks last year with seed from the Experiment Stations, and the Texas Agricultural Experiment stations.

As most all these seed are going into test plots this year I would like to advise farmers not to buy hybrid grain sorghum seed from anyone that they do not know.

Did you know . . . Farmers are now getting only 39 cents of every dollar spent for feed in the retail store? This is the smallest share since 1940, and compares with a

### Contributions to Texas Heart Fund May Be Mailed

Contributions to the 1956 Texas Heart Fund now being conducted throughout the state may be given to local Heart Associations or mailed directly to "Heart, care of the Postmaster," it has been emphasized by Senator Lyndon Johnson, 1956 Heart Fund chairman for the state.

"Results of the first week of this year's Heart Fund—which extends through all of February—indicate that Texans are becoming increasingly aware of the need for funds with which to combat heart disease," Senator Johnson declared. "Those of us who know firsthand the effects of heart disease and are aware of the valuable assistance science has received from previous Heart Funds, are hopeful that the Texas Heart Fund goal of \$676,000 for 1956 will be surpassed."

Contributions to the Heart Fund are used through local, Texas and American Heart Associations to finance continued research, education and community heart programs, it was pointed out.

"In Texas, as throughout the nation, diseases of the heart and circulatory systems rank as the number one killer," added the Texas Heart Fund chairman, who recently resumed his congressional duties after suffering a heart attack last July. "Medical research supported by your Heart Fund dollars has made tremendous strides in the fight against the killer in recent years. Your contributions to the February Heart Fund—whether given to your local Heart association or mailed to your postmaster—will materially add science and physicians in combatting heart disease."

### Accident Figures For County Released

Captain K. B. Hallmark, Jr., commanding officer of the Wichita Falls District of the Texas Highway patrol, released Knox County's rural traffic accident summary for January, 1956.

The highway patrol investigated a total of eight accidents with the following breakdown: Five property damage; three personal injury, and no fatal accidents.

Captain Hallmark reported a total property damage of \$4,450 with three persons injured and none killed. This is an increase of three accidents over the same period of 1955.

Patrolmen of the Wichita Falls District contacted a total of 1341 traffic law violators during the month of January. Captain Hallmark reported that 548 of these were arrested while 793 were warned for violation of the state traffic laws.

Speed was the leading cause of arrest, with DWI second and improper passing ranking third.

Counties included in the Wichita Falls District are: Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Hardeman, King, Knox, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

### FHA Broadens Lending Policies

The Farmers Home Administration has broadened its lending authorities to meet the special needs of established small farmers who, due to drought and other adverse conditions, have been forced to work part-time off the farm in order to make a living for the family, Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director, announced today.

The extension of credit to these small farmers, who are in need of credit primarily for farm operating expenses which cannot be obtained from their usual source of credit, together with the income from their off-farm work will permit them to continue farming and to maintain a satisfactory standard of living, McKay said.

These loans are short-term credit designed to help farmers finance one year's operations. Credit may be extended to farmers who are operating units no larger than a family type farm provided there is a sound basis for credit. McKay stated this means that the anticipated gross income from farming and other sources must be sufficient to repay the loan, meet farm and home expenses not provided for in the loan and provide a reasonable margin above such amounts.

Applications may be filed at the county office located in Seymour, or the local county office located in the ASC office in Knox City, each Tuesday. Wilburn A. Satterwhite is the county supervisor. The local County Farmers Home Administration Committee, B. E. Smith, Murval H. Jackson and John Atterbury, determines the eligibility of applicants for these loans.

Credit is also extended by the Farmers Home Administration over longer periods to finance adjustments and improvements in farming operations.

Scout Week, February 6 to 12, marking the organization's 48th anniversary. Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout Executive, says the new pro-

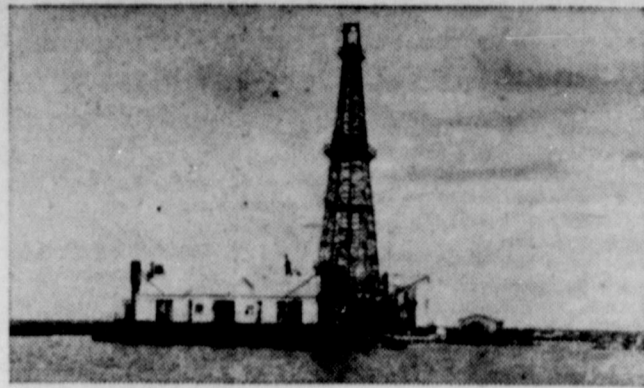
gram seeks "through organized and trained man power to give an increasingly better program to an increasing number of the nation's youth" and to "help today's youth to 'Be Prepared' as citizens of character, to be prepared in body, skill, spirit, will, and as a member of a team."

He declares it will give youth further opportunity to develop physical fitness, self-reliance, the fulfillment of one's obligation to God, a sense of personal responsibility, a spirit of helping people, a willingness to share, and an understanding of the government's democratic processes.

During Boy Scout Week plans will be completed for the strictly nonpartisan 1956 National Get-Out-the-Vote campaign which the Scout organization is sponsoring jointly with the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge. Scouts distributed in 1952 more than 1,000,000 posters and placed 30,000,000 Liberty Bell doorknob hangers in their first nationwide get-out-the-vote effort. This effort was said to be an important factor in the record turnout of sixty million voters.

It is believed that four million Scouts and adult leaders can be a great influence among parents, relatives, neighbors, and others to produce another record vote this year.

The campaign seeks to instill

in adults the determination and responsibility to exercise their franchise as free people and take a more active part in their government. Each Scout will have an opportunity to participate and better understand his responsibility as a citizen.

Since a major reason for not voting is failure to have registered, the Scouts' campaign will

first try to get citizens to register. Colorful posters encouraging registration will be displayed in accordance with local registration dates. Just before Election Day, Scouts and their leaders will distribute 35,000,000 Liberty Bell doorknob hangers to homes across the nation. These hangers read: "Heed youths' call. Vote as you think, but vote November 6, 1956. Use your freedom to vote."

Boy Scout Week is the largest annual single event observed by young citizens.

Most of the nation's 36,000 Cub packs, with 1,430,000 members, will hold blue and gold pot luck banquets with each family bringing a part of the menu. The eight, nine, and ten year old members follow a home-centered program in their homes and backyards.

Each unit will train its members in common-sense things they should do in case of fire, panic, or flood, simple things one should do for himself and his family. Interesting objects made by Cub Scouts will be shown in window displays. Cub Scouts will put on dramatizations, tableaux, and pantomimes, based on Cub Scout ideals, the history of Scouting, and persons important to its progress.

Most of the 54,000 Boy Scout troops, with 1,180,000 members eleven, twelve and thirteen years old, will celebrate with annual parents' and Scouts' dinners at which individual advancements and achievements will be recognized. They will also thank local organizations and parents whose support makes Scouting possible.

Explorers in the 14,000 Explorer units and in Explorer crews in troops, with their 440,000 members fourteen years and older, will demonstrate before adults and young people the outdoor, social service, and vocational elements of their program.

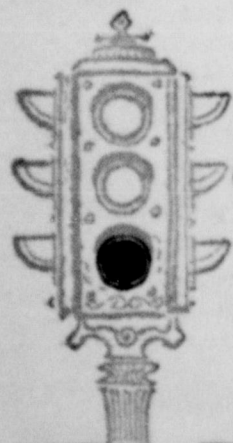
