Supreme Court Will Rule On School Dispute

The Supreme Court of Texas Wednesday granted application for writ of error in the case of Munday Independent School District vs. Knox City Independent School District, et al., and the case will probably be reviewed after the court returns from its summer recess.

The controversy dates back to July 10, 1951, when the Knox County School Board, acting on three petitions signed by approximately 98 percent of the qualified voters in the area involved, allocated 16,000 acres—about 42 percent—of the old Sunset School District to the Knox City district.

The Munday school board immediately sought an injunction against the transfer, and the case was tried in August before Judge Ben Charlie Chapman of Haskell, substituting for Judge L. M. Williams in the 50th Judicial District court. On Sept. 20, Judge Chapman rendered a decision upholding the county board's action and denying the injunction.

Munday then appealed to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland, and in March of this year, that court upheld Judge Chapman's decision.

The court also overruled a motion for rehearing, and Munday took the case to the Supreme Court with an application for writ of error.

It has been expected all along that the controversy would finally be settled in the Supreme Court.

STATE FFA CONVENTION TO BE IN DALLAS JULY 17

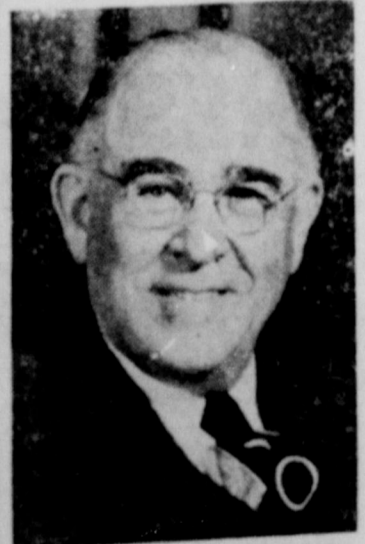
A National Future Farmer officer candidate from the Texas Future Farmers will be chosen at the annual State Convention July 17 in Dallas from the following nominees: Dwaine P. LOCAL GIRL TO RECEIVE DEGREE IN NURSING

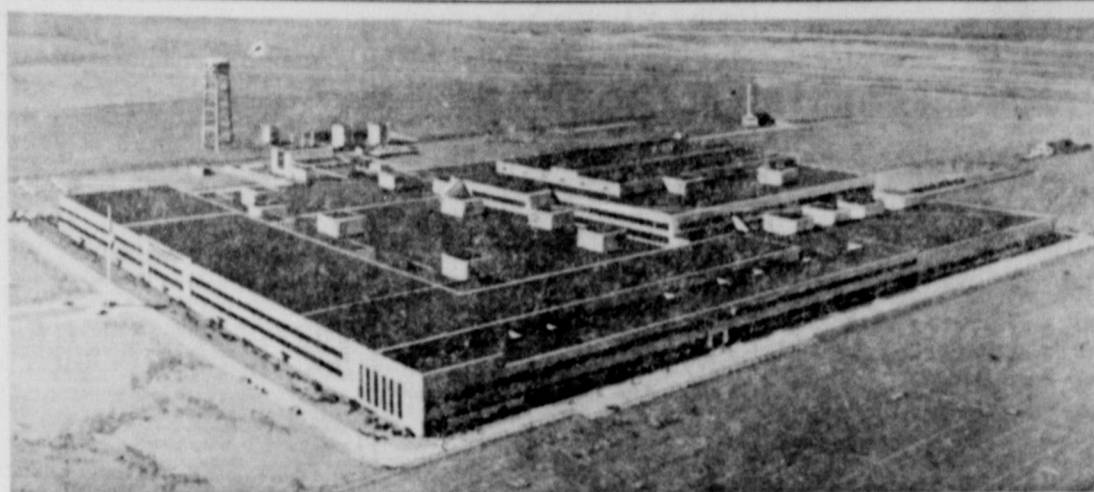

LEADS TEXAS USO APPEAL—R. R. Gilbert, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, has been named campaign chairman of the \$740,896 fund appeal for the USO in Texas. Selection of Mr. Gilbert was announced by Ben H. Wooten, chairman of the Texas United Defense Fund Committee which will conduct the appeal for this state's share of the national United Defense Fund goal of \$17,244,585.

A major portion of the Texas goal, as in 1951, will be included in Community Chest campaigns throughout the state this fall.

GM Builds New 'Two-Way' Plant in Texas



Construction work has begun on the new General Motors "dual purpose" plant (above) at Arlington, Texas, where GM's Buick-Oldsmobile-Pontiac Assembly Division will build a Grumman-designed airplane for the United States Navy and assemble passenger cars simultaneously. The flexible layout of the plant will permit combined aircraft-automotive operations or it can be converted in a matter of days to either

total aircraft or total automotive production, depending upon military requirements. The "dual purpose" plant idea was first proposed a year ago by C. E. Wilson, GM president, as a means of maintaining strong military and civilian production levels without disruption of plant facilities or working forces. Most of the Buick, Oldsmobile and Pontiac cars produced in the Arlington plant will be for distribution in Texas.

Six Injured In Auto Accidents Near Benjamin

Highway 82 between Benjamin and the Knox-King County line was the scene July 4 of three accidents that injured six people, while others narrowly escaped injury.

Mike Flores, 63, of Wichita Falls suffered possible chest injuries in a two-car collision five miles west of Benjamin and was admitted to the Knox County Hospital.

Others injured and hospitalized were Elvis Lee Watkins, 25, Carlsbad, N. M., shock and bruises; his wife, with a fractured right arm; and their three children, Jimmy Lee Watkins, 6, Eddie Watkins, 5, and Jessie, 11 months old. All suffered general body cuts and bruises.

The Watkins family was enroute to Oklahoma City to visit relatives when their car went out of control and off the road. The accident occurred on a section of the road where the shoulder surface is beneath the level of the highway.

Flores was injured when his car was struck from the rear by a car driven by A. A. Brinlee, 20, of Garland. Riding with Flores was Gilbert Flores, who suffered bruises and scratches.

In the third accident, John J. Kinger, 19, of Lubbock, lost control of his car and crashed into a telephone pole, but escaped injury.

The strip of road where the accidents occurred is being widened to forty feet, from its present width of eighteen feet.

PETERSBURG TEAM WINS BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported this week that Tommy Reynolds of Petersburg hurled a no-hit, no-run game July 4th to win the baseball tournament from Olton.

The Petersburg team swept through the eight-team tournament in high-scoring shape, winning the final game 7-0, after previously taking games by four and five runs.

The winning team was coached by Joe King, former Knox Citizen, and many members of the Petersburg team are known in Knox City, having been entered in basketball tournaments here.

Among those on the team were Mickey Meadows, Herbert Welch, Jimmy Kenney, Jackie Williams, Kenneth Meadows, Joe Smith and L. D. Williams.

In between games, the Petersburg fans presented King with a set of Samsonite luggage. He is leaving Petersburg, and taking over as coach of Anton High School.

TWO MEN INJURED IN RIG ACCIDENT

Two Abilene drillers were injured Tuesday when a heavy wrench fell from a rotary rig west of Knox City, where the men were working.

Lawrence G. Edwards, 25, was admitted to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, suffering from a fractured rib and minor bruises.

Warner B. Seay, 26, was resting Tuesday night at his Abilene home. He suffered a possible shoulder dislocation in the fall of the wrench.

The men were treated at the Knox County Hospital before being transferred to Abilene.

UNSAFE AUTOS KILL ONE TEXAN DAILY

In 1951 unsafe automobiles—with bad brakes, inadequate lights, faulty steering gear, etc.—killed an average of one person every day, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

For many years the laws of the state have required good brakes, adequate lights and other safety equipment on motor vehicles. However, under the old method of enforcement, officials of the department said, defects were not discovered until after accidents occurred.

The present State Inspection Law, they added, is merely an orderly, regular system to secure enforcement of the laws. There is no other way to make sure that all automobiles on our streets and highways are in safe operating condition.

The deadline by which all automobiles must be inspected is September 6, 1952. After that, another inspection will be required before cars can be registered in 1953.

Pipe Set for Completion of Conglomerate Discovery

Pipe was set at 5,854 feet Wednesday in the Deep Rock Oil Corp. No. 1 J. G. Hawkins, four miles east of Knox City, and operators are waiting for cement to harden before trying for completion in the conglomerate, a new pay section for this area.

The conglomerate was topped at 5,772 feet, and a drill-stem test last week at 5,779-89 feet recovered 5,250 feet of oil, with tool open two hours.

FARM PLACEMENT INTERVIEWERS WANTED

County Agent Bill Pallymeyer said last week that the Merit System Council is offering competitive examinations for Farm Placement Interviewer positions in the Texas Employment Commission.

Salary ranges from \$275 to \$335 per month.

Among the requirements are that the applicant must have been a resident of Texas at least five consecutive years immediately preceding the date of examination, and must not have taken the examination for the same position during the current calendar quarter.

Minimum qualifications are: High school graduation plus two years full time paid employment in agriculture which involved the hiring and supervision of agricultural laborers. One year of the indicated experience may be substituted for each 2 years of the required high school education.

Preference is given to veterans, their widows and orphans.

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MOST ADULTS BELIEVED TO HAVE HAD POLIO VIRUS

It is believed that the majority of adults have at one time been infected by the virus of poliomyelitis, without manifestations, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. In view of the above it is expected that most of the recognized cases will be among children.

Only a small proportion of infected persons are clinically recognizable. When symptoms

are manifested, they usually comprise an acute illness with fever, headache, and almost always a characteristic stiffness of the neck and spine. Some degree of paralysis may or may not occur during the first few days of illness.

During the poliomyelitis season the following measures are recommended by Dr. Cox:

1. Insist upon safe waste disposal so that human excreta is not exposed to disease trans-

mitting vectors.

2. Insist upon elimination of fly breeding sources and do not depend upon community wide airplane spraying or fogging machines as a substitute for basic sanitation.

3. Food supplies, including milk, must be protected against contamination.

4. Always use safe water for drinking or swimming.

5. Insist that garbage be kept in covered containers and disposed of by incineration or sanitary fill.

6. Eliminate all insanitary conditions on your own premises.

7. Practice good personal hygiene, with particular attention to personal cleanliness.

8. Avoid excessive physical strain during poliomyelitis season.

9. Isolation in bed of all children with fever pending diagnosis by physician.

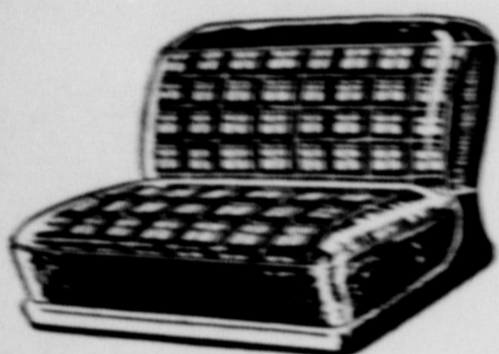

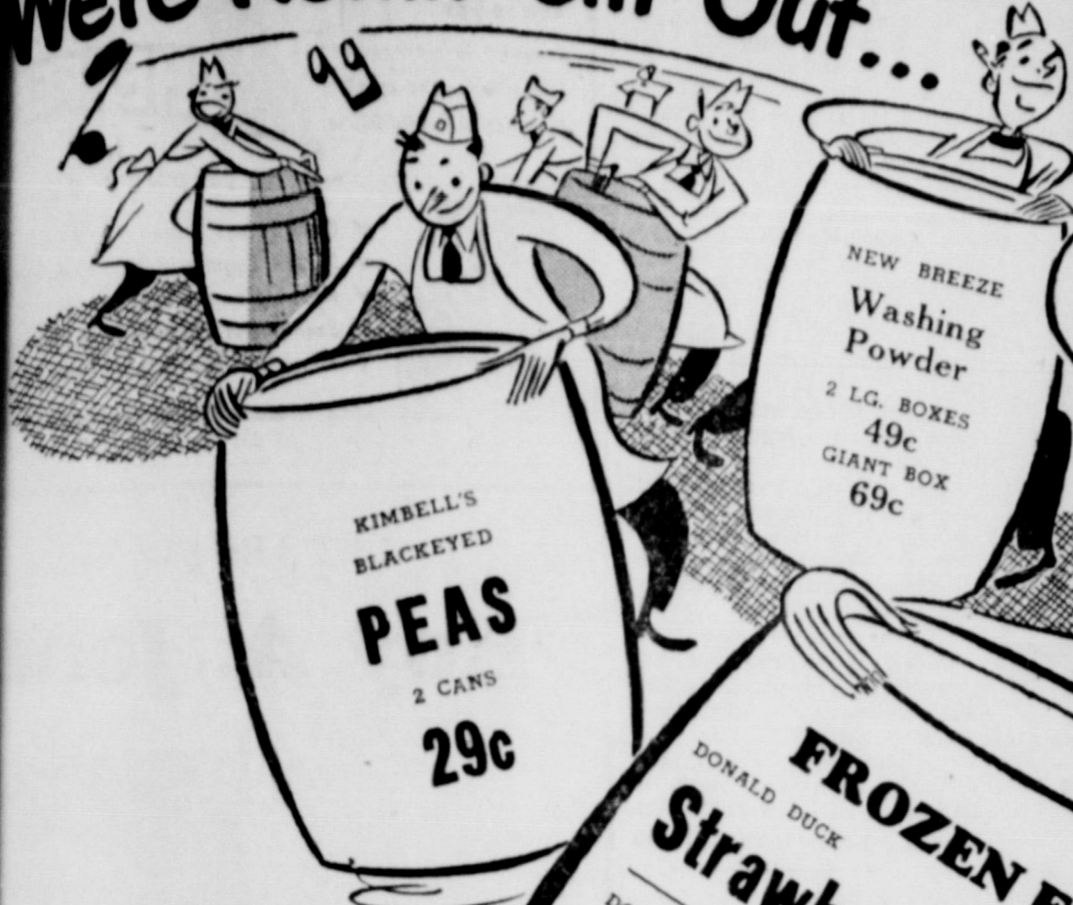
