For Best Results Apply Intersecticide as follows
 When putting in row when planting use about 300 pounds per acre, following with planter covering up.
 If applied after field crop is up, spread down row over cotton or other field crop at time of plowing, plows cover up, this way it serves a two-fold purpose dusting for insects that might be on small plants, and that, that is plowed in serves as plant food.
 For garden apply as same as for field crops.
 For fruit trees, shade trees etc, scrape soil to a depth of 4 or 5 inches, scraping back two or three feet around tree, put 15 to 20 pounds owing to size of tree, putting soil back and water if convenient.
 For shrubbery, rose-bushes etc, apply as same as for trees using less amount.
 For dusting flowers, shrubbery etc, for insects, bugs more effective to sprinkle with water

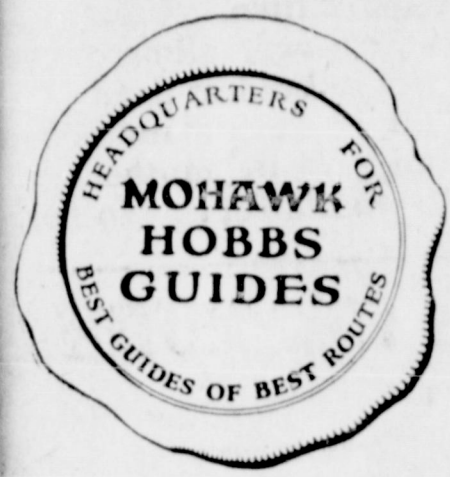
