

To Parents and Tax Payers of Knox City Independent School District

The Knox City School has reached the place where it is necessary to call upon the parents and tax payers for their fullest cooperation if the school is to maintain its present rank among the schools of the state.

We are appealing to the loyalty and good judgement of the tax payers of this district to make an extreme effort to pay their delinquent tax, and to pay their 1932 tax just as early as possible.

There is yet unpaid a part of the teachers salaries for the year 1931 for the reason of the large amount of unpaid taxes for that year. Right and justice demand that the teachers should be payed for their labor, and the responsibility for their failure to receive their salary must fall upon the tax payers rather than the board of trustees.

The same rule that demands that a teacher should do good work also demands that the employer should pay them. In this case the employer is the tax payer, and must bear the respon sibility for the welfare of the school.

It is the request and urgent desire of the board of trus tees that each individual tax payer give due consideration to the extreme need of the payment of taxes.
