



# OFFERED TO IDOL

Maidens and Children Unhappy Victims of Baal.

Archeologists Have Unearthed, in Ruins of Carthage, Tempin Where Infamous Rites Were Pricticed.

Unearthed among the rules of Carthage, in northern Africa, according to official notification received by French government from Count Byron Prorok, famous archeologist, is the great temple of Baal, where pagan priests practiced their indescribable human sacrifices centuries ago.

Count Prorok has sent word to his government that a set of sacrificial urns believed to contain the bones of maidens and children sacrificed to Baal have been unearthed and iden-

Identification of the temple of Baal beyond any question of doubt is possible through the discoveries already made. Baal, or Baal-Hammon, is the monstrous deity mentioned hundreds of times in the Bible and in other anclent writings. Students of the Bible and children who attend Sunday school remember passages in the Old Testament telling how the Israelites were warned against this idolatrous worship and its infamous practices.

The chief characteristic of the Baal-Hammon worship was the sacrifice of human beings in cruel and varied forms. Each temple of Baal contained a huge and monstrous idol, usually of bronze, but sometimes of stone, and it was to this idol that the victims were sacrificed. Occasionally young children were offered up, but usually It was some beautiful maiden who was chosen to become the "bride of Baal."

Sometimes the victims were con sumed by fire. Frequently they were subjected to longer and even more atroclous torments. When the victim was to perish by fire, three different methods were used. In every case, however, the maiden was first placed "in the arms of Baal," or, rather, on a sort of platform on the knees of the seated idol between the arms.

By one method fire was made to spout from the mouth of the overhanging head. By another the platform itself was heated redhot. By a third the platform was tipped backward by a mechanical contrivance and the victim was hurled into a seething flery furnice to the interior of the



## TAKES PLACE OF THREATS

Following Stinnes Reconstruction Plan, Emphasizes Trend to Rapprochement

Paris .- A forward step in the strengthening of Franco-German eco-nomic relations is marked by the report that French potash interests in Alsace have formed an agreement with their German rivals in order to curb competition, particularly in the Eastern markets.

This, following closely on the Stinnes agreement for the reconstruction of the devastated regions, served to emphasize the new tendency to work for rapprochement with Germany instead of attempting to get results by a series of futile threats.

Powerful French metallurgical inmors, are now attempting to arrange nent with the German ocal and coke barons which, if successful, will create a Franco-German steel and iron-producing combination that will certainly be the most powerful in Europe, and, if extensively pushed, might be a formidable rival of America in Continental European markets, to say nothing of Eng-

Although local metallurgical magare reticent regarding their plans, it is known that Louis Louchour, former Minister of the Devastated Regions, has spent considerable time recently in the Nancy and Brier mine regions, and, inasmuch as h framed the Weisbaden agreements with Dr. Walter Rathenau, the late German Foreign Minister, it is deemed likely that he has a finger in the international pie.

Furthermore, President Millerand, who before the war was general counsel for the Comite des Forges, the central organization representing the metallurgical interests, is an outspoken advocate of helping Germany to her feet. During his premiership, Millerand emphasized that it good business for the creditor Nation

to help its debtor toward solvability Although the President's power is limited by the Constitution, his in fluence through personal persuasion among bankers and manufacturers is tremendous. It is quite possible therefore, that President Millerand is quietly, but doggedly, taking advantage of the adjournment of the Par liament to direct France's policy to ward Germany on the basis of a rapproachement instead of threats.

SEASONABLE FOODS

A nice dish for luncheon which will be both nourishing and good to look



at is Stuffed Peppers. - Parboil four green peppers, removing the seeds and white fiber; after five min utes drain and

olunge them into cold water. Stuff with the following: One-half cupful freshly-cut cheese, cut fine; blespoonful of grated onion, two upfuls of boiled rice, one teaspoonful of sait, one-half tenspoonful of paprika, dash of red pepper and onefourth of a cupful of milk and onehalf cupful of coarsely chopped peanuts. Mix well before stuffing the peppers. Place in a pan, pour around one cupful of hot water and bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes, or until the peppers are soft.

Lunch Cake .- Take one-third of a cupful of softened butter, one and one third cupfuls of light brown sugar, two eggs, one-half cupful of milk, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one half teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of grated nutmeg, onehalf cupful of raisins and one and three-fourths cupfuls of flour. Put all the ingredients into a bowl and beat for three minutes. Bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven.

Summer Squash,-Cook small ones cut in quarters or larger ones in slices. When tender drain and serve with a rich white sauce, adding onehalf cupful of minced cheese.

SOME WAYS WITH PEAS

Peas are one of our most nourishing vegetables; belonging to the proteins they take the place of meat in

Green Pea Soup .- Take one pint of green peas, a quart of stock, six small onlous, a small bunch of mint, a bunch of parsley, a large handful of spinach, two tablespoonfuls of butter and a tenspoonful of salt. Wash the spinach, parsley, and mint, add the peas and salt to the stock with the other vegetables and cook until soft. Put all through a sieve and reheat. Season with butter and salt and serve hot.

Pea Souffie,-Cook a pint of peas until soft, put them through a sleve, add two tablespoonfuls of butter, a pint of milk and the yolks of three eggs. Season with salt and pepper and whites Pour into a buttered dish and bake twenty

Salmon and Pea Salad. Flake a can of salmon, removing the skin and bones. Take an equal amount cooked peas and mix well with the Serve on lettuce with boiled dressing with a sour pickle chopped in bits.

Combination Salad .- Take one cupful of peanuts cut in bits, two cupfuls peas, ene-half cupful of oll s minced, a bit of onion and a mayon naise dressing to serve on lettuce, Seasonings of salt and cayenne may be added to taste.

Peas and Peppers,-Take the tops from six peppers, remove the seeds and soak in a strong brine over night. Moisten with liquor from a can of pens, fill the shells with one-half cupful of minced meat, one cupful of peas, one-half cupful of bread crumbs, a little onlon Juice, salt and pepper to taste. Bake until the peppers are

Green Gage Sherbet.-Take a quart of green gage plums, stew and put them through a sieve, add the juice of two lemons, one and one-half cupfuls of sugar and two tablespoonfuls of softened gelatin. Cook the sugar with half a cupful of water until a thick strap is formed; add the other ingreidents, chill and freeze.
