Three Killed In Three-Car Crash

Three Knox City Negroes, Jessie Miles, his wife Sarah, and Alberta Trotty, sister of Mrs. Miles, died in the flaming wreckage of their car when it was involved in a three-car collision on the Knox City-Munday highway Saturday night, Dec. 22.

A fourth rider in the car, which was being driven by Miles, was Hollie Trotty, 36, husband of Alberta. Trotty was in the Knox County Hospital suffering second degree burns on face and hands.

Funeral services for the three victims were held Monday, Dec. 24, from the St. Paul Baptist Church in Knox City. Elder Washington, of Stamford, officiated.

According to reports, the accident occurred when the car driven by Miles attempted to pass a car driven by a Latin-American, Alfredo Valdez. The Miles vehicle was struck by an oncoming car driven by Ed Wynn, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Wynn of Knox City, and knocked off the highway where it overturned and burst into flames.

Trotty crawled from the burning car, his clothing ablaze. He was chased into a nearby field by Valdez, who caught him and extinguished the blaze.

City Takes Steps To Secure Low-Cost Housing Project

The city commission of Knox City has taken the preliminary steps toward securing a 50-unit Federal low-cost housing project here, Mayor Guy Glenn announced this week.

A committee, or local Housing Authority, has been appointed and will be in charge of the project. Committee members, who will serve without pay, are Judge Lewis M. Williams, Roy A. Baker, W. L. Collins, Otis Harbert and J. M. Averitt.

The city will ask the Public Housing Authority to conduct a survey in Knox City to determine the city's need of the project from a standpoint of public health, safety and crime prevention.

Units would be available only to families of low income, \$200 per month or less, and rents would be charged according to the tenants' ability to pay.

After forty years, the housing units would become the property of the city.

Mayor Glenn emphasized that the project would not cost the city anything, and would not increase city taxes.

Mayor Glenn added that there will be a 60-day waiting period before further steps can be taken.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

The Commissioners Court of Knox County will receive sealed bids on or before 10:00 a. m. January 14, 1952, for all materials and labor for the complete wall repairing and repainting the interior of the Knox County Courthouse. All bids are to be submitted on the basis of the following specifications for both labor and materials.

Scope of Work

The work to be done by the painting contractor includes the furnishing of all materials, labor, tools, and equipment which shall be required to complete the painting and finishing the wall as specified.

Preparation of Surfaces

Painting Contractor shall be wholly responsible for finish of

his work and therefore shall not commence any part of it until surface is in proper condition in every respect.

On old paint, the surfaces shall first be swept down to remove all dust and where it is, sealing shall be wire brushed and scraped.

All cracks in plastered wall and ceilings are to be closed according to method of repairing. The small hair cracks will be filled with plaster patch powder and water mixture applied by surface brushing only. The other larger cracks will be repaired by the complete removal of plaster to the metal plaster lathe to a minimum width of 2" along the cracked area. Large cracks from which 2" plaster have been removed will be filled with two successive coats of plaster of same type now on walls. The second or finish coat will be finished in sand finish to correspond to wall area.

On all East and West stairs, walls are badly deteriorated or loose plaster will be completely removed to the metal plaster lathe. All metal plaster lathe will be examined and resealed where needed in order for it to be in suitable condition for receiving the new plaster coats. The new plaster will consist of three coats of the same type

removed.

The best grade of paint.

Number of Coats

All patched hair cracks, all scaled areas, all new plaster repairing large cracks and all new plaster on stairway walls will receive one coat of sizing. After 48 hours drying time, the sized areas will receive one coat of paint. After 24 hours drying time, the entire interior walls and ceilings will receive one coat with an additional or second coat on entire walls and ceiling, only, and the lower floor hall ceiling. All windows will receive one coat on interior surfaces.

JANUARY EXAMINATIONS FOR DRAFT INCREASED

The number of Texas draft registrants to be examined at armed forces examining stations in January has been raised from 1,880 to 4,271. Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced this week.

Announcement of the original group of 1,880 was made in early December. General Wakefield said his headquarters received the call for the additional 2,391 just before Christmas.

The 2,391 men to be selected will be from among men who have been examined before and failed to pass mental tests given by the armed forces. Under provisions of 1951 amendments to the draft law, these men must be reexamined because of lowered mental standards now authorized as acceptable.

Among men to be included will be some whose liability for service under the draft law has been extended until age 35. Local boards have been called upon not to order any registrant for reexamination who appears to be eligible for any other deferred classification.

The state Selective Service director said the program of examining men who previously have failed mental tests will "go on for months." He said he was not able to estimate how many would be reexamined before the program is over.

KNOX COUNTY PMA CHOOSES 12 PRACTICES

The county PMA committee has selected 12 practices for the 1952 Agricultural Conservation Program in Knox County. Jess Gilpin, administrative officer, has announced.

Meeting with technicians of the Soil Conservation Service and the county agent recently, the PMA officials selected these practices:

Construction of terraces, construction of diversion terraces, establishing a permanent waterway to permit better water penetration, bringing cold forming subsoil to the surface of sandy cropland to prevent erosion, construction of earthen dams, application of potash and phosphate, growing of a green manure crop of summer legumes, establishment of satisfactory cover of winter legumes, increasing the total farm acreage of biennial sweetclover, elimination of destructive plants on non-crop pasture and range land, and establishment of or

improvement of permanent pasture by seeding adapted pasture grasses, legumes or mixtures of grasses and legumes.

of the Intention of the City of Knox City to Build Rent Houses for Low Income Groups as Made and Provided for by the "Housing Authorities Law" of the State of Texas.

On the 1st day of January, 1952, the city commissioners of the City of Knox City, Texas, met at a called session in said City, in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order at 10 o'clock A. M. by G. T. Glenn, Mayor; and on the roll call the following members of the city commission were found to be present: Messrs. Allen Lowrey and Otto Lawson. Absent: None.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Lawson, who moved its adoption:

A Resolution Finding and Declaring That There Exists a Need for the Housing Authority of the City of Knox City, Texas, to Function.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION of the city of Knox City, Texas as follows:

SECTION 1. The Commissioners of the City of Knox City, Texas, hereby determines, finds and declares in pursuance of the "Housing Authorities Law" of the State of Texas, that:

1. Unsanitary and unsafe inhabited dwelling accommodations exist in the City of Knox City, Texas; and

2. There is a shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accomo-

dations in the City of Knox City, Texas, available to families of low income at rentals they can afford; and

3. There is a need for the Housing Authority of the City of Knox City, Texas, to function.

SECTION 2. In accordance with the foregoing findings, the housing authority of the City of Knox City, Texas, is authorized to transact business and exercise its powers pursuant to the "Housing Authorities Law" of the State of Texas.

SECTION 3. The Mayor of said City be and he hereby is directed to file the necessary certificate relative to the appointment of the commissioners and designation of the first chairman of said Housing authority in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Knox City, Texas.

SECTION 4. That the shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations for families of low income compels such families to occupy unsafe, unsanitary and overcrowded dwelling accommodations, and causes an increase and spread of disease and crime, thereby creating an emergency and making it necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety that this resolution become effective without delay, and therefore this resolution shall take effect and be in force immedi-

ately upon its adoption.

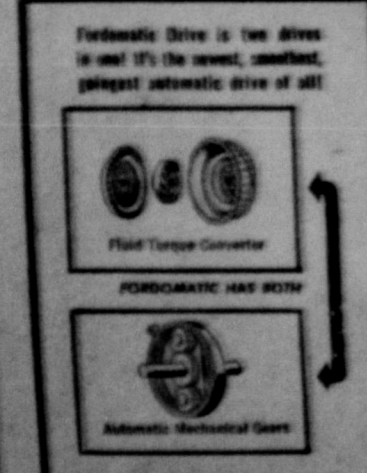
