USDA Employee Cutback Does Not Effect Knox Co.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices will have up to 3,000 fewer employees this month under a cutback ordered by the Agriculture Department.

The cutback, called a reduction in force, is linked directly to the elimination of the Rural Environmental Assistance Program.
Some of the offices reduced employees' salaries and working time and others terminated jobs by retirement for those eligible.
A few counties did not have to cut back the number of employees because they had done so earlier by not hiring replacements for people who retired.
Those counties that did not have any cutbacks were Knox, Taylor, and Fisher.

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Rep. Heatly To Chair Ag Export Committee

Texas House Speaker Price Daniel, Jr., announced Monday the appointment of an Interim House Agricultural Export Committee and designated Representative Bill Heatly of Paducah as Chairman.

The Committee, established by House Simple Resolution No. 118, is directed to study the exportation of Texas agricultural and livestock products and to make recommendations with respect to increasing exportation and improving the well-being of farmers and ranchers in such a way that the people as a whole will benefit.

The other members of the Committee named by Daniel include Agriculture Commissioner John C. White and House

Committee on Agriculture Chairman Joe Hubenak of Rosenberg, both of appointed by virtue of their positions.

Also appointed to the committee by Daniel were representative John Hoestenbach of Odessa, one of the three House members appointees; David Witts, a Dallas attorney and rancher who has expertise in the export field; and J.D. Sartwell of Houston and Sealy, president of Port City Stock Yards.

"I am confident that this House Agricultural Export Committee will, through its study and recommendations, make significant contributions to the Texas' export programs and to agricultural enterprises throughout the State," Daniel said.

HORSE VACCINATIONS URGED

With summer weather and rains, mosquitoes are becoming more plentiful. And, since they transmit sleeping sickness to horses steps should be taken now to protect these animals.

All horses, mules, asses and ponies should be vaccinated for the three types of equine encephalomyelitis (horse sleeping sickness)—Eastern and Western equine encephalomyelitis and Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE). VEE caused many horse deaths when it ravaged Mexico and southern Texas in 1971.

The three diseases are caused by different viruses carried by mosquitoes and therefore separate vaccinations are required.

Vaccine for the Eastern and western strains of the disease is in a combined form and annual booster shots should be given to horses after the initial vaccination. The VEE vaccine provides ample protection for 18 months. The agent urges that horses not vaccinated since the 1971 emergency be revaccinated as soon as possible. Also colts vaccinated while under six months of age should be revaccinated.

The Texas Animal Health Commission requires that all horses moving to shows be vaccinated for VEE.

Death often results after animals contract encephalomyelitis. Outward signs of the three diseases include depression, lack of appetite and drowsiness, animals may frequently grind their teeth and stagger when moving.

Local veterinarians can provide information on vaccination procedures.

TRACTORS CAN BE SAFE

Competent operation use of protective equipment and proper maintenance could prevent most tractor and farm machinery accidents.

And National Farm Safety Week July 25-31 is a good time to review farm safety and to take preventative action where necessary.

The National Safety Council, which sponsors National Farm Safety Week along with the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that tractor accidents claim from 800 to 1,000 lives and cause thousands of injuries annually.

More than half of all tractor accident fatalities involve overturns. Roll-over protective cabs and frames could eliminate more than 90 percent of the fatalities. Many farmers do not have roll-over protection on their equipment due to the investment it requires. However, such protection is important and is being considered

Even Though No Draft, Young Men Must Register

AUSTIN -- Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, reminded young men that they still must register with Selective Service even though there is no draft.

Glantz urged those men who have not registered to do so promptly, saying, "Failure to register is a violation of Federal Law and could result in prosecution by the Department of Justice."

The President's authority to induct men into the Armed Forces expired on July 1, 1973. The Nixon Administration does not plan to seek an extension of this authority, and the Defense Department is relying on volunteer enlistments to supply military manpower.

Glantz emphasized that only the authority to induct expired. All other provisions of the Military Selective Service Act remain in force. The annual lottery will be held, young men will continue to register, and their local boards will continue to classify them as to their availability for possible military service should Congress authorize the resumption of inductions in the event of a national emergency.

The State Director said the law requires all male persons, except certain nonimmigrant aliens, to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or after their 18th birthday. He said: "Young men have three legal obligations: (1) they must

register at age 18 (2) they must notify their local draft board when they change address, and (3) they must carry their draft cards with them until their liability for service expires, for most men this is age 26."

The Colonel explained that Selective Service is undergoing a major reorganization and that a Selective Service goes into a standby operation, no inductions are taking place. Many local board offices are being relocated, with the result of fewer draft board offices in Texas. Glantz said there are places of registration provided in each Texas county for the convenience of young men in registering.

Three Accidents Occur in County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of June, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1973 shows a total of 37 accidents resulting in one person killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June, 1973 shows a total of 559 accidents resulting in 27 persons killed and 331 persons injured as compared to June, 1972 with 529 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 347 persons injured. This was 30 more accidents, seven more fatalities, and 16 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 27 traffic deaths for the month of June, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Hale, eight; Swisher, four; Parker, three; Lamb, two; and Briscoe, Deaf Smith, Hutchinson, Ochiltree, Potter, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Stonewall, and Wichita counties, one each.

No Path to Revenue

Will an increased capital gains tax pour more money into the Treasury? Not likely. Evidence indicates the higher the tax on capital gains, the longer people will defer taking their gains. Fewer gains taken mean fewer gains taxed and potentially lower revenues to the government. A 1970 survey showed that if the capital gains tax hadn't increased, people would have taken \$3.5 billion more in gains... yielding more revenue.

An equitable capital gains tax would encourage investors to turn over their investments and would increase government revenues.

Money To Be Available For Conservation Work

Arche Lieb, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, stated that money will soon be available for producers in Knox County to carry out conservation work under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Applications for assistance under this program can be made now at the SCS office in Knox City.

The GPCP offers assistance for a complete conservation program on the farm or ranch. Funds are limited and producers desiring to carry out conservation work this fiscal year should make their application

Producers recently applying for participation in the program include Eugene A. Brown of Rhineland, Jack Idol of Benjamin, Leon Speer of Vernon, Louis Baty of Gilliland, and Bob McWhorter of Munday.

Conservation work is now in progress on several GPCP contracts in the area. Parallel terraces and water way construction is being carried out on the August Joe Bellinghousen farms north of Munday. Construction of parallel terraces and waterway on the Tommy Richardson farm west of Knox City is scheduled to start soon.

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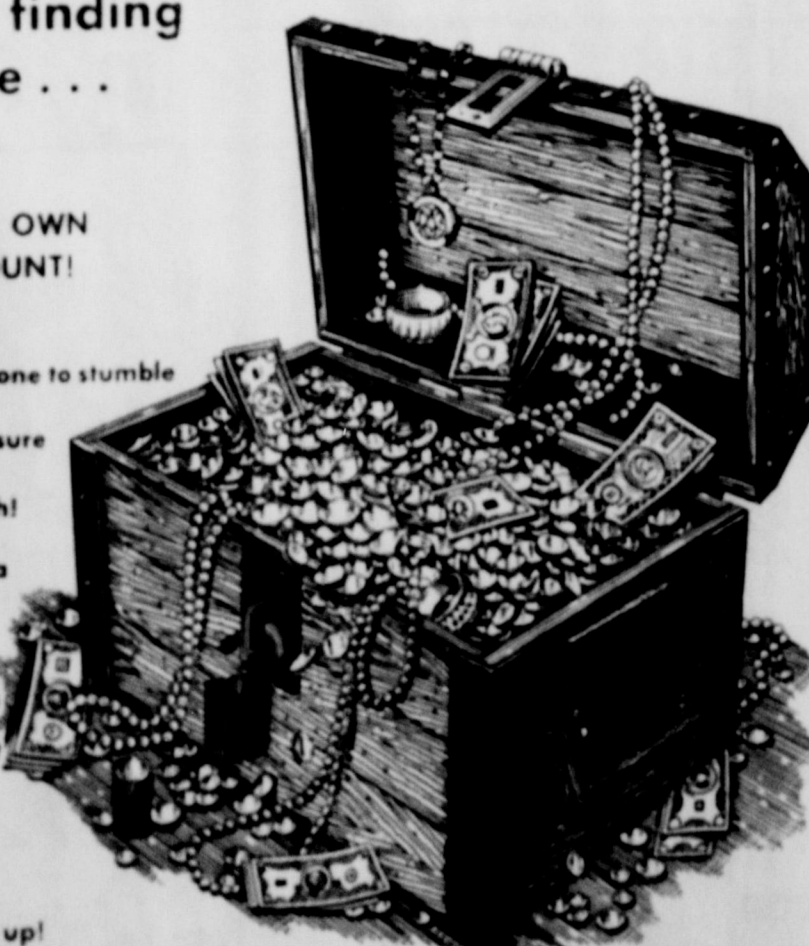
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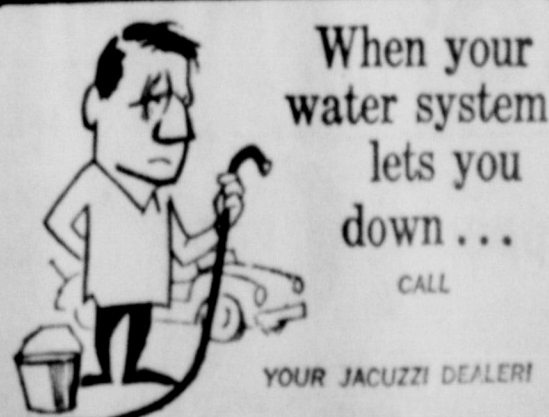
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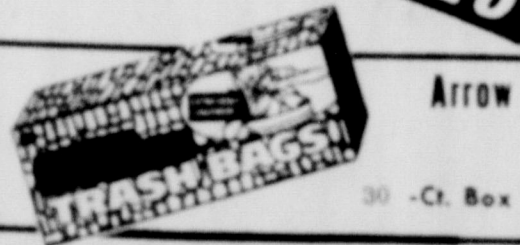
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
