ROBERT S. KIMZEY DEAD. Robert Kimzey, who was reported very low last week, died last Friday morning. 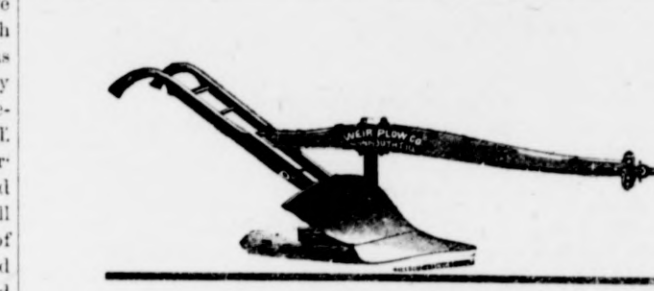

### CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—The name of this body shall be Callahan County Baptist Association.

ART. 2.—This Association shall be composed of members of the churches in our Union, chosen by the churches and bearing statistical evidence certifying their appointment, or by other means giving satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

ART. 3.—The leading object of this Union shall be to promote a united effort among the churches to extend and encourage the preaching of the pure Gospel by all proper means.

ART. 4.—Contributions for missions, or for any benevolent purpose, when sent to this body by individual churches or persons shall be appropriated as directed by the donor.

ART. 5.—Should a church belonging to this body become disorderly or unsound in doctrine, the Association, on becoming convinced of the fact, shall have the right to drop such unsound or disorderly church from this Union.

ART. 6.—The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as the body may from year to year appoint.

ART. 7.—There shall be elected by ballot on the first day of each annual session, or as soon thereafter as practicable, a Moderator, a Clerk, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall hold their office till their successors are elected.

ART. 8.—Each church shall be entitled to three Messengers, and for every additional twenty members over fifty, one additional Messenger; provided that each church in addition to this number may elect and send their ordained ministers.

ART. 9.—Any church esteemed sound in doctrine and in the ordinances of the Bible, may be received into this body, provided it has been constituted upon some recognized declaration of faith.

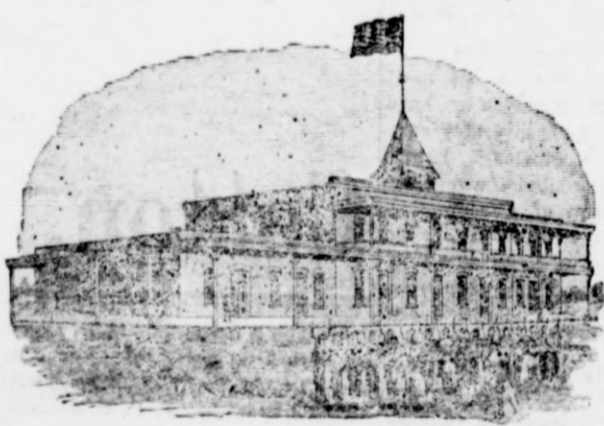
ART. 10.—There shall be appointed at each annual session of this body an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to prosecute the mission work of this body. The officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of this Board.

ART. 11.—This Constitution may be changed at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members.

9. Appoint Corresponding Messengers.
10. Miscellaneous Business.

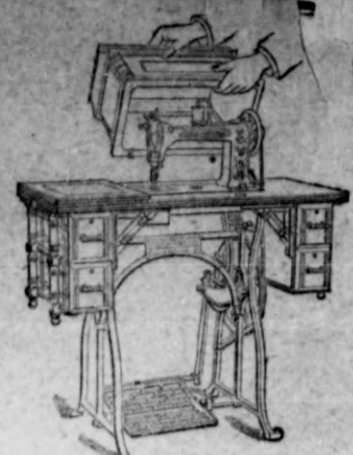
