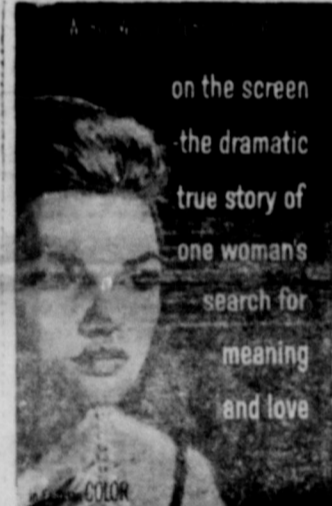

## 13th Cong. District Being Eyed For One Dis. Between Burleson and Purcell

AUSTIN — A bill to revise congressional districts would put Cong. Omar Burleson of Anson and Cong. Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls into the same district. Rep. R. L. Hale of San Antonio introduced the bill to get away from the situation which has part of Bexar County (San Antonio) in the same district with Odessa and another part in the same district with Laredo.

His bill would retain Bexar County single district and attach the balance of its population to a South-west Texas area, taking north Bexar County out of the district with Con. O. C. Fisher of San Angelo. To accomplish this, north and east Texas districts were squeezed together with the result that Burleson, who has the smallest district of Texas from a population standpoint and one of the largest geographically, would be nudged into the 13th district with Purcell. The counties in the 13th district proposed by the Hale bill are Taylor, Callahan, East-

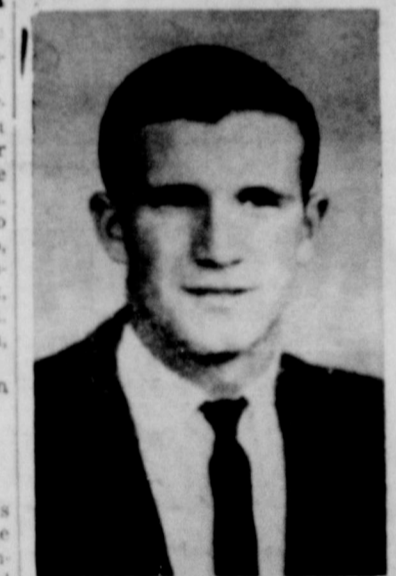
CONNIE GILBERT

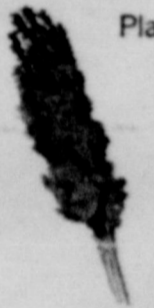
FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK

The Texas Public School system, established 113 years ago, has been a rich training ground for the youth which has helped make our nation great in the field of government, art science and technology. In the White House, in museums, in the oil fields and now in outer space, Texas Public School graduates have pioneered new frontiers for the nation and the world.

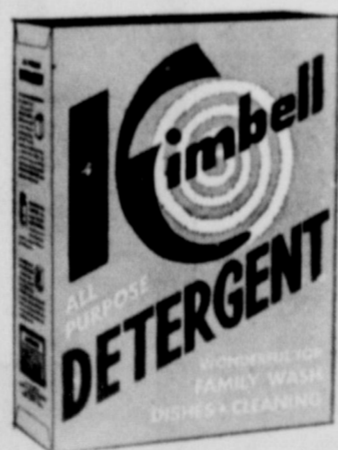

berts, a YWA representative of Minneapolis, Minnesota as the speaker. Miss Roberts presented a review of YWA work in her area.

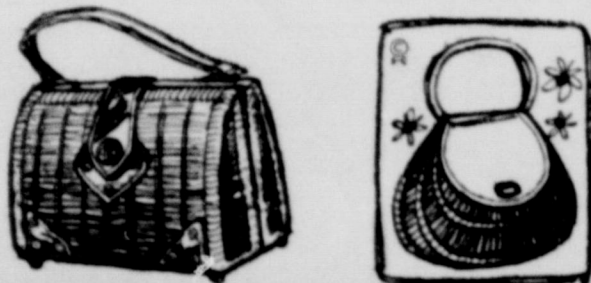
The Sunday School lesson Sunday morning was taught by Mrs. Caldwell and a message was also given by Mr. Scanlon.

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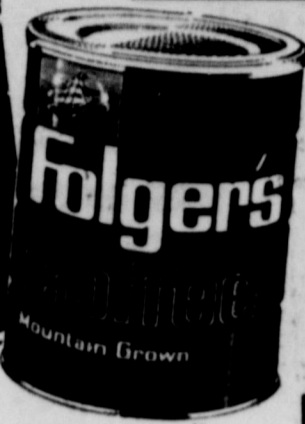

**IN SOCIAL SECURITY**

Edwin Draughon, social security manager in Vernon, noted today that the 1965 amendments to the social security law liberalized the conditions under which benefits are paid to people who continue working after age 65.

"Here are the new rules for taxable years after 1965," Mr. Draughon said: If you earn \$1500 or less in a year, you get all the benefits.

If you earn more than \$1500 in

a year while you are under 72, the general rule is that \$1 in benefits to you (and your family) will be withheld for each \$2 you earn from \$1500 to \$2700. In addition, \$1 benefits will be withheld for each \$1 of earnings over \$2700.

"There is an exception," Mr. Draughon explained. "Regardless of total earnings in a year, benefits are payable for any month in which you neither earn wages of more than \$125 nor perform

substantial services in self-employment. Benefits are also payable for all months in which you are 72 or older, regardless of the amount of your earnings in months after you reach 72."

According to Mr. Draughon, the decision as to whether you are performing substantial services depends on the time you devote to your business, the kind of services you perform, how services compare with those you performed in past years, and other circumstances of your particular case.

Mr. Draughon added that earnings from work of any kind, whether or not covered by social security, must be counted (except

tips of less than \$20 a month with any one employer.) This means total wages (not just take-home pay) and all net earnings from self-employment must be added together in figuring your earnings for the year. Income from savings and certain royalties received after age 65 are not counted.

Mr. Draughon stated that for more information about working after applying for benefits affects your retirement or survivors insurance payments, you should ask your local social security office for booklet No. 23. The social security office at 1728 Fannin Street in Vernon will be glad to send you one of these booklets free.

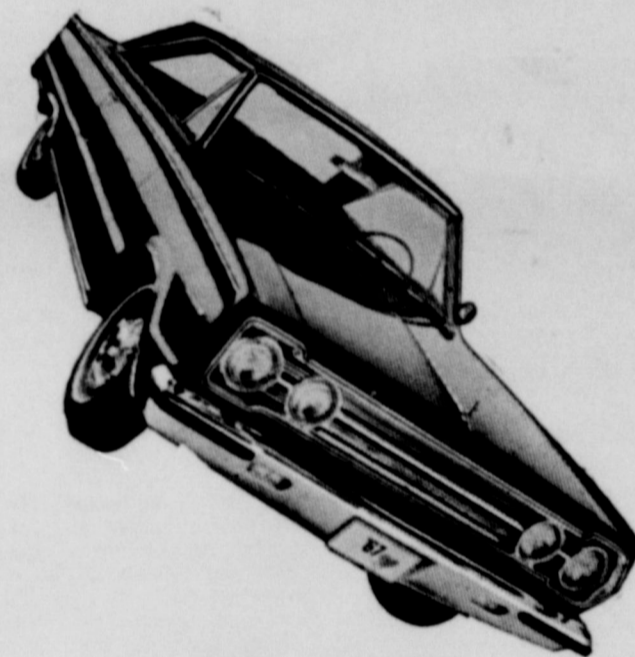

## Truscott H. D. Club Study On Retardation

A program on "Mental Retardation" was presented to the Truscott Home Demonstration Club Thursday, February 23, by Mrs. Camille Clayton.  
"Mental retardation becomes most noticeable at three times" she said. "The first period of birth to three years when slowness in physical and mental development is observed. The second period is when a child enters school and displays a general disability in learning. The third period is when an adult shows an inability to remain independent or meet requirements of employment."

She pointed out that many people are never actually regarded as mentally retarded. They get social promotion in school, and later hold jobs, but will be among the first to lose jobs to automation or in an economic recession. She named persons having a high risk of having mentally retarded children as being those who marry close relatives, women who do not get good prenatal care, and those who do not take children to a doctor frequently during early childhood. The largest groups of retarded children cluster in the lower social-economic groups.

She pointed out that children from low income families will probably test lower on I.Q. because their environmental experiences have been so limited, and that pre-school programs can help this.

Eight members and two guests attended the meeting in the club room at which Mrs. Idoma Chowning presided. A letter was read thanking the club for its Christmas gifts to the Vernon State hospital.
