Greyhounds Lose To Shamrock, Play Here Friday At 8

The City Greyhounds lost to Shamrock Irish 22-0 Monday night when they played the Shamrock team at the Panhandle last night. The Greyhounds scored 290 yards rushing and were close on three different occasions to score a touchdown.

The Greyhounds then began another drive losing running back Charlie Lieb on the 45 and pushing all the way to the 9-yard line before finally being stalled. Shamrock made two more touchdowns, one on a 60-yard reverse and the other on a 45-yard pass, making the final score 22-0.

Coach Charles Hibbitts re-

ported that the KC team will play its first home game this Friday night at Greyhound Stadium at 8 p.m. It will compete with the undefeated Crowell Wildcats and said that the coaching staff expects a great contest.

Bob Burnett Editing Tech Law Review

Lubbock - Bob D. Burnett, senior law student of Knox City, is serving as Leading Articles editor for the fall 1970 issue of the Texas Tech Law Review, scholarly journal of the Texas Tech University School of Law.

Participation in Law Review work is a recognition of superior academic achievement and an unusual educational opportunity. Students who rank at the top of their class are invited to serve as Law Review candidates.

After completion of a publishable article, candidates become members of the Law Review staff, moving up to positions on the Board of Editors. Members edit and supervise the work of fellow board members and of new candidates.

Texas Tech's Law Review published its first two issues in the 1969-70 academic year. The fall 1970 issue - Volume 2, Number 1 - is scheduled for distribution in November to more than 600 subscribers principally for libraries of other law schools and of attorneys.

The fall 1970 issue will contain lead articles by Chief Justice John Brown of the Fifth Circuit U. S. Court of Appeals and Texas Tech Law Prof. Reed Quilliam. Also included will be approximately four student notes and 12 case comments, all written by the student members of the Law Review.

Burnett is the son of Mrs. Bobby Burnett and the late Mr. Burnett of Knox City and is a graduate of Midwestern University. He was awarded his bachelor's degree in history and economics in 1968.

These are the first three and most cherished of our freedoms as guaranteed by the Bill of Rights in our U.S. Constitution. They are the basic fundamentals of our lives, either one of which most of us would defend with our very lives.

It would be foolish to try to list either of these - or the order of their importance. This order would vary as often as there are individuals, groups or organizations.

For the newspaper fraternity, surely Freedom of the Press would receive top billing, for without a free press the chances are that all of our other freedoms would be curtailed.

Now the American newspapers are celebrating 200 years of freedom - 1770's through 1970's. Our meager store of knowledge and limited research fail to give us a reason why, but it is important knowledge regardless of origin.

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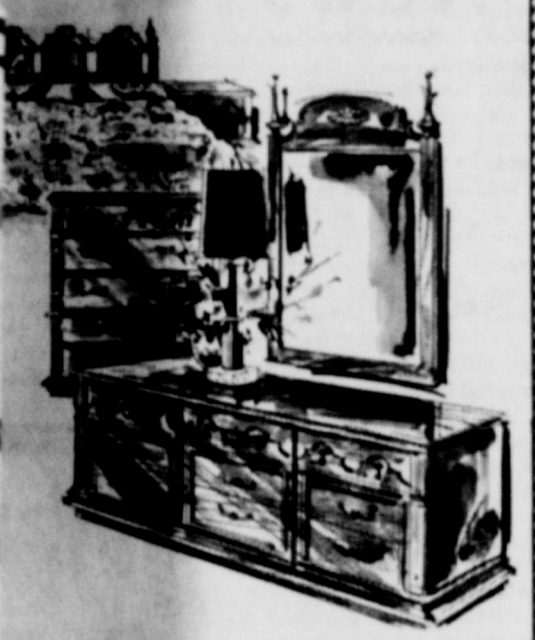

Knox County Observes National 4-H Week

Knox City - Knox County's more than 300 4-H Club members are having a celebration, and they aren't the only ones. According to Herman Collier and Elaine Bowman, County Extension agents, the local 4-H'ers are joining nearly 4 million others throughout the nation in observance of National 4-H Week, October 4 to 10.

By pledging their head, heart, hands, and health to their club, community and country, these 4-H'ers demonstrate concern for their fellow man. Appropriately enough, they have selected as their theme for national observance "We Care".

Opportunities in 4-H and the opportunity to join 4-H are greater now than ever before. Young people between the ages of 9 and 19 qualify for membership whether they live on farms, in towns, cities, or suburbs. Those of all cultural and economic backgrounds are welcome too.

In the modern 4-H program the major part of the 4-H story is project work. Members choose from some 100 projects dealing with everyday learning experiences that fit them and the places where they live. Through their project work and club activities, they develop into responsible citizens, improve our environment, and build nutrition and health. They also engage in community development, strengthen family life, promote education, chart careers, and help spread the 4-H learn-by-doing idea around the world.

The Cooperative Extension Service of the Texas A&M University provides each 4-H member with the latest re-

search information and up-to-date methods for carrying on the projects selected. Using this information, the 4-H'ers develop his or her project, keeps records, prepares educational exhibits, and makes show-and-tell presentation for the benefit of others.

However, projects aren't the whole story in 4-H. Knox County 4-H boys and girls have fun, go to camp, take special trips, attend dinners, banquets, and rallies; participate in area and state fairs, earn awards - including scholarships, work with younger 4-H members, enroll in leadership and citizenship programs, and discover new and interesting ways to enjoy life while living it.

4-H is part of the national educational system of the Co-operative Extension Service in which the U. S. Department of Agriculture, State Land-Grant Universities, and counties share. The Extension Service gives national leadership and the State Extension Services give state leadership. Two non-government organizations work with Extension to coordinate private support and perform numerous other important service functions. They are the National 4-H Service Committee and the National 4-H Club Foundation.

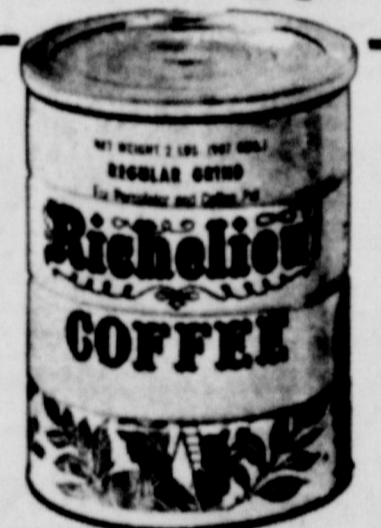


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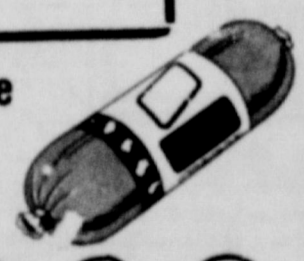

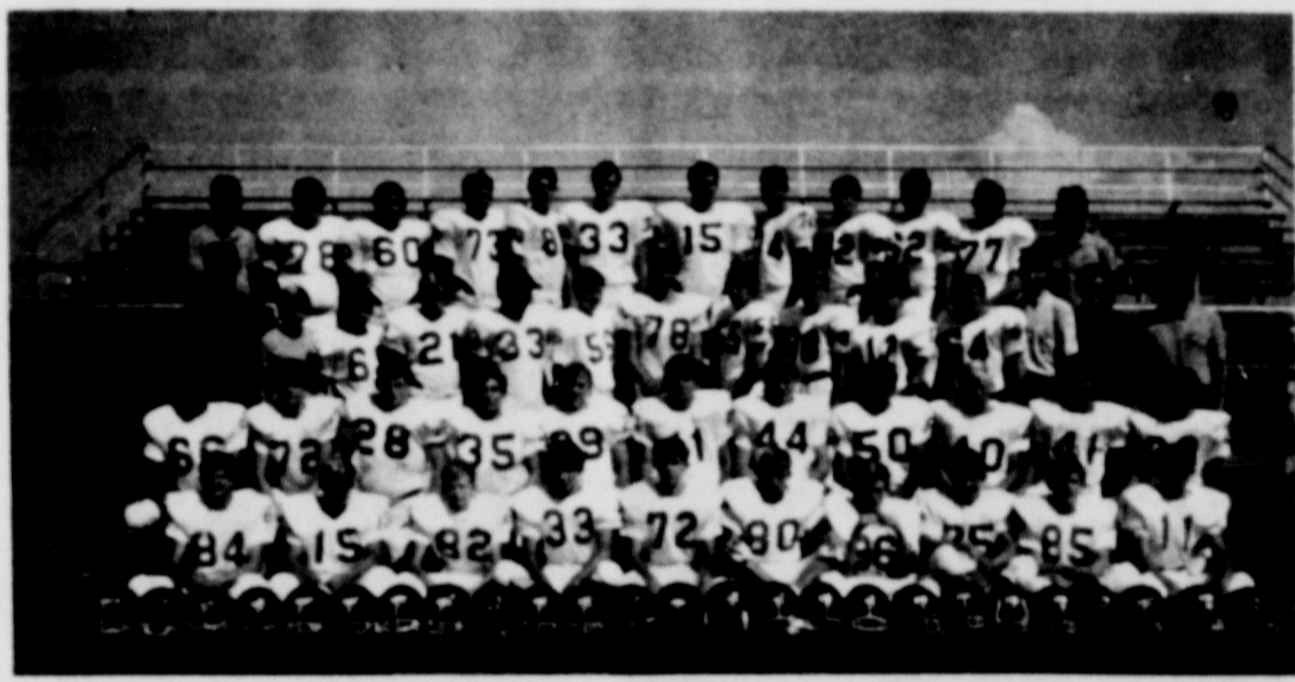
