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Cotton Classing Report

After opening at a slow pace, receipts are expected to increase sharply next week at the Munday Classing office, according to A. D. Peebles in charge.

The sub-classing office operated by Consumer and Marketing Service of U. S. Dept. of Agriculture classed 767 samples after opening to receive cotton on Wednesday, October 9.

Grades for the week were 75 percent white and 25 percent light spotted. A finer breakdown showed 36 percent Middling, 29 percent Strict Low Middling, 10 percent Low Middling, 21 percent Middling Light Spotted, and 4 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted.

Staple Lengths for the week ran 5 percent 29/32, 24 percent 15/16, 13 percent 31/32, and 58 percent one inch and longer.

Micronaire readings are high with 63 percent in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 33 percent 5.0-5.2 and 4 percent 5.3 and higher.

Pressley reports indicate a good pressley crop with only 24 percent below 85,000 P.S.I. (Pounds per square inch), 35 percent 85,000-89,000, 27 percent 90,000-94,000, and 13 percent 95,000-99,000.

There is not enough market activity to date to show any averaged prices on sales.

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District III Cotton Growers Submit 1969 Recommendations

The District III Farmers Union Cotton Committee composed of cotton growers representing the 17 District III counties of the Rolling Plains has prepared seven recommendations for the 1969 cotton program. The recommendations have been sent to the state Farmers Union office at Waco for combination with recommendations from the other eight Farmers Union cotton producing districts in Texas and forwarding to National Farmers Union as the Texas recommendations for the 1969 cotton program.

Members of the committee sent their recommendations via telegram to Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman. Secretary Freeman will make an announcement on marketing quotas by October 15 and details of the program before December.

First concern of the cotton committee was that mandatory diversion on cotton be increased from 5% to 12 1/2%. It recommended that diversion payments be raised from 6¢ to 10¢ per pound. Other recommendations highlighting the meeting which was held in Aspermont on Thursday, October 3rd, were that "skip-row" provisions and the 3 to 5 year county proven yield regulations remain unchanged from 1968.

The Cotton Commodity Committee of District III (representing 17 counties of the Rolling Plains Cotton Producing Area) met October 3rd at Fraziers Cafe, Aspermont, Texas with 19 members present.

Forest Creamer, District III Director introduced Sammy White, Knox City and appointed

him as chairman of the meeting. Connie Mack Seymore, Merkel, acted as temporary secretary.

The following changes and recommendations for the 1969 Cotton Program were unanimously adopted.

1. That mandatory diversion on cotton be increased from 5% to 12 1/2%.
2. That diversion payments be raised from 6¢ to 10¢ per pound.
3. To leave "skip-row" regulations unchanged from 1968.
4. Leave the 3 to 5 year county proven yield regulations as are.
5. Leave cotton loan rate as it is at 90% of world market.
6. Have no limitations of payments on farm programs.
7. Study feasibility of dividing representation on the State ASCS Committee into districts over the state.

Four Accidents Reported In Co.

Interscholastic League rules have changed slightly this year. 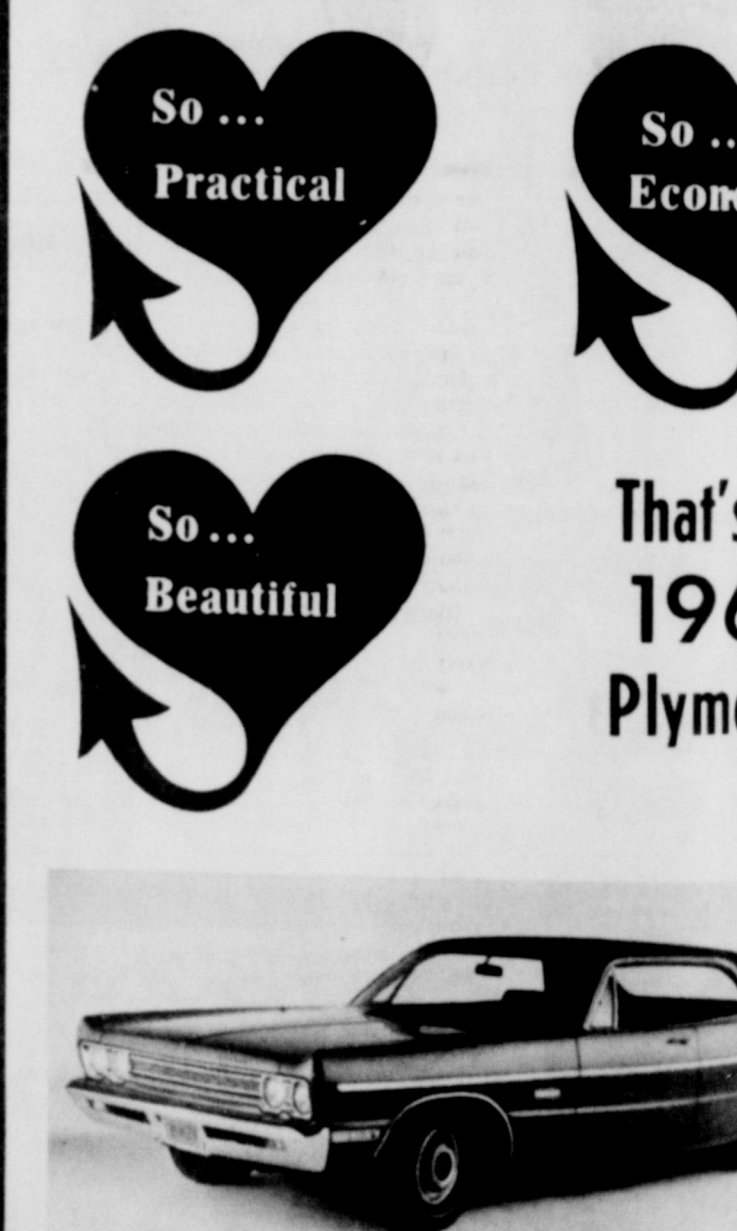
the trips are financed and sponsored by the school board. Benefits for today's veterans include special assistance for young veterans with limited education.

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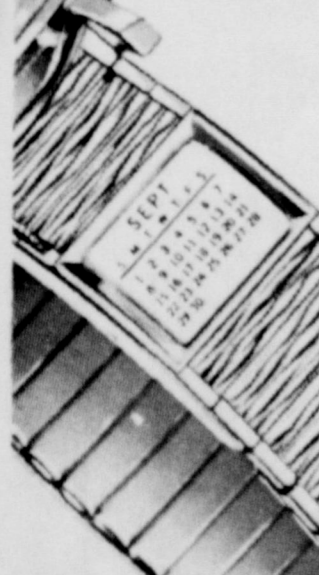
