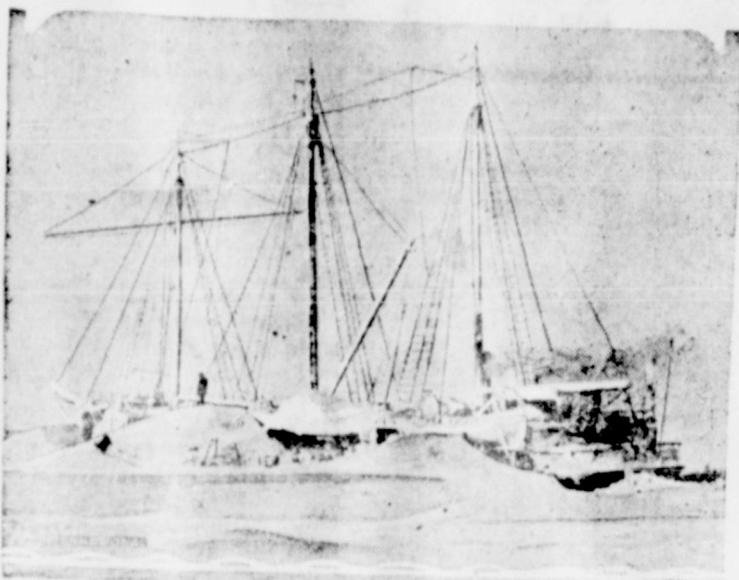

FOUR CENT TAX REFUNDS GIVEN

The State Comptroller's Department is now prepared to receive reports of exemption from the new four-cent occupation tax on gasoline, according to an announcement by State Comptroller of Public Accounts Sam Houston Terrell. Gasoline used for any other purpose than that of propelling vehicles on public roads, streets and Highways of Texas is exempt from taxation. Fuel used in farm tractors, stationary engines, air craft and motor boats, therefore is exempt.

However the tax must be paid on all gasoline. Refunds will be made to those exempt. The tax is placed directly on wholesale distributors of gasoline at the rate of four cents per gallon, but the consumer eventually bears the burden of the tax. The new rate was in effect July 16th, having previously been two cents.

The new law does not make it easy for the consumer to secure refunds or exemptions. Comptroller Terrell has outlined the necessary procedure for the exempted as follows:

1. The purchaser must fill out an invoice, at the time of purchase, giving amount price, purpose etc. The regular price is paid for the gas. Forms will be supplied by dealers and filling stations.

2. Before the 25th of the month following the month of purchase, the buyer must report to the Comptroller the number of gallons bought and the amount of refunds expected. Claims reported later than the 25th will not be honored.

3. On receiving the report, the Comptroller's Department will mail the claimant an affidavit-account form, on which will be recorded information as to the amount and use of gasoline purchased. This information must be sworn before a notary public, and filed with the Comptroller not later than two months from the date of purchase. This document must be accompanied with a filing fee of \$1.00, which must be paid each time claim is filed. These fees will be used to enforce the law.

4. The claim will be investigated and if considered valid, a State warrant will be issued for the refund. This warrant must be cashed within 60 days.

5. No refunds made where gasoline is used later than six months from purchase.

Persons believing themselves to be entitled to exemptions should write to Comptroller Sam Houston Terrell, Austin, Texas.

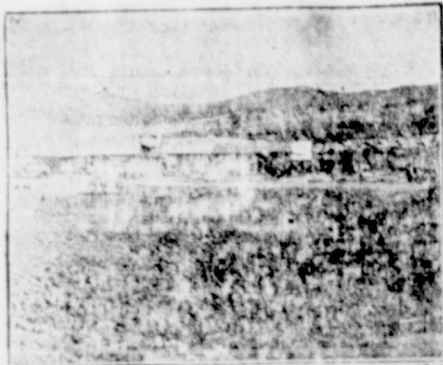

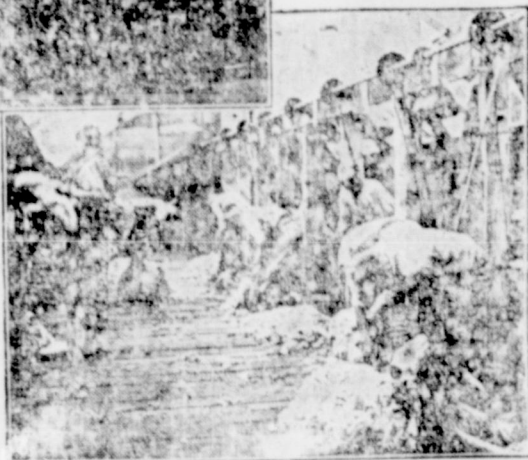

Cash prizes will go to the five men turning in the fastest time on one hundred sheep, first prize \$500—2nd prize \$250—3rd prize \$150—4th prize \$75 and 5th prize \$50. The National Wool Growers Association will give a cash prize of \$100 for the best appearing finished pen of sheep. In addition, twenty

additional prizes, ranging in value from \$5.00 to \$50.00 have been posted for special shearing events during the course of the contest.

The arrangements are such that every man who competes in this big event will participate in the winners, as well as have the satisfaction of working on the last run of the season. The purpose of the contest is, therefore, to establish who is the Champ U. S. sheep shearer. It will establish an official U. S. Record on shearing one hundred sheep, and it will demonstrate in a practical way the thorough efficiency of modern shearing methods.

In the United States, the shearer and his work have been unsung. Only a limited few know anything of the romance of this profession, the splendid type of men who follow it, or the tremendous feats of endurance that they must perform to qualify for the annual shearing run. The thousands who will witness the event in the Livestock Pavilion at Great Falls, Montana, July 10th and 11th are sure to experience new thrills sounding the keynote of modern existence—SPEED.

Cost of Houses

Interesting figures show that the average cost of houses is higher in cities of 500,000 population and over than in smaller centers, and that there is a considerable difference in construction costs in different cities, greater in some instances than the average citizen would suppose, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. In 14 cities of more than half a million, the average cost of one-family dwellings was \$5,109 during the first half of 1928. Such houses, however, were built for an average cost of \$3,619 in St. Louis, while the same general type of dwelling cost, on an average, \$8,534 in Washington, a difference of more than 100 per cent. It was not determined whether this increase was due to better houses in Washington or to higher construction costs or both.

Russians have an instinctive, one might almost say an apparently ineradicable fondness for "zasednyes" or conferences; and one explanation for the harassed existence of the typical Soviet official is the fact that, in addition to his regular duties, he is obliged to attend many of these conferences, which often last into the small hours of the morning, says the Christian Science Monitor. Now the burdensome character of these meetings has been enhanced by a stern ruling to the effect that only outside experts called for consultation may draw extra pay for attending conferences; and this extra pay must not exceed the sum of five rubles (about \$2.50) a day.

The modern business man is no more afraid to offer his product than he is to express his views on whatever concerns the welfare of his fellows. And just as he may now and then lose a sale through straight and open business competition, so he may now and then lose a sale through the frank expression of his opinions, says the Valve World. But in neither case is he likely to modify either his established business principles or his views for the sake of financial gain. His attitude as a business man is secondary to his attitude as a man. He does not wish to "lose business," but he would rather do so than lose his self-respect.

Federal agents in their policy of wild life conservation have run up against the ruthless balance of nature. The slaughter of mountain lions, lynxes, wolves and other carnivora has resulted in the propagation of antelope and deer beyond the capacity of their ranges, says the Louisville Courier-Journal. So the weaker and younger ones are dying of starvation. One way or another nature manages to strike a balance of organic life between her flora and fauna, and she evinces no disposition to comply with the civilized notions of the highest order of her children.

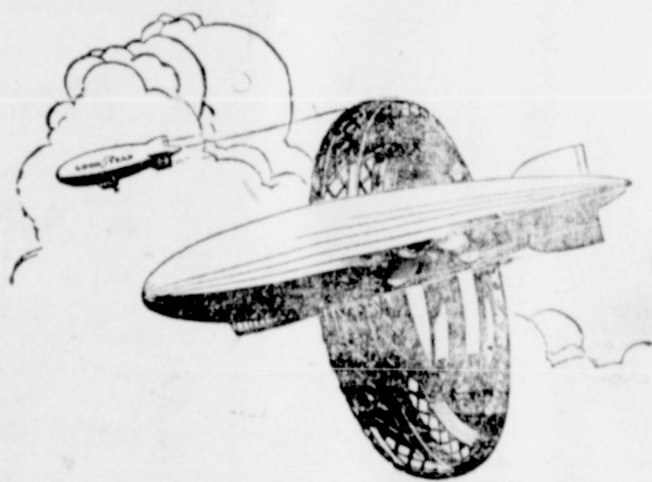

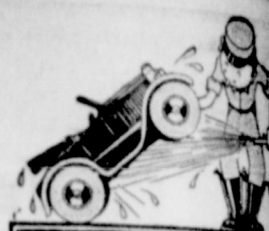
