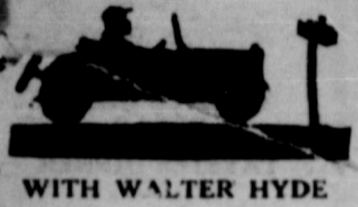


Along Route One

TO BUILD MORE R. E. A. LINES IN KNOX COUNTY

T. E. Craddock of Seymour met with the county commissioners in Benjamin Monday afternoon for the purpose of securing permission to build a high line for the Rural Electrification program on the highways of Knox County. The commissioners voted to give the R. E. A. permission to build the lines. They already have 128 miles of lines in this county and plan to build 290 more miles. The lines will extend west of Knox City to the Bush-Burnett Ranch, serving all the farming section west of Knox City. They will start a survey for the lines within the next ten days, Mr. Craddock reported.

TO MAKE LOANS ON 1939 COTTON

County Agent Walter Rice announced today that the Commodity Credit Corporation will make loans available on the 1939 cotton crop. Minimum rate will be the same as the basic rate for the 1938 crop, or 8.3 cents per pound on seven-eighths inch middling cotton. Loans will be made at 3 per cent interest by the Commodity Credit Corporation, banks, and other lending agencies. Loans on the 1939 crop will be available until May 1, 1940.

It is urged that all old borrowers and those farmers who are interested in obtaining loans for 1940 be present at one of the above meetings. At these meetings the aims and objects of the Farm Security Administration will be discussed thoroughly. Also, the eligibility requirements for an applicant, landlord-tenant lease, and other important phases of the Farm Security Administration will be discussed. It is hoped that M. B. Oates, District RR Supervisor, Mrs. Aubrey Russell, District Home Supervisor, and Guy H. Tomlinson, District FDA Supervisor will be present to explain the various ways in which the FSA can aid the farmer in his farming operations.

These meetings are open to the general public, bankers, land-lords, creditors and anyone who is interested in the farmer. Tell your neighbor about these meetings and urge that everyone attend at the nearest meeting place. It is important that the wives, as well as the husbands, attend these meetings.

It will be necessary for all farmers interested in obtaining loans for 1940 attend one of these Educational Meetings before they can receive a loan.

COTTON GINNING REPORT

3458 bales of cotton had been ginned in Knox City prior to noon, Thursday, November 16.

Census report shows that 12,916 bales of cotton were ginned in Knox County from the crop of 1939 prior to Nov. 16 as compared with 22,202 bales for the crop of 1938, according to Hoyle H. Sullins of Vera, Special Agent for the Bureau of Census.

DIRTDAUBERS SEEK NEW HOMES

Several hundred dirtdaubers in town are looking for new homes, gas company officials report. They attribute the acute housing shortage among the insects to the recent cold snap which grought gas stoves out of garages and other storage places and set them up for use.

"Dirtdaubers had rather build their dirt houses in space heaters, orifices, and tubing connection ends than any other place, apparently," the gas men explained. "And when our customers set their stoves up for the winter heating season, they sometimes find the gas won't turn on. Investigation usually shows the remains of a dirtauber's summer home blocking the passage."

A serious warning was issued by the gas company, urging customers to have all heating equipment and gas piping inspected now, at the beginning of the heating season.

"Dirty, improperly adjusted burners not only waste gas, but are a possible source of carbon monoxide which can result from the incomplete combustion of any fuel," they pointed out. "Properly used, natural gas is as safe as any other fuel, and a few simple precautions will eliminate the possibility of accidents," they continued.

tach their heaters to gas outlets with rigid metal pipe and screw connections, and to have all heating equipment and piping inspected and adjusted by qualified experts. Gas cocks should be inspected and if loose should be leak proofed or replaced. Heaters should be at least four inches from walls, and open flame gas heaters should have screen guards over them. Curtains, draperies and similar inflammable materials should be kept away from heaters.

"If escaping gas is detected, all flames should be extinguished at once and doors and windows should be opened. Gas valves and cocks should be closed and the gas turned off at the meter. Call the gas com-

pany or a competent plumber at once, and meanwhile allow no flame of any kind to be brought into the room."

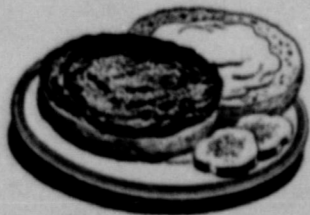
