Records Needed By All Beginners

Supt. W. R. Baker told the Herald this week that children entering school or public school kindergarten for the first time this fall will need a certified copy of his or her birth certificate and an immunization record indicating protection against diptheria, tetanus, smallpox and other diseases.

Copies of birth records can be obtained from the county or city of the child's birth or by request from the State Health Department in Austin for a fee

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copies of birth certificates now before the volume of requests causes delay. Each certificate must be checked for omissions or errors to meet statutory requirements, Last year the Texas Vital Statistics Bureau made over 200,000 certification and verifications.

Navratil emphasizes that conservation measures also provide immediate scenic and recreation benefits for everyone - plus cleaner water and air for now and the future. At the same time, farmland not needed for crop production is conserved for future uses.

He singled out one important conservation practice, seeding vegetative soil cover, as helping prevent erosion and siltation - which are major pollution problems, "Green, growing, well-rooted cover keeps soil where it belongs and prevents it from washing into rivers, estuaries, and public water supplies," he commented, Engineers estimate that it costs 20 times as much to remove a cubic yard of silt from a river or harbor as it does to keep it where it belongs in the first place.

Navratil adds that in addition to preventing siltation itself, vegetative cover prevents pollution by phosphorus, a basic plant nutrient, that moves with the soil, adding fuel for algae bloom and other forms of water pollution.

Despite these successes, a recent conservation needs inventory shows that rural America is barely holding its own in conservation and anti-pollution work, Navratil said, "For that reason, we want to find ways for ASCS conservation and pollution-abatement practices to have even more impact in solving problems of environmental quality and preserving and enhancing our soil, water, woodland, wildlife, and recreation-

"We're placing more emphasis on practices and projects with greater community benefits." Navratil explained. "We're making more effort to enlist community support for cost-shared conservation and pollution abatement practices that benefit the entire popu-

For half a million young recipients of social security benefits the beginning of summer is a critical time, according to Wayne Klipping, social security manager in Vernon, These are the students, between 18 and 22, who must notify the Social Security Administration of their intention to return to school in the fall if they want to keep payments coming over the summer months.

Ordinarily, benefits to children of disabled, deceased or retired workers stop at 18. But beneficiaries who continue their education in an accredited university, college, high school, or a vocational school approved or licensed by the State are eligible for monthly checks up

to the age of 22. For these students, benefit payments can continue during a vacation period of not more than 4 months if the student was a full-time student before the period started and intends to return to full-time attendance after the period ends. By completing the "Students Statement Regarding School Attendance" form, normally sent to student beneficiaries about a month before the end of the school year, the student can ensure the continuancy of his benefit payments during his vacation.

"However, students who don't receive one of the forms by June 1 should contact their nearest social security office," said Klipping. "If they fail to do so, their checks may be delayed."

He also pointed out that a student's earnings from a job or self-employment may affect his benefit payments. The general rule is that a student can receive full benefit payments for all months of a year in which his earnings totaled \$1,680 or less. If he earns more than this, some benefits will be withheld.

Regardless of his total annual earnings, however, a student can receive a benefit for any month in which he neither earns wages of more than \$140 nor performs substantial services in self-employment,

MULBERRY TREE

The fruitless Mulberry

makes an excellent shade tree for the home. It is a rapidgrowing tree and provides a dense shade; however, its beauty is often marred by diseases which cause the foliage to drop prematurely, observes Jerral Johnson, Extension plant pathologist. Two diseases are associated with this leaf shedding, Cercospora Leaf Spot and Bacterial Leaf Spot.

Cercospora Leaf Spot, notes the specialist, is characterized by somewhat circular leaf spots. The spots are from 1/8 to 1/4 inch in diameter and have a dark brown center which is surrounded by a yellow halo.

Bacterial Leaf Spot of Mulberry, he adds, causes an angular spot which turns black and falls out, giving the leaf a ragged appearance.

These diseases can best be controlled, says Johnson, by foliar sprays of a "fixed" Copper or Maneb-type fungicide. Trees should be sprayed at two-week intervals until October 1 in most areas of Texas.



The 1969 Tax Reform Act ontained a change that can be important to many taxpayers. Under the old law you could decrease your withholding tax for the following year if your itemized deductions for the past year ran high enough to create a very large refund, However, under the new law you can now decrease your withholding during the year before you pay a lot of withholding tax that you don't owe. A good example of what can happen was brought out by the tornado and storm victims in West Texas, Many of these taxpavers are eligible to immediately reduce the amount of tax withheld from their pay, since their itemized deductions for the 1970 tax year will include a casualty loss amounting to several thousand dollars, Of course the itemized deduction provision of the law is not limited to casualty losses, but also applies to all types of itemized deductions, If your itemized deductions have increased by a very large amount you can obtain a new Form W-4 and a Form W-4 Schedule A from your payroll office to get an immediate increase in pay instead of a refund check next April.
