

All grdes with a 3.5-4.9 mike are in demand. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41, 32, and 42, staples 30 through 32, mostly 3.5-4.9 mike brought around 47 to 47.60 cents per pound.

Grade 32 was the predominant quality classed this week, accounting for 36 percent of classing compared to 25 percent last week. Grade 42 accounted for 23 percent; grade 41 was 18 percent and grade 31 was 16 percent. The amount of cotton reduced because of bark dropped to 27 percent from 41 percent last
