## \$600 Paid For Eggs Saturday

Knox City is fast becoming one of the leading produce markets in this section of West Texas. Last Saturday more than six hundred dollars was paid out here by the local merchants for eggs alone. One produce house shipped out last Saturday night more than five hundred dollars worth of eggs.

In conversation with Mr. Hass Huntsman of the Western Produce Co. he informed us that his firm alone shipped more than one thousand dollars worth of eggs and cream last week, and there are several other produce houses here.

The farmers have at last realized that there are several ways of making money except raising cotton. With an average of fifteen hundred dollars per week paid out to the farmers of this section means a great deal to Knox City. The local hatchery is running at full capacity and are finding a ready market for their chicks. The majority of the farmers who come to town each week with their produce usually buy what they need and pay cash and return home with chicken and egg money in their pocket or leave it with the local bank.

### O'Brien Co-Operative Gin Announces Big Dividend

The O'Brien Cooperative Gin earned eighteen thousand dollars the past season ginning 4688 bales. The gin was sold over to the Co-op in 1936 and paid its entire indebtedness this year and retained \$3,700.00 in bank for repairs. Therefore it will be on a full dividend basis another year. At the annual stockholders meeting it was voted to amend the charter and lower the stock to \$5.00. It will only cost this amount now to become a member in this organization. It was also voted to cancel all notes held against patrons and issue their stock since the burden of debt has been lifted everyone is happy as all the profit another year will be returned to them.

In the cotton acreage vote in Knox county last Saturday the program offered by Congress and Secretary Wallace was approved by a vote of almost six to one. The acreage allotment will be issued soon and every farmer in Knox county will know the number of acres he will be allowed to plant. According to a federal speaker who was in Benjamin several days ago Knox county will be allowed to plant fifty nine thousand acres.

### ANTI-TRUST LAWS ARE VIOLATE

Austin, March 5. — The retiring  
Travis county grand jury charged to-  
day the state's anti-trust laws were  
being flagrantly violated even though  
it returned no indictments.

"The whole subject," the grand jury  
said "is quite complex and intricate  
and securing of proof necessary to  
justify voting of a true bill could not  
be accomplished in the length of time  
available for our investigation. Our  
inquiry did proceed far enough  
to cause us to believe the anti-trust  
laws have been and are being disre-  
garded."

"Many witnesses have come before  
us from various sections of the state  
and there have been numerous com-  
plaints as to alleged unlawful prac-  
tices. There was an apparent hesi-  
tancy on the part of some witnesses to  
make a full and free disclosure of  
some testimony which they had, due  
to the fact they feared reprisals. Var-  
ious complaints were brought to our  
attention where small independent busi-  
ness men have been forced to the  
wall by some power beyond their con-  
trol."

"Some instances were brought to  
our attention where bids submitted  
either to federal, state or municipal  
agencies were identical, even though  
in some cases as many as 12 different  
companies were bidding. So many and

varied were these instances of identi-  
cal bids that we are driven to the in-  
ferable conclusion they were not  
coincidences but clearly the result of  
collusion and price-fixing in order to  
stifle legitimate competition."

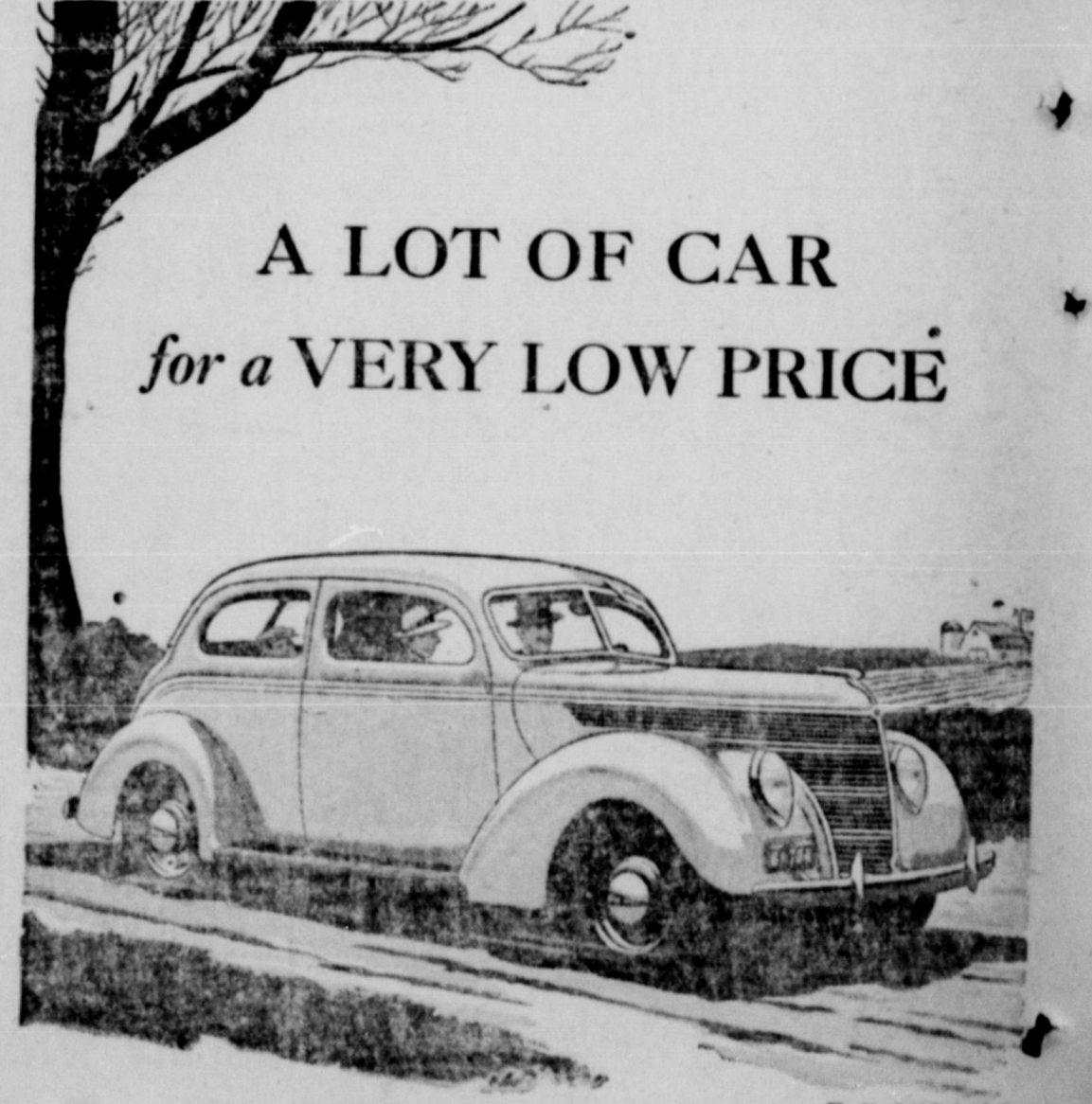

### IDLENESS THE PITFALL OF GRADUATES

Idleness following graduation from high school or college has done much to dim the futures and lower the earning capacity of many graduates. Public educators and employers say it is one of our national evils. Lacking a definite plan and having failed to make specific preparation for any field when in high school or college, on the false assumption that a general education would prepare them for employment in some of the more desirable fields, many graduates fail to find satisfactory employment upon graduation. A period of idleness follows, during which the foundation for subsequent disappointment is often laid.

The first casualty of idleness is that the study is stopped. Statistics show that when the study habit is broken, it is seldom resumed. Self-improvement stops at the most critical period of young people's careers when it should begin in earnest. This is a real loss.

Another casualty of idleness following graduation is that failing to find employment promptly, both men and women drift into work which does not permit them to make proper use of their education. The work is physical or manual rather than mental. The opportunity for promotion and self-expression is lacking. Anchored to a wage, however small, and the study habit broken, the graduate stays with his job or drifts to another end, before he is thirty, he is often disappointed and checkmated. Checkmated because he feels he is to old to turn back and start over.

Prompt employment following graduation should be the objective of graduates and it should be in a field which appreciates and can use his education. It should offer a future worthy of his or her cultural attainments. It should offer an outlet worthy of the ambitions of the graduate. If he failed to make specific preparation for any field, he should do it before the study habit is stopped and before he gets anchored to a wage which can not satisfy his future wants or needs.
