Mrs. Nancy Logan Died Here Sunday

Knox City is deeply grieved by the death of one of its most loved citizens, Mrs. Nancy Logan, who died at her home here Sunday, December 13, after a lingering illness.

Funeral services were conducted from the Methodist Church of Knox City Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock by Reverend B. W. Wilkins of Seymour, Reverend J. M. Sharp of McLain and Reverend U. S. Sherrill of Knox City. Burial was made in the Odd Fellow cemetery.

Mrs. Logan was born in Walker county, Georgia in 1884 with her family she moved to Texas in 1903 and in 1906 she married A. S. Logan. She is survived by her husband, A. S. Logan, four children, Neal Logan, Inez Logan, Howard Logan and Mrs. Helen Logan all of Knox City; four brothers, C. P. Neal, Ben Neal and B. L. Neal of Rule and E. L. Neal of Weatherford; two sisters, Miss Maggie Neal of Rule and Mrs. John Butler of Weatherford, all of whom were here at her death.

From Rags To Riches

In Waco, Texas, the Methodist Home is giving these three young ladies another chance at life. Their lives might have been another story except for the Superintendent of the Home, Mr. Hubert T. Johnson.

The picture at the left shows the children as they were found surrounded by the fifth and squalor. The oldest was acting as a little mother, obtaining the meager food from "somewhere," preparing and cooking it for the little family. Her problem was a tremendous task for one so young, as you can imagine.

Looking at the picture you can readily see who die of pneumonia and malnutrition every year. The picture at the right shows the marvelous transformation which has occurred within the last few months. Now they are normal children enjoying a bed and wardrobe for each. Many opportunities will be open to them for advancement and proper education.

This case is only typical of hundreds of duplicate cases which are handled by the Methodist Home in Waco, Texas. Hundreds of boys and girls find new life in the Home which is supported by Methodism. Taking care of these children would require about \$600,000 a year, but because the children, as they grow older take turns at farming, raising cattle gathering crops and fruits; do their own laundry, help wait on table and do the many other things which train them to become efficient and self-dependent, their financial assistance is only \$100,000 a year.

Reverend Ural S. Sherrill, pastor of Knox City Methodist church would like to answer any questions about the Methodist Home for children if anyone in the community is interested.
