(1) Excessive speed Because

These figures were mentioned today by J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, as he warned Texans of the many traffic accidents that occur during summer's peak vacation months.

"Every year, more and more the accident.

(2) Alcohol. People on vacation are likely to be in a holiday

(1) Excessive speed. Because many vacationers try to cover too much territory in too short a time, speed is an important factor. More than fifty percent of the drivers in rural fatal traffic accidents are traveling at excessive speeds at the time of the accident.

(3) Laws. Failure to observe traffic signs and laws exacts a high annual toll. About one-fifth of the cars smashed up in rural fatal accidents are found to have disregarded warning or

stop signs,

(4) Fatigue. Driving while fatigued is a foolish practice indulged in by vacationers who won't take time out to get sufficient rest. On a national basis, about one out of thirteen drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are found to be in a physical condition that could be a contributing factor in the accident. In about two-thirds of such cases the drivers are fatigued or asleep.

"Don't turn your vacation dream into a nightmare," Mu-
