That is why in drafting a platform no party, no candidate, is justified in writing mere political propaganda. None is justified in creating a catch-all for votes. None is justified in adopting the theory of that forgotten homespun philosopher who commented:

"A platform ain't what you ride on it's what you get in on.

America therefore must demand from party and its candidate far more than a series of promises enunciating policies under which the people may be led to believe they will benefit.

It must demand the assurance that those promises will be fulfilled to the best of the party's ability.

In the classification of the schools of Knox County, the county board of school trustees has endeavored to take into consideration the edequick of facilities in each school which would enable it to maintain the standard of work necessary for good work. Rural schools have been classified as seven grade schools with the hope that they shall become standardized. In turn, the county board of school trustees has kept in mind the convenience of high school facilities for the boys and girls completing the seventh grade in the rural schools. A county-wide system of transportation, which will be for melly set up in in August, is being worked on during the summer months. This set-up will endeavor to serve the maximum number of boys and girls at the minimum of cost. The chief purpose of the set-up is to transport children completing the elementary grades to the nearest and most practicable accredited high school. Elementary grade pupils as the bus. 
