## Plainview Woman Announces For Senate

PLAINVIEW--A Plainview school teacher who has been active in area and state Republican Party circles for many years has announced her candidacy for nomination as the Republican candidate for state senator from the 30th Senatorial District in the May primary.

Mrs. Mary Virginia Kirchhoff, who presently serves the 30th District as state committeewoman for the GOP, made the announcement in her hometown of Plainview.

Having lived in Texas 40 years, Mrs. Kirchhoff is a native of Missouri and a graduate of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, and has attended Wayland Baptist College and Texas Tech University. Mrs. Kirchhoff is an instructor in Speech and English at Coronado Junior High School in Plainview. She will take a leave of absence to campaign for the state post.

Discussing her candidacy on the Republican ticket, the 47-year-old Mrs. Kirchhoff said, "I don't believe party lines really make any difference if the candidate is someone the people can trust, who has their confidence, who is interested in our area, and who will speak out for us in Austin."

The first woman elected to serve on the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, she organized and served as



NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR [LOCATION] AND DESIGN [COMBINED HEARING]

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 283, extending from the Ford County Line, South 8.8 miles, in Knox County.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 13-foot travel lanes, with 9-foot paved shoulders.

Route of the proposed project is along the present location of State Highway 283 with the exception of an .08-mile section of new alignment, which is necessary in the area of the Truscott Cemetery. Additional right of way will be obtained as required to provide a minimum right of way width of 150 feet throughout the project. There will be no displaced persons or businesses, or relocations, on the proposed project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Alvin D. Alexander, Assoc. Resident Engineer, Munday, Texas.

Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file in the office of the County Judge of Knox County.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees, and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction, can be obtained at the Texas Highway Department District Office, P.O. Box 909, Childress, Texas 79201.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for the project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office, or to Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer at Childress, Texas, on or before May 3rd, 1974.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

Edwards, a Panhandle producer and member of the Domestic Marketing Committee of Great Plains Wheat, Inc. will participate as a GPW representative to the group and Bill Nelson, Executive Vice President, TWPB, will discuss his observations relative to wheat foods and their use in Russia gleaned from his recent market study trip there.

The Wheat Foods Council was organized in January, 1973.
