Proper Celebration of Anniversary of the Nation's Birth

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the Powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

HUS wrote Thomas Jefferson for the Continental congress in the famous Declaration of Independ-It was signed at Independence hall, Philadelphia, July 4, 1776. With the pealing of old Liberty bell that summer day the birth of a new nation was announced. Like her sturdy sons, that nation was conceived in hardship. Her heritage of devotion to principle was the noblest gift brought by the Mayflower. Innate courage grew fear-less in the face of constant danger, and her sons grew skillful by constant toil. They craved not courtier favors but demanded the right to develop along the lines of a new democracy the nation then born. Contact with the wilderness had taught them that—

Tis as easy to be heroes as to sit the idle Of legendary virtue carved upon our fathers' graves.

For them to be convinced was as In a wonderfully short time in most though the thing had been decreed of God. They were convinced and they proclaimed their birthright by declar ing their independence and then fight-ing for it against one of the proudest strongest nations of the earth.

Nation Wholly Wasthy.

It was inevitable that such a begu aing should produce a nation of stal-warts. What they lacked in knightliwarts. What they lacked in kingitu-ness they made up in manilness. De-votion to principle left no room for compromise with policy. The result was a people chosen by fitness for great place in the economy of the world's

At this season we celebrate the anniversary of the nation's birth. The 140 anniversaries since then have not all been to our credit. We have turned from the serious to the frivolous, the national birthday has become a carnival. In the name of patriotism all kinds of follies have been permitted. Instead of real honor to the nation the day has been made an occasion for gain. People have made for themselves hardship in a vain attempt to have more noise than their neighbors make.

Fitting Celebrations.

But we rejoice in the change to be noticed in the way of observing the nation's birthday. People are beginning to see that noise is not patriotic and that the youth of the present need a better ideal of Independence day. In most of the large cities men of prominence and foresight are arranging for public games. What could be

more fitting for the nation's birthday? We should be a nation of athletes; there is no day better than July 4 for arousing the latent strength of man-hood or exhibiting what is already developed. ADVANTAGES OF BABY BEEF PRODUCTION

fers the size and quality of the cuts obtained from the carcass of a well-bred, highly finished yearling, the market price for what is known as baby beef is usually both a little higher and a little more stable than that for any other class of cattle. From the farm-er's point of view the production of baby beef means that he can get more gains for the same quantity of feed than with mature cattle, that he can turn over the money invested in his live stock in a shorter time, that he can obtain for his young heifers approximately the same price as for his steers, which is not true when marketing is put off until the animals are older, and that he can within limits de-fer or hasten the date of marketing as market conditions dictate. For these reasons the baby beef industry is in-creasing rapidly in popularity through-

out the country.

In Farmers' Bulletin 811 the best methods of breeding and handling baby beeves are discussed in detail. The first conclusion of this publication is that the right kinds of cows and bulls should be used. In selecting cows from which baby beef is to be produced three important factors should be kept

1. The cows should have at least a fair amount of beef blood. Purebreds fair amount of beer blood. Furebreds are not necessary, but two or three crosses of such breeding are essential. Cows with a preponderance of dairy blood will not do for the production of baby beef.

2. Cows best suited for this type of

breeding usually weigh 900 pounds or over in thrifty breeding condition. As long as early maturity is not sacrificed, the heavier cows are the most suitable for baby-beef production. Size of frame rather than weight should govern the selection of cows which are to be used for this purpose.

3. The cows used to produce baby

beeves should produce enough milk to keep the calves fat and growing without much additional feed up to wean ing time.

In addition to these three factors

color, size, and early maturity should nsidered. Type of Bulls to Be Used

As a general rule it may be said that lack of excellence in any one or all of the above-mentioned points in the cow may be offset through additional excellence in the herd bull. Some bulls seem to have sufficient prepotency to stamp their own excellence of form, type and quality upon their calves re-gardless of the kind of cows in the gardless of the kind of cows in the herd. Such a bull is a very valuable asset to any breeder, and it is unfortunate that we cannot tell absolutely what a bull will do in this respect until his offspring are seen. A bull coming from a line of ancestry which has been pated for its excellence of has been noted for its excellence of type, quality, milk-producing ability, and early maturity, is more than likely and early maturity, is more than likely to be a producer of animals like him-self. This, together with individual ex-cellence in the bull, is the only stand-ard we have for forecasting the type of calves which an untried bull will get. For the producer of baby beef the

get. For the producer of baby beef the additional sum paid for a good bull is money well spent.

Above all, a breeder in selecting a bull should procure one of good beef form and with a strong tendency toward earliness of maturity. To a very large extent the breeders' success depend upon that sour milk leads to save of the milk.

The calves, it was found, did not like the sour milk as well as the sweet, but in the majority of cases soon became accustomed to it. Quality and excellence of form in calves cannot be obtained from poor Caives Suitable for Baby Beef.

Caives Suitable for Baby Beef.
Caives to qualify as baby beef must have quality and finish. The consumer does not want the unfinished yearling, and the calf that does not have quality will not take on a high finish. Neither will the calf lacking in early-maturing qualities fatten during the latter part of the feeding period, but instead it will use most of the feed which it consumes for growth. Keeping this in mind, the feeder should first determine whether his calves are good enough to compete on the fat-yearling market, and if he decides that they are not, they should be finished off on coarser feeds for a later market.

The wide, deep-bodied, thick-fleshed calf with short legs and an abundance of quality as indicated by fineness of hair, texture of skin, smoothness of flesh, and general refinement about the head and other parts of the body is the type best suited for making prime baby beef. Uniformity in size, weight and color should not be overlooked, because such factors are an advantage in marketing. These points are of great importance in selecting caives to be finished as baby beef, and they deserve the strictest attention.

Because the average consumer prefers the size and quality of the cuts obtained from the carcass of a welloverstocked. Good bluegrass or clover should carry from 50 to 100 cows per 100 acres, but on other pastures, with the exception of wheat, oats, or other small grains, the capacity may run from 50 head to as low as five head per 100 acres. It is not profitable at prevailing prices to buy roughage, and as this should constitute the basal ration for the breeding cows, it is not usually advantageous for the farmer to attempt to keep more than can be fed on the home-grown roughage at his dis-posal. On the other hand, the herds should be large enough for the owner to market at one time a carload of baby beeves, or from 20 to 27 head. In certain instances there may be satisfactory and economical ways of disposing of the beeves in less than carload lots, but in general the expense involved in this method of marketing materially reduces the profits from feeding.

SOUR SKIM MILK FOR CALVES IN SUMMER

There is Great Need of Precaution in This Manner of Feeding-Feed at Once.

That calves do as well or better on sour skim milk in summer as they do on sweet will be interesting news to nany farmers who have hitherto, been kept from raising calves by the ex-pense of keeping the milk sweet in hot weather. This expense, experiments carried out by the department of agri-culture indicate to be quite unnecessary. The calves will make as rapid gains on sour skim milk. In winter this is not as satisfactory. It chills the calves, and some of them drink it with great reluctance. Very few young calves have ever been known to refuse it altogether. On the other hand, of course, it is much easier to keep the milk sweet in winter.

But there is need of precaution in this matter of summer feeding of milk. Unless the milk is produced and kept under cleanly conditions, it may become contaminated with disease-producing bacteria. Farmers should there-fore allow the milk to sour quickly and then feed it without delay.

In the course of the experiments, sour skim milk is fed to 22 calves, Holsteins, Jerseys and Guernseys, at different seasons of the year. In no case did it cause digestive disturbances even when the change from sweet to sour milk was made abruptly when the calves were only a few days old. Moreover, no evil results followed the alternate use of sweet and sour milk. It seems, therefore, that the common

LESSON FOR JULY 1

ISAIAH'S CALL TO HEROIC SERVICE.

.LESSON TEXT-Isaiah 6
GOLDEN TEXT-Also I heard the voice
of the Lord saying, Whom shall I send,
and who will go for us? Then said I,
Here am I; send me.—Isa. 6:8.

The lesson committee now turn for a third quarter's lesson to a series of studies in the Old Testament as found in II Kings, Ezra and Nehemiah. As an introduction, they have chosen this

chapter in the book of Isaiah.

Isaiah prophesied in the latter half
of Uzziah's reign, B. C. 760 and down
to the early years of the reign of
Manasseh about B. C. 694 (ch. 1:1). This event took place probably B. C. 755. The place was Jerusalem; the kingdom of Israel was still in existence (for 33 years longer) being ut-terly destroyed in B. C. 721. The name Isalah means "the salvation of Jehovah:" his wife is called "the prophetess;" two of his sons are named and his social position was high, as shown by his intimacy with kings. Isaiah lived in troublous times. He was a reformer seeking to rescue his nation from the sins growing out of their disobedience to God. He was the leading statesman of his time, the greatest of the prophets, an author, a heroic, single-minded, patriotic, fear-less, undaunted man of great personal power and influence. He was a prophet of hope; he wrote out of his long et of hope; he wrote out of his long life of faithfulness and fellowship with God. The book of Isaiah falis into two great divisions; chapters 1-39 be-ing chiefly historical, interspersed with songs and poems; chapters 40-66 are a collection of prophecies that have to do chiefly with the return from the Babylonian exile and the days of future glory for the kingdom of God.

I. Visions (vv. 1-4). As we have

said, Isaiah prophesied in a time of great need. The prophet was very much discouraged. In this passage he locates his vision at a special time and place (ch. 1:1). Every man's great need today is a real vision of God. We are not so much in need of theories about God, as a vision of God himself. Uzziah's long reign of 52 years, in which the kingdom prospered and the king's name was spread abroad, stopped as suddenly as an earthquake, and his glory was eclipsed (see II Chron. 26:16-19). The place in which Isaiah saw his vision was the house of God. Perhaps not in the temple, but seeing the vision from the temple the prophet looks to a house not built with hands, Jehovah's own heavenly palace. Therein he saw "the Lord sitting on a throne . . . and his train filled the temple." Above it, or around it, were arranged hovering couriers and the seraphic choir. The majesty of this vision is indicated in verse two, its glory in verse three, and its power is indicated in verse four. The whole earth was filled with God's wondrous wisdom, love and pow-er. Literally "the whole earth is full of his glory." The Hebrew word for holiness comes from a word meaning "to set apart—set a distance from." The holy Lord is not only sinless but The holy Lord is not only sinless but he is sublime and absolute also. It may seem difficult to harmonize Isaiah's vision with John 1:18, yet these manifestations were one and the same, for all that saw Jesus saw God (John 14:9). King Uzziah was dead but the real king was living still, high and lifted up. The attempt to reason about him, what he must be and what he must not be, as if he were one of ourselves (Eph. 1:20, 21) is absurd.

(2) The voice and proclamation from the king (vv. 8-13). The king called for a messenger (v. 8) and at once the prophet is found. Someone has said that "a task without a vision is drudgery; a vision without a task is a dream; while a task linked to a vision will move the world." The Application.

Better Banking Service For Farmers

A vast fund, now aggregating a thousand million dollars has been assembled by Act of Congress to stand back of the farm-ing and business interests of the country.

DALLAS TO BE SITE OF AVIATION SCHOOL

UNITED STATES ARMY TO TRAIN AIR FIGHTERS NEAR THERE. GROUNDS SELECTED.

ASSEMBLING PLANT, TOO

Airplanes Will Be Put Together By Experts—Fort Worth and Wichita Falls Also Chosen.

Antonio.—Instructions been received here from Washing-ton by army officials to select sites for aviaion schools near Dallas, Fort Worth and Wichita Falls. A level plot of land, one square mile in area, is to be chosen near each of

Dallas Site Selected

Dallas.—John R. Babcock, industrial agent of the Dallas chamber of commerce, has been in Washington with blue prints and maps show-Dallas' atmospheric advantages the school.

The coming of the aviation school to Dallas means that at least 3,000 men from all parts of the United States will be permanently in Dallas, was the opinion expressed. In addition to the teaching of flying and aerial fighting, the school include an assembling plant for air-planes which will employ the highest class of skilled mechanics in the

A site already has been selected for the Dallas school. A representa-tive of the war department was in Dallas more than a month ago and designated a suitable site. It comprises an area one mile square and the surface is level. The contour does not differ, in altitude, more than five feet upon any part of the ground. The site is a considerable distance from the city and students of the school and the mechanics will maintain their own town.

The reason assigned for the selecof Fort Worth and Wichita, cities so close to Dallas, is that with similar schools at each of these three cities, cross-country fligh's will be feasible and practical. Those familiar with the plans of the government point out that flights beween Fort Worth and Dallas will probably be hourly affairs. With an army cantonment at Fort Worth and aviation schools at Dallas, Fort Worth and Wichita Falls, army maneuvers on an extensive scale will

Washington.-War-time prohibition oted into the food control bill by the house of representatives Satur-day night, in the opinion of prohibition leaders, means the new order try will remain bone dry after the war. HOUSE WITH THREE TYPES OF FINISH

Roof Construction Helps to Give This Dwelling Very Distinctive Look.

The appearance of a frame house is largely dependent upon the type of siding material used and also in the color and character of its treatment, whether paint or stain. Certain of the house types commonly used call for a definite scheme of wall finish, at least as far as the width of exposure of the siding boards or courses is concerned. An example of this is found in the Dutch Colonial and other types on which structures e exposure, whether siding the wide boards or shingles are used, has come to be practically universal.


Combinations of the different widths of exposure, the rough and the smooth clapboards and shingles finished with a harmonizing color scheme—all parts not being of the same color of necessity although there is danger in using more than two colors on the ex-terior of the house—have a definite place on structures not having the style of siding established by prece-dent. Second-Floor Plan



One of the noticeable features of the exterior, which aids materially in giving this house its distinctive appearance, is the roof construction. While the roof used on this house is of the simple pitch type, the use of the roof brackets and exposed rafter ends, together with the attic overhang in the

cupboards, shelves and work-The refrigerator is filled from with the outside, a feature which every housewife will appreciate. The hall, from which the stair to the second floor begins, is centrally located and can be entered directly from the re-ception hall, dining room or kitchen.

The second floor is arranged so that three bedrooms are provided, each having a commodious closet. The front and side bedrooms have three windows and the back bedroom has two, assuring effective ventilation and

In order that the greatest good may be obtained from the large front porch of this house, it would probably be desirable to build the porch with a screen inclosure. So fitted, it may eas-ily be inclosed with storm sash during the winter months, making the house easier to heat, especially in case prevailing winds strike the house on the porch side. The cost of this in-stallation is considered by most home-owners to be fully repaid in the pleas-ure and enjoyment which it makes

possible.

The size of the house is 26 feet by 38 feet, exclusive of the porches. It is desirable that a house of this type be given plenty of room on the lot, if it is to show up to the best advantage. Because of the balanced character of the roof, the structure is seen at its best when viewed from an angle, which is, of course, impossible if there are houses built closely in at the sides. Assuming that a lot having a width of at least 40 feet is provided, the house is sure to attract favorable comment from passers-by.

A characteristic quality which is evident in the house exterior is the rustic appearance which is mainly dependent upon the wall finish. SELF HELPS for the **NEW SOLDIER**

THE SOLDIER'S STEP AND ITS

As soon as the young soldier has learned to stand correctly he must learn how to step and to walk. If he does not learn how to walk, he will not know how to march. If he does not know how to march, he is of no more use to a military organization than an actual "tin soldier."

A soldier must learn how to step— that is, to walk—for two reasons: he must learn how best to utilize and con-serve his muscles, and how to conform

to group movements.

All a soldier's work is figured on a basis of the normal man's capacity.

The normal man's capacity is likewise figured on the possibilities of the nat-ural—and normal—use of the muscles. It is not founded upon the subnormal or abnormal use of the muscles. The readlest way to fit oneself to become a

readiest way to it offees to become a soldier, therefore, is to teach the muscles to function correctly.

The normal step of the soldier is thirty inches. That fact must be kept in the mind until it grows there. Prac tice in marching will extend the step of some to that length and reduce that of others. If this standardization did not take place—did not become habit—the step of the long-legged soldiers would invariably walk away from the short-legged soldiers and pull the whole line out of shape. This is what always takes place with green troops. The tall man strikes out at a swing which keeps the short man on a trot.
And not only is the united endurance reduced according to the proportion of short men in the company, but the tall men cannot hold out with their equipment to nearly the same extent that they could if they adopted the com-pany stride. Uniform motion is con-tagious, and the stimulus imparted to all helps to carry those for whom the longer step might at first be an exer-

A man must not walk on his heels. This throws his whole physique out of gear. It renders more difficult the thirty-inch step. A man must walk on the balls of his feet. He must bear the weight of the body easily with him —not drag it along behind him. The length of the step, thirty inches, is measured from heel to heel and is taken at the rate of 120 a minute

Thirty inches—remember! No good soldier ever steps, or marches, otherwise unless specifically commanded to do so. Furthermore, the good soldier, while marching in this the soldier's basic, or normal step, is, except for the swing of the legs and arms, in the po-sition of attention—described in a pre-ceding article as the fundamental position of the soldier.

HOW AND WHY, THE SOLDIER CHANGES STEP AND DIREC-

The 30-inch step-known as "quick time"-is the basis of all military movement. Nevertheless, a soldier ould be no more absolutely confined to this step than a baseball player is to, say, base-running. Otherwise, a soldier could not charge. For this reason "double time" is pro-

vided. The "double time" step (there is no "double-quick") is 36 inches. It is executed at a cadence of 180 steps

There is, in addition, the "rout step," for the march, whereby each man can fake the step which suits him best; yet after long training in the "quick the same time the soldier must look time." he will find that his rout step will approximate that measure. There is also the "half step." 15 inches in quick time, 18 in double time.

At the command of "charge!" either from standing position, the quick step, or double time, the soldier breaks into a full run, in which the step is overned only by the reach of his legs.

For the same reasons that all military movements cannot be reduced to a single cadence, it is no more prac-ticable to limit a soldier to a single direction of advance. For this, the sol-dier is taught the side step and the back step, the "left face," "right face"

The side step, under the command "right step," consists of carrying the right 15 inches to the right and bring-ing the left foot up beside it until com-manded to "halt!"

"Left step" is, of course, the revers "Left step" is, of course, the reverse of "right step." The back step is executed by taking steps 15 inches to rear at the command, "Backward, march!" and continuing until brought to a halt. The side step and the back step are almost invariably confined to short distances, and employed for the purpose of dressing a line. All steps, except "right step," begin with the left foot.

THE SALUTE AND ITS SIGNIFI.

As soon as the new soldier is able to take his eyes off his feet and his step, he sees that he is elbow to elbow with other soldiers. He sees that he with other soidlers. He sees that he belongs to an organization. He sees that he has a definite place in that organization. The more constantly that he can be reminded of his place in the organization, the more adequately will he fill it. That is, the more adequately will he fill it if he is an alert, intelligent American soldier.

The structure of the organization, when a unit is not drawn up at attention.

when a unit is not drawn up at atten-tion, is instilled in his mind through military honors and courtesies. This is epitomized in the salute. The salute is not a symbol of inferiority, it is a simple reminder of the soldier's place in the scheme of the organiza-tion. It is a reminder of the authority to which he must at all times be sub ject, if there is to be discipline; and it is a recognition of the source of that authority.

The soldier salutes commissioned of-

ficers—from second lieutenant to gen-eral. He does not salute noncommis-sioned officers—corporals and sergeants. But he grants them defer-ence and obedience, nevertheless, in a limited degree, which keeps the chain of authority intact.

The salute not only is no symbol of inferiority, but is a privilege. Only a soldier in good standing is entitled to salute his officers and to receive the officers' acknowledgment in return. A soldier under arrest cannot salute.

The salute is performed at present with the right hand only. The movement must be executed "smartly." A lagging, ragged salute is no real mili-tary courtesy. It is nearer to an affront. For it is neither courteous nor military. The right hand, therefore,



is raised "smartly," until the tip of the forefinger touches the brim of the hat or cap—at least the lower part of the headdress—or the forehead above the right eye, thumb and fingers ex-tended and joined, palm slightly in-clined to the left. The forearm is inwith the hand and wrist straight. At the same time the soldier must look toward the officer saluted, and stand at attention, except for the hand raised in salute. When his salute has been acknowledged, he drops his hand 'smartly" to his side.

Salutes are exchanged between officers and enlisted men as they meet each other, except when they are in military formation, or at drill, at work, playing games, or at mess., At these times, only, it is not necessary to ex-change salutes. If, however, the officer speaks to a soldier at drill or at work, or the man speaks to the officer, he gives the prescribed salute with the weapon he carries, or, if unarmed, with his right hand as above described.

The new soldier should become pro ficient in the salute and the rests af-ter a few earnest efforts; they are among the simplest movements required of the soldier.

When a soldier is at attention, the position may be relaxed by the command "at rest" or "at ease." On receiving the former command, the soldier keeps one foot in place, but is permitted to move the rest of his body at will and talk, until he receives the command, "attention." At the command "attention." At the command.
